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Chapter 1

The Wilderness 1992 - 1995

Our lives are not segmented however parts of a continuous whole united with our past which explains, perhaps, inasmuch as events change they remain (intrinsically) the same.

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Mr. Clinton, the "Manchurian Candidate," along with his Bolshevik wife, in what should soon prove to be a co-presidency, appear determined to kick establishment opinion in the groin. He (Mr. Clinton) seems to have a talent for dissimulation. President Bush, who is basically a good man, if anything else, is overmatched and overconfident. His overbearing complacency will mark his defeat come November. Perot, on the other hand, is a pretentious gadfly, albeit a wealthy one, determined to embarrass the president at whatever cost to his immense fortune. I believe that he will be somewhat of a factor in the upcoming election and should siphon a sizable portion of the popular vote, although I suspect his votes will have a negligible impact on the Electoral College.

The rising crime rate remains a hot button issue with each party pointing the finger of blame at the other. The exponential increase in felonious crime (396 percent since 1960) covering the last eight (8) presidencies begs the question, which party stands accused of benign (urban) neglect that has reduced America's once thriving metropolitan centers to urban playgrounds and sandboxes? Although poverty has certainly been a contributing factor to our nation's urban malaise, it doesn't completely define the phenomenon. From an economic standpoint, even the poorest segments of society are incomparably better off financially than at the turn of the last century. The problem as I see it centers on rising expectations. Wholesale improvement in our (collective) standard of living has failed to keep pace with our insatiable appetites driven less by what we lack or perceive is lacking rather than an envious desire of having what other people have for the sake of having it. In addition, our collective failure to properly distinguish between equality of opportunity and equality of results has produced an entitlement mindset. Everything else being equal, differences in aptitude and talent, motivation, values and (ingrained) habits, health or the lack of, not to mention accident and chance are all contributing factors to financial success. Finally, there exist among us incorrigibles; so-called enemies of society; sociopaths who commit acts of wanton violence not for (economic) gain but rather for perverse enjoyment. This last group, in particular, appears to be growing at an alarming rate.

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The expression "Tickle Down Economics" has come under assault in recent years by liberal economists and socialists of a Keynesian persuasion as "pernicious" to the functioning of a well ordered society. It is often referred to by its liberal critics as "Voodoo Economics" although I cannot possibly imagine how any clear-thinking individual could possibly argue against economic policies that have occasioned ninety-six months of unprecedented (economic) growth and the return of economic prosperity after nearly two decades of high inflation and unemployment. I suppose it all depends on one's point of view. Nevertheless, there remain skeptics among us, including, unfortunately, so-called moderates who (should) know better but, for expediency sake, are hoping to score political points by maintaining that our thriving economy has left far too many people behind and that the "poorer" classes continue expanding at an "unprecedented" rate, with the more militant among them continue equating our nation's economic climate with the Great Depression. Such hysteria fails to refute what recent experience has confirmed: that a (far) greater number of people embracing a variety of individuals and (ethnic) groups are presently enjoying the highest standard of living in nearly two decades. The poor, of course, will always be among us. The emphasis on a sound economic policy, however, should be on Movement. Statistical measurements are merely snapshots in time of individuals or individuals falling within certain groups (or classes) at a fixed point in time (and space). Statistics, properly understood, are constant, although the essential "components" of statistical measurements, considered separately, oftentimes vary. Everything else being equal, an individual or an individual within a certain group (or class) who is poor, however defined, at a given point in time, like today for example, may not necessarily be classified as poor next year or next month or next week or tomorrow for that matter as the (economic) condition of that particular individual or individual within a certain group (or class) will generally vary over time. Economic indicators report raw data, such as the unemployment rate at a particular point in time. These indicators neither measure movement nor track the (economic) success of a particular individual or an individual falling within a certain group (or class) at a certain point in time. That is to say, these indicators do not necessarily measure the same people at different points of time in their lives but rather extract abstracts of such people understood in terms of (statistical) numbers. They oftentimes fail to account for individuals or individuals within a certain group (or class) who have risen above their present economic condition superseded by others. In this manner, it could be argued that statistical methods measure individuals or individuals within a certain group (or class) at a fixed point in time however do not necessarily measure movement as it relates to time and space; that is to say; they do not measure the same people at different points in their lives. Therefore, immigrants, for example, entering the country in search of economic opportunity, or those lacking skills and/or formal education are likely to be situated among the lower social and economic strata. Whether an individual chooses to live as a member of his or her own ethnic group or (or class) or as an outsider among members of another (ethnic) group is irrelevant. The greatest number, however, must invariably gravitate towards the lowest (economic and social) stratum. In time however, given a proper work ethic coupled with favorable economic opportunities, most should improve their social and economic standing. Economic assimilation, if history is any indication, has been a brilliant success in light of the many people from various ethnic backgrounds and races who continue to migrate to our shores either as individuals or as individuals within a certain group (or class) in search of a better life for themselves and their families. We should have cause for alarm, however, if over an indefinite period of time, the same individual or individual within a certain group (or class) were locked-in a cycle of poverty without recourse to a better life, which appears to be the case with some groups. This anomaly, however, should be considered a by-product of social engineering courtesy of big government beginning with the Great Society which I will treat later on.

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How unfortunate that life is not (immediately) self-correcting and that many of us must often suffer the inevitable consequences of our own determinate actions or non-actions as the case may be. When we are willing to learn from our mistakes, however, and become a better person as a result of our experience, perhaps our oversights and/or lapses in judgment will have hopefully served some useful purpose.

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I would like to say a word or two about term limits. Troubling as the continuation of mediocre leadership in government may seem to some of us, should a politically capable and talented individual, who has diligently pursued and honestly fulfilled the requirements of political office, be compelled to relinquish his or her seat by the imperatives of arbitrary laws rather than by free elections? Should individuals who have (consistently) demonstrated high moral character, generosity and (political) courage be held to the same standard(s) as another individual who is (either) morally or intellectually unfit for public office or has (otherwise) disgraced such

privileges? It would seem that at a time in our nation's history when our (personal) liberties are coming under assault, we shouldn't be quick to surrender our elective privileges which arguably keep us one step ahead of Big Brother.

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Unless I am interpreting events incorrectly, principles often seem to define the national debate while wallets typically underscore (parochial) points of view.

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Our need to preserve our moral purpose, when unsupported by an uncertain future seeks its assurances in the past.

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Political Correctness has undermined social relationships subjecting prospective friendships to litmus testing including, for example, what a person eats, drinks or, whether that person, heaven forbid, either smokes or consumes alcohol, thereby determining the suitability of forging (potential) friendships.

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The achieving of one's fullest potential is the ultimate "becoming"

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The willingness to endure (spiritual) hardship paves the road to "becoming" .

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Dignity neither indulges in Self-Pity nor receives Indulgences.

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A thought about appeasement as it relates to Tyrants: Tyrants are unappeasable.

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Childish Behavior is a by-product of stunted (emotional) development. Childlike Behavior, on the other hand, is the offspring of joyful innocence.

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Judge what is; more so that which (is) seeks to become.

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Franklin Delano Roosevelt, I believe, was genuinely concerned about the welfare of our nation. In retrospect, the New Deal, dismissed by many of its critics as an (economic) failure, nevertheless provided some measure of comfort and relief to people who needed it most. Providence, it seems, has a way of summoning the services of political and social"visionaries", (however) distinguished, suited to the requirements of the times. FDR may have been such a man. (Ronald Reagan was certainly another) The 1930's were unusual times for our nation that required extraordinary measures to soften the effects of an Economic Depression triggered by intemperate (market) speculation and a prevailing sense of continuing prosperity that eventually humbled the global economy and brought it to a grinding halt. Roosevelt's New Deal, sought to restore dignity to the jobless and homeless. Implicit in its designs were monetary provisions in exchange for profitable work, a concept that has become conspicuously absent in today's welfare environment. Prior to Roosevelt's hard shift to the Left, a decision encouraged by his socialist advisors and political critics who argued that the program's initiatives weren't going far enough or reaching enough people, FDR, political realist that he was, understood the inherent limitations of Public Works conceived as a stopgap until authentic pro-growth measures would begin to weigh in and hasten economic recovery. He understood the importance of self-reliance and the inevitability that some people would (necessarily) lag behind because of (their) essential failings (if not the failings of the programs themselves, problematic in the eyes of many economic conservatives which is not the central issue here). Nevertheless, FDR sought to provide the greatest good for the greatest number while drawing a distinction between those seeking employment and the chronically unemployed. However sincere his intentions, his economic agenda would unwittingly lay the groundwork for the Welfare State including the trappings consistent with social engineering.

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America's population at around the time of the Second World War was somewhere in the neighborhood of 135 million people. That number has steadily increased to 275 million. It seems that in whatever manner our nation tries to (efficiently) manage its diminishing resources, the continual rise in underemployment (as opposed to unemployment) is gradually reaching a "saturation point" were (the) confluence of population growth and (the) concomitant requirements for job creation is hastening diminishing returns.

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The "Democratic Coalition" of the 1930s consisted of Labor, Farmers, Catholics and Immigrants, among other groups. Principled Democrats that many of them were, each group endeavored, through hard work and self-sacrifice, to assimilate into the American Mainstream with the hope of obtaining their "fair" share of the American Dream. This, in sharp contrast with what nowadays is

commonly referred to as the "Rainbow Coalition" of disgruntled factions who are seeking to reconstruct society in a manner that accommodates their (own) private entitlement agenda. For such groups, the Common Good remains secondary to their own specific "needs" at the cost of undermining the creditable standards of a generous nation whose historical mission has been to provide economic opportunities for all its citizens.

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Homosexuality was once considered an aberrant form of behavior. Nowadays, it is generally considered an "alternative lifestyle". This "progressive" change in attitude may be construed as the touchstone of a society which has either "grown" or is morally regressing.

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Limousine philanthropists and liberal do-gooders are "ardently" committed to the welfare of "Humankind" in an abstract manner whose "good works" are oftentimes a calling of the Mind rather than the Heart; performed with an arrogant affectation of immediate purpose that serves in reinforcing one's own good opinion inspired by an egregious sense of their (own) "lofty" morals and principals.

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I am not necessarily opposed to unconventional or controversial methods as they (otherwise) relate to teaching provided that students are allowed sufficient latitude in making informed and reasonable decisions and that our schools and teachers seek to promote (intellectual) balance rather than reinforce a decidedly left-leaning social and political agenda. It is one thing to teach and another to influence susceptible young minds that haven't yet obtained (sufficient) insight to alternative viewpoints. I am especially troubled by the increasing number of schools that, rather than inspire provocative thinking, seek to advance (pre-packaged) ideas.

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Multiculturalism does not enjoy the support of homogeneously minded individuals nor is this situation likely to change within the foreseeable future. Racial and Ethnic Integration, whether circumstantial or determined, is more likely to achieve a greater level of acceptance among contrasting types when left to their own devices because the act of (coming) together in this manner is perceived as a question of choice. Desegregation, on the other hand, is a coercive (political) action imposed upon unwilling individuals or groups by (judicial) fiat. The compulsory assimilation of diverse groups (against their will) possessing different values, customs, habits and points of view must inevitably promote resentment among individuals who perceive each other differently.

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"Forced Busing" has not only inconvenienced families and communities alike, but its stated mission, since its inception, has fallen short of its intended designs. Its time, I believe, has finally passed. Government has endeavored to create a level playing field by relocating children from inner-city neighborhoods to "better" schools located in suburban communities. The fact of the matter is that many of the children involved in this "quixotic" attempt at achieving higher academic performance were unprepared for the (immediate) challenges facing them. A number of above average schools had to compromise academic standards in order to accommodate the influx of "under-educated" students who were ill-equipped to meet their demands . In some instances, such standards had to be reduced or eliminated altogether. I have always favored remedial programs designed to improve the academic performances of underachieving children that would make them academically competitive rather than setting those children up for failure, which happens to be the case most of the time. Under-Achievement has been (invariably) addressed by watering down (academic) standards, thereby depriving children of an opportunity of reaching their highest (intellectual) potential while curbing the development of brighter, more talented children who, engaged in a slower-paced environment, oftentimes find themselves shortchanged as well, while having to wait for the (intellectually) sluggish, indifferent or slower learners in general, to play catch-up. In the final analysis, such efforts aimed at achieving (academic) parity have served in further diminishing academic standards to the point where such standards are no longer meaningful. A universal pass/fail system will one day prove the most egregious, irrelevant standard of them all.

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I support Bosnian intervention provided that our military objectives are clearly defined (including exit strategies) and that our fighting men and women receive proper training and provided the means of achieving their objectives quickly and efficiently lest our troops risk losing the support of the American People whose "tolerance" for war remains vital to the military success of our fighting forces.

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Liberals are hawkish on Bosnia, or at least many of them appear to be as evidenced by their support of America's intervention in that country's civil war. The perception of Human Rights violations committed against the Muslim population by Serbian troops has many of them in a lather. Such raises some very important questions including where were these self-styled freedom fighters twenty years ago when Human Rights were being routinely trampled on in South Vietnam and Cambodia? Where was their unqualified support for the Contra Freedom Fighters at war against a Marxian Dictatorship? Where was their sense of duty and honor and proportion, for that matter, for the (untold) millions who were slaughtered and abandoned by their putative allies or many individuals in our time left to the arbitrary currents of oppressive governments whose (ideological) doctrines place little or no value on human life? At what time were their muffled cries heard when defenseless women and children were being driven to the sea by the tens of thousands following the most egregious military withdrawal in American History? Perhaps things have changed in the wake of political correctness!

I am convinced that we are slowing devolving into a godless society. Perhaps nothing best exemplifies this opinion than the irritatingly obtrusive "Happy Holiday" which has superseded traditional Christmas greetings should, heaven forbid, Merry Christmas offend the secular sensibilities of non-Christians and nonbelievers alike. Christmas, it should be remembered, is not a "holiday". For hundreds of millions of practicing Christians worldwide, it represents the birth of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. It seems ironic that our intolerance for traditional customs has increased in proportion to our tolerance for things "diverse."

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Poverty is a humbling experience. Nevertheless, and I'm going to take some heat for saving this, there appears to be something human and less artificial among those trapped in its web. Perhaps such thinking is merely the romanticized musings of someone who has been more fortunate than most. I can lay claim, however, to my own humble beginnings, having been raised in a cold water flat (the building was condemned when I was six years old) in Manhattan until my parents moved on to greener pastures in the Bronx, New York. My immigrant father took whatever jobs he could find until he was finally able to secure a construction job that brought our family a steady paycheck. Although our family was poor, we were never "needy". Be that as it may, such concepts relating to rich or poor or lying somewhere in between are meaningless to preschoolers until "comparative impressions" start kicking in, which, for most children, is generally around the time a child starts kindergarten. One good thing about poverty, provided it isn't severe, is that it conditions a family to properly manage their limited resources and improvise on the little they have. Poverty is thought provoking in the manner it spurs the imagination of things possible; however I digress. How wonderful it would be if our government were occasionally a dollar short so that it too might develop economical spending habits. (I forgot about taxes!) It seems that the more government has available to spend, the more it feels compelled to spend it. At any rate, I am not trying to make an argument for the good ole days, which weren't always so good, although heaven knows why many of us oftentimes feel the need to remind ourselves that they were. Neither am I making a case for poverty; you know, a character builder and all that. There's a tendency among some of us who have risen from humbler beginnings, however, to wear our (erstwhile) poverty on our sleeves as an affirmation of our "incomparable" achievement or perhaps we wax nostalgic for simpler times however "unpleasant". Perhaps it's the struggle that we miss the most, that brought our families closer together or perhaps it's the (simple) pining of our lost youth.

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It has often been said that inasmuch as things change they remain the same. This is partially true. (Essential) Human Nature, never changes; only the scope and limits of its immediate environment that conditions the way it thinks and acts.

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The Special Prosecutor's Office has lost a great deal of credibility in recent years. This "bipartisan" office was initially established to investigate and prosecute political figures found guilty of political misconduct and abuse of public office. It has subsequently devolved, however, into a quasi political agency consisting of political hacks commissioned to persecute or discredit political opposition.

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The governor of the State of New York is proposing a bill that will increase cigarette taxes thereby raising the cost of a pack of cigarettes to \$3.00, the highest in the nation; in this manner offsetting the fiscal ineptitude and corruption of our state officials whose gross mismanagement of the public treasury constitutes a greater sin than the sin tax itself.

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The prison population received some welcome news from New York City after it announced plans to establish a Civilian Review Board, the kind that is likely to attract a number of ACLU types on its committee. This initiative should improve the chances for early parole for a number of hardened criminals who, in the interest of society, should otherwise serve their sentences. As usual, it's the victim and potential victims who always seem to take it in the neck!

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Penal Systems were established to punish (hardened) criminal offenders by locking them behind prison walls. Efforts aimed at rehabilitating criminal elements should be pursued whenever possible without compromising its intended purpose, however.

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The Surgeon General is hoping to encourage condom use (especially) among teenagers through public service announcements as part of the department's "safe" sex education program. This is like distributing clean syringes to chronic drug users. Why not simply raise the white flag and lay down our (moral) arms. Society's inability to properly instruct and influence its own children by telling them in effect, that inasmuch as (some) parents are either unable or unwilling to control inappropriate behavior, let's at least make improper conduct safer; in this manner sending a mixed message to our "wayward" sons and daughters.

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A major obstacle often encountered in most relationships is the expectation of mutual reciprocity; that is to say; expecting a "fair" or proper return of affection equal in proportion to one's own measure. I don't believe that this is possible, however, because of the

emotional boundaries that naturally limit an individual's capacity to either love or to love in return. The best any of us could hope for is that we continue loving others in a manner consistent with our nature or capacity to love while placing our hope and trust in the reciprocal affection of those we love.

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Abraham Lincoln said that "a government must not be as strong as to challenge the liberties of a free society while at the same time remaining strong enough to maintain its existence". Despite the number of rhetorical portents emanating from partisan politicians and doomsayers about the imminent demise of democratic principles and rule of law, a political dictatorship (I am using an extreme example) in this country would be very unlikely. Our nation's scrupulously crafted system of Liberal Republicanism, deeply imbedded in our political and social institutions, has rendered this an unlikely possibility, unlike old world cultures whose political origins were founded on authoritarian, monarchial or tribal traditions. America's Declaration of Independence inspired the thinking of an incipient nation whose formative ideas would one day lay the cornerstone of our inimitable Constitution. This great document was not artificially conceived. It acquired a spiritual character inspired by the principles of Natural Law and Equal Rights of Men eloquently expressed in the political writings of Locke, Paine, Montesquieu and Burke among others. That our system of government might someday submit itself to tyranny is diametrically opposed to the American mindset accustomed to freedom, unlike (subject) societies whose uncertain social and political environments keep many of its citizen living on the edge of tyranny. The political prototype established by Americans for Americans is unique in the manner it was able to harness and (limit) the energies and imaginations of thirteen independent colonies while integrating them without unduly compromising their singular authority.

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Circumstances and events have elevated many people to greatness. Nevertheless, those willing to confront potential challenges possessed the character, ability and mindset to override them.

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The "demise" of Communism is likely to re-ignite national prejudices in the Baltic States and Eastern Europe. Economic instability will likely ensue. Western Europe has been slow to learn the lessons imparted by two world wars that reduced many of its nations to the second rank. It will be interesting to observe how events will eventually unfold. I expect Western Europe may gradually re-open its markets to its Eastern neighbors although they have their own (economic) issues to deal with. The United States, on the other hand, will need to assume a stronger presence in that region by encouraging free and open markets that will allow these nation's to prosper. It might also prove to be an excellent opportunity for America to "repair" fragile relations.

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Attempts to control spiraling health care costs will require the reining of special interest groups which is unlikely to happen any time soon as long as taxpayer recourse remains the fallback option.

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The underlying principles of "equality" under the law have been grossly overstated by our higher courts whose primary function should be legal interpretation; assuring that existing laws are being properly and evenly applied without regard to special interests or favored classes or groups. It is unfortunate, however, that many of our courts are becoming (de facto) less juridical and more of an auxiliary law-making "branch" of the government where activist judges seek to adapt the elasticity of constitutional law to their (own) privately held views of Justice.

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Contrasting Liberalism Old and New: The older version encouraged entrepreneurship; the modern rendition, regulation and statutory restrictions. Classical Liberalism supported individual rights; Modern Liberalism, group rights. The (old) was subservient to the will of the people while the (new) has assumed the role of Social Guardian.

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Housing Starts has increased 18.5 percent over the past year. This isn't too shabby for an economy that candidate Clinton suggested was on the brink of a Depression. Mr. Bush's laid back, elitist incumbency (perhaps he should have campaigned on his front porch) has ushered a fifth columnist who, heaven preserve us, will never be elected to a second term!

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It follows that peace is conditioned in advance of naught once a threat has properly revealed itself.

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Freedom and Power are synonymous: Freedom is a position of Power while Power is the Freedom of Choice. However limited or broad in scope, their relationship is certain.

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The Civil Rights Movement of the 1960s was not the panecean quick fix that many of its (avid) supporters had initially hoped for. Redundant in many ways, it reinforced existing statutes by establishing more laws without addressing essential issues of immediate concern; that is to say, in what manner does an individual obtain the necessary tools needed to acquire access to better schools and higher paying jobs without compromising competitive requirements? Government, in effect, reaffirmed existing laws with the intention of enforcing rather than promoting equal opportunities for those who were neither prepared nor equipped to meet its uncertain challenges. The major obstacles were not the laws themselves but their (historical) implementation or lack thereof. That is to say, our society, despite (its) existing laws, did not fairly treat some of its citizens in accordance with the spirit of those laws. The inconstancy between their (underlying) intent and (purposive) designs oftentimes lagged, especially as it related to our nation's unfortunate treatment of its Black Citizens. The real tragedy followed the conclusion of our Civil War when rising expectations occasioned false hopes. The aftermath of the war (again) provided an opportunity for a newly united and (wholly) "integrated" nation to redeem its moral and political covenants by fulfilling the promises outlined in the Declaration of Independence and in the American Constitution. Once again our nation fell short of its historical promises. President Lincoln understood that efforts aimed at assimilating the emancipated Negro would require modifying our nation's social and political mindset aside from amending its laws. The reality was that, bigotry aside, many African Americans at that time were unprepared, either by temperament or conditioning, to be free; that is to say, Free to do What and How or Where? The learning curve of most African Americans at that time, by all objective standards, was steep. Many, lacking either viable or meaningful outlets chose the safer havens of discredited institutions giving pause to the adage "better the devil you know than the one you don't." The more enterprising among them, however, packed what little belongings they had and sought their fortunes elsewhere. (Many of their offspring would go on to enjoy rewarding careers in a variety of fields.) Educational and training requirements needed to achieve (at least) minimal competitive advantages generally fell on deaf ears, especially in the predominately agrarian South where managing a plowshare was all the education a sharecropper required. Lincoln's untimely assassination would leave a spiritual and moral vacuum on both sides of the racial divide where a bigoted South and disinterested North seemed equally content with maintaining the status quo. Once advancements in biotechnology in the sixties rendered traditional farming methods obsolete, massive numbers of African Americans migrated North to seek (other) employment opportunities. The diminishing demand for unskilled labor in the North left many families petitioning for relief. The uncomfortable "presence" of growing numbers of unemployed people living on the margins, accompanied by the rise in (violent) crime in urban neighborhoods that inevitably followed, seemingly revived the slumbering sensibilities; that is to say, fears of (White) individuals and reformers alike whose "social awareness", conspicuously absent for nearly a century, suddenly reached a fevered pitch once the "problem" hit "home". This epiphany of sorts aroused a latent "conscience" that subsequently engendered a variety of (social) programs designed to assist the needy, although once the smoke cleared, such programs oftentimes benefited poverty pimps rather than their intended targets. Rather than introducing gradual, measured change, an entire society was placed atop its head in an effort to compensate for its historical misdeeds instead of trying to correct rather than manage its effects. Be that as it may, after all these years, we, as a society are still reeling from the aftereffects of political tampering and social engineering that shies away from (underlying) core-issues.

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The mainstream median has this annoying habit of reporting (partial) truths, at least as they relate to (its) political commentaries, by passing them along as (completed) truths thereby presenting distorted versions of (real) truths.

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"Health Nazism", a term coined by Peggy Noonan in her Reagan Biography, correctly describes the advancement of a consumptive agenda in keeping with the principles of (political) correctness. 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Students are spending more time in classrooms at every level than at any other time in our nation's history. Having received more education than their predecessors, however, does not necessarily imply that recent graduates are better educated but have received, rather, the most "education".

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In a highly specialized society, most students generally gravitate toward curricula that many perceive will provide the highest financial rewards in his or her chosen field. I am speaking of individuals who have a vested interest in their careers. The idea of acquiring knowledge for its own sake appears passé which is unfortunate for a society in terrible need of a well rounded education. The idea of acquiring wealth is not necessarily a bad thing in itself. It seems however, that the practical pursuit of monetary rewards coupled with a diminution of comprehensive knowledge has left our intellectual cupboards empty, establishing in their wake, in a manner of speaking, a Civilized Barbarism.

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Social Engineering's obsession with trying to fit or (accommodate) parts to wholes without giving pause to how each part is likely to function or react in relation to a particular whole or how the incompatibility of certain threading must disengage the entire fabric and render it meaningless has compromised the character of an orderly society whose meaning may be understood and its effectiveness measured by correctly assessing the functional utility of each of its components.

The main reason why an increasing number of urban municipalities are enforcing mandatory residency requirements on its civil service employees, especially its policemen and firefighters, is due less to the common perception of increasing efficiencies which closer proximity to the "workplace" would supposedly facilitate rather than a transparent attempt at recruiting more minorities. As a result, municipal employees are being coerced into forgoing the comfort and security of suburban communities for the sake of their jobs.

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An individual's standard of living is promoted by means as well as by some vague notion of an ideal or appropriate lifestyle whose expressive habits, unfortunately, are oftentimes inadequate to support such lifestyles.

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Introspection must be wary of falling into a state of Self-Deception.

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Most psychologists, I believe, are kooky by Osmosis.

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I suppose that I'm being unfairly critical of the psychological community which, not unlike other professions, is merely seeking to justify its existence. This profession has traditionally justified its position in proportion to the increasing number of previously unknown "mental diseases" that have surreptitiously seeped their way into the mainstream (lexicon) by virtue of broader classifications defining mental illness or other (psychological) disorders or peculiar habits or by overstating common oddities and making a clinical case out of them. Modern revisionism is likely to label every peculiar quirk or eccentricity of no immediate consequence, an abnormality. Of particular concern, however, is the increasing number of hyperactive or disruptive children routinely assigned, in proportion exceeding what is actually warranted, to special education or "remedial" training classes. In the manner the medical community involuntarily over medicates its patients, we are witnessing a disturbing trend among psychologists, teachers, guidance counselors and social workers alike to overanalyze our children by reading into things that simply aren't there. Some children will arguably require special counseling which is well and good. The manner a child is evaluated, however, should be exercised with caution; allowing for the normal growing pains and rebellious designs of rambunctious children coming of age rather than pre-categorizing them to conform to subjectively meaningless (personality) theories understood in textbooks.

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The portrayal of America's military, its officers and men, in such an unfavorable light and the improbable characters oftentimes presented on the screen by the motion picture industry gives pause to how ragged bands of militia freedom fighters evolved into the best fighting units in the world today.

Our limited understanding of ideas, however, often distorts our impressions or ability to judge things critically or to reason correctly; factoring variation or intent or purpose whenever required in order to accommodate or justify some peculiar action or manner of behavior that, extended beyond its pre-assigned limits, often renders further interpretation futile. That God is all loving and good; whose Perfection embodies Perfect Goodness without fault or blemish, and having imparted His Goodness only; how or in what manner did (Humankind) manage to corrupt itself given the fact that Perfection is neither able to add nor subtract from itself without compromising its perfection thereby rendering itself less perfect which does not follow since Perfection, being aware of its own perfection, could not properly consent to its own degradation by assuming a less than perfect condition. All too often, however, the two are passed off without qualification. The primary function of (the) news media is to inform the general public. Such interpretations or judgments that inevitably follow once (the) news has been properly assimilated (often) reflect conditioned opinions, responses or explanations reflecting a journalist's essential points of view, not necessarily; however, the inherent properties of (the) news itself. It should remain apolitical, amoral, a-everything; that is to say, it should never engage in alliances with any side of a particular issue or (political) contest. Personal interpretations (judgments) should be joined together with (the) news, however not in conjunction with (the) news. There is a subtle difference here!

America is celebrating Martin Luther King Day. This national holiday reminds me of how far we have yet to travel before our society eventually fulfills his "dream" of a color-blind society. Mr. King was not a perfect man; not unlike many of us, he was a flawed individual. His personal failings, however, in no manner diminished the essential nature of his vision. A child's maturity level is determined in part by that child's (incipient) understanding of things that are factual or real (or possible) in contrast with ideas considered to be a product of wishful thinking or make-believe that are otherwise agreeable in themselves provided that the (rational) limits and conditions of the imagination are properly outlined. A creative imagination, one that isn't utterly fantastic, is a necessary component of a potentially active, inquisitive young mind. Provided ample opportunities to self-destruct, that child soon acquires disagreeable habits that, reinforced by common attitudes, establishes the rocky foundations of a society populated by lingering, single-minded adolescents who, guided by their own ("exceptional") rules of conduct, acquire selfcentered and perhaps anti-social points of view devolving into a collection of interchangeable parts reflecting the questionable character of that society's lowest forms that must negatively impact its social, cultural and political institutions including schools, churches, political organizations, judicial system, the news media, corporations, all! A free and open society should never impose arbitrary limits or draw uncertain conclusions as to how an individual should (otherwise) think or act however eccentric or unconventional such attitudes may appear; although that society, by example, should seek to broaden exemplary manners and customs essential to the maintenance of proper form if that society hopes to function effectively.

It is a (legal) document understood in its "strictest" sense, subject to revisions and amendments by both legislative branches of our government whenever called upon or required or by Referenda and Plebiscites sanctioned by Popular Vote.

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I don't believe in the "Age of Innocence", although I believe that recent generations have witnessed a rescission of innocence in proportion to mitigating sentiment in contrast with sentimentality.

Although I agree that gun licenses should not be issued arbitrarily and only under extraordinary circumstances, isn't reasonable to assume that the vast majority of individuals willing to surrender their "weapons", that are (otherwise) gathering dust inside clothes closets, dresser drawers and kitchen cupboards, or stuffed inside a sock, for that matter, represent a small minority of law-abiding citizens who, in any event, would be unlikely to use them, unless pressed, unlike hardened criminal elements in the community who wouldn't give a second thought to surrendering the tools of their trade unless they were compelled to do so? A fifty-dollar gift certificate from Macys is insufficient compensation for the criminally-minded. That's 20th century liberalism for you!

A friend of mine recently stated that he envisions a day when America will return to a (de facto) separate but equal society. That would be unfortunate, if such an event were indeed possible, considering the hard fought efforts of individuals and groups spanning generations who strove to achieve a color-blind society contrary to the racial designs of bigots who, unfortunately, will always be among us. Neither would a movement as such, for a variety of reasons; secure a moral consensus among the American People who would properly consider such designs as morally repugnant and offensive to a society's standard of decency. His argument, however, appears to have some validity from the standpoint that our nation seems to be more group oriented than at any other time since the early 20th century. As our (collective) body of shared values continue to diminish under the dynamic influence of multiculturalism and where the evolution of self-contained communities, especially in our inner cities, continues mapping their (own) chartered course, such events must inevitably give rise to expanding pockets of diverse groups who, as a rule, feel more at ease in their (own) ethnic environments perceived to be culturally and socially sympathetic to their needs contrasted by "homogenous" groups who, increasingly threatened by "foreign" values that provide little, if any meaning, seek refuge of their own.

Elitist obsession with leveling sentiments provides an amusing contrast with (the) elegant bourgeois lifestyles many eagerly embrace (joie de vivre) yet rhetorically denounce. Ah, wretched creatures whose internal designs allow them to "enjoy" in practice what they routinely condemn on principle!

Modern Man has become no less the servant (rather) than the master of his (technological) designs.

Most software enhancement packages require human intervention. Nevertheless, a disturbing number of programs have demonstrated an uncanny capacity, on some level, to "think" for themselves.

Technology offers certain "evolutionary" advantages over Human Designs that appears to be striking a diminishing chord, however.

A well-organized society grounded on and supported by fidelity to its traditional customs and manners once superseded by falsely conceived revisionist assumptions promotes an impressionist view of that society.

Simplicity requires Effort.

•••

Anti-Heroes have always fascinated our imaginations symbolizing, as many of them do, wayward lifestyles and manners in contrast with conventional customs (seemingly) common and lacking spontaneity and originality.

• • •

Intelligence is inherited; Knowledge, on the other hand, is acquired.

• • •

Many of us have earned our conventional stripes from the school of "hard knocks", (an idiomatic expression that implies an "education" received from life's (painful) experiences), rather than formal classroom instruction that oftentimes conceals (life's) harsher elements.

• • •

Trojan Horses bearing Ecclesiastical Heretics have been quietly infiltrating our religious institutions and subverting traditional church

doctrines by advancing plausible interpretations contrary to biblical teachings and superseding them with spiritually abstract new-age assumptions bordering on Pantheism.

That society must arguably "evolve" into something quite ordinary.

Wealth does not advance Self-Esteem (per se) but enhances, rather, Self-Esteem in the manner (that) Wealth was acquired.

• • •

That poverty may diminish Character is questionable as well as counter arguments that material abundance is likely to enhance it.

• • •

A nation's indifference to military preparedness and its uncritical assumptions regarding the inestimable intentions of hostile nations is consistent with the erstwhile requirements of a purposeful nation that has lost the Will to Lead by example.

• •

There's "nothing wrong with the picture" that can't be corrected by the person who done hung it!

• • •

America's inner cities have unfortunately devolved into gladiatorial training grounds where young Spartans routinely hone their predacious martial skills in order to assault law-abiding citizens.

• • •

Today our nation is commemorating Martin Luther King. While I do not object to giving Dr. King his proper due, I find it troubling that two of our nation's most illustrious presidents, Washington and Lincoln, are no longer honored in their own right but must share their illustrious achievements with such notables as Franklin Pierce and Warren G. I am still trying to figure out what is meant by a Conservative with a "Conscience" or what is now commonly referred to as a "Compassionate Conservative". It sounds rather patronizing and condescending, if you ask me. How about a "Sober-Minded Democrat? Now there's a double entendre that works well enough for me!

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School Prayer intending neither injury nor harm but goodwill, rather, has provoked such violent passions and railings among cultural elites and atheists alike that this seemingly "innocuous" practice before class must give thoughtful pause to assumptions arising from moderate quarters affirming (putative) Liberal Tolerance.

Canon or "Ecclesiastical" Law is a body of laws derived from biblical and scriptural sources as well as the inspired writings of (private) individuals governing the (organization) of the Roman Catholic Church and its members. The law(s) have provided a (living) traditional framework directing Christian conduct. In recent years, however, many of the "faithful" have been lobbying for easier application and/or interpretation of historical customs and teachings considered dated by contemporary standards. Thoughtful Imagination, unlike Form (or material substance), is neither restricted by Time nor Space. Although operating from relatively fixed points, it is able to extend backward and forward or beyond the (limits) of its (spatial/time) dimensional coordinates.

I am uncertain whether at any (other) time in our nation's history through the middle part of the present century has labeling been employed to characterize (or limit) a particular generation like "baby boomers," (or the self-indulgent generation), for example, or their offspring, the "generation x'ers," (or the non-descript generation). Immaturity, however, should not be confused with Innocence; that is to say, an individual impervious to wicked designs; virtuous and childlike in manner; whose artless qualities haven't been compromised by age or external designs, for that matter.

Vast oceans no longer seem to provide adequate barriers against our nation's ideological enemies, opponents of Western Traditions, who, for a variety of reasons, most of them irrational, have been able to penetrate our borders without bother and establish bases of operations or cells in our own backyard.

Television producers of situational "comedies," apart from exceeding the appropriate limits of decorum and (good) taste, are openly challenging the conventions of core (family) values as evidenced by its cynical contempt for traditional arrangements while passing it off as comedy.

The House of Representatives recently voted down term limits despite high (80 percent) public approval ratings favoring its passage. So much for the "Contract with America!". What was it that I said about once assuming power?

The extent of the damage and loss of lives has yet to be determined although preliminary estimates place the death toll at around twenty. Charity and Compassion, Memory and Reason, Language and Custom, among many other (human) qualities and characteristics, are what separate Humankind from lower forms of life. The above represent a sampling of the essential characteristics that typically define what is meant by "being" (human). It is Humankind's inherent capacity for being (human) that allows an individual to distinguish between right and wrong, for example, although that individual may oftentimes behave in a manner contrary to his or her (own) better judgment. (Why do we do the things we do when we understand (beforehand) that it is wrong to do them?) I believe that many of us are oftentimes "victims" of our own internal designs; adopting behavioral attitudes contrary to our discriminating nature(s) that fail to give proper pause to their origin, "the (cause) of their origin, its history, its qualities and attributes and its results and effects". (G.I. Gurdjieff); that is to say the how and the why we (often) behave the way we do.

..... promoting misleading arguments rather than applying correct reasoning which should flow naturally from (our) intuitive understanding of (basic) human designs, respecting (all) people in (all) their various forms and aspects......

The gradual erosion of a society's moral standing is not always apparent. Morality cannot be measured as one would a person's height or weight. It isn't visible to the naked eye. Morality, or Immorality, for that matter, is understood intuitively, implied beyond its outward expressions. An awareness of proper or improper behavior requires insight into the essential nature of things or ideas that otherwise inform our judgments. The eye often perceives uncertain or questionable forms of behavior at their face value, "observing," for example, an attitude, that, may appear charming and pleasant on the surface while in fact concealing a darker, insidious nature; that is to say, external impressions are oftentimes misleading. Therefore, can any of us ascertain, without qualification, that the manner an individual behaves is either moral or immoral without properly assessing that individual's underlying assumptions or conditions without compromising our (own) judgment? Insight into "things", as indicated above, requires that an individual be cognizant of the internal factors that correctly define the quality of his or her actions; that such qualities "unseen" are nevertheless as real as Character, Decency or Virtuosity, or their opposites, that become readily apparent to an inquiring mind.

Americans have been generally receptive to new ideas however many of them have been (sometimes) slow to embrace them. Its (deliberate) manner, that oftentimes tests the limits of its collective tolerance, can be traced to its traditional support of liberty and acceptance, within reasonable limits, of comparative viewpoints and expressions however controversial or unpopular to some. Operating in a free and open environment has historically encouraged Americans to consider the merit(s) and values of competing arguments by weighing the credibility of each in a manner that allows an individual to form accurate impressions and render sound judgments. When a society begins to lose its moral compass or becomes less critical of questionable points of views or unseemly behavior that diminishes an individual's intellectual and moral character, however, and when principled and far-sighted judgments(s) become increasingly muddled and uncertain and when that society fails to exercise reasonable discretion by indiscriminately embracing every hare-brained idea for tolerance sake or taking every (novel) proposition at its face value without giving serious thought to the matter and when an individual, lest he or she be perceived as close-minded or confrontational, remains on the sidelines as a casual observer rather than an active participant, such actions or inactions, whatever the case may be, must inevitably usher the moral and intellectual decline of that society.

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Mature relationships should be balanced by the essential requirements or needs of both parties involved.

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The requirements of job security and salary are inversely determined by age.

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Leadership, whether it is sought or thrust upon an individual, should balance the requirements of Duty and Ambition lest it promotes Corruption.

Eternal or (Universal) Law is the final arbiter between Good and Evil. Humankind's intuitive understanding of the Law(s), informed by Conscience, does not entirely eliminate our doubt(s), however. Perhaps this partially explains why many of us are subject to Despair. An inquiring mind is always seeking higher counsel, answers to eschatological questions. Such laws often provide practical and spiritual guidelines that an individual may freely choose to accept or reject in proportion to his or her beliefs. The skeptic or nonbeliever, on the other hand, is likely to repudiate the divine "promises" of timeless standards; that is to say, of rewards and punishments, in favor of transitory principles lacking (eternal) assurances and meaning. The absence of spiritual references and indifference to Divine Law has hastened an (uncertain) moral relativism of dubious value.

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Learning informs an inquisitive mind by shaping unformed thoughts and opinions and providing form and substance to ideas while reconciling the diametrical dynamics of intellect and passion.

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Transcending the boundaries of (human) experience lies a dimension consisting of hidden truths whose meaning(s) extend far beyond the perceptual limits of an individual's (conscious) awareness. Such truths are faintly gleaned however "objectively" real in whatever manner they may (otherwise) lack "material" certainty that is not immediately apparent however properly informs an inquiring mind through the Intercession of Faith while fortifying the confidence level of (Intuitive) Reasoning.

. . .

Poverty is not a permanent condition artificially conceived by conventional currents as many Liberals might otherwise argue. (On

second thought, however!) Their egregious ignorance of its transient nature and uncertain classifications often serve to persuade the misinformed and other well-meaning individuals to support (socialist) custodial policies that do little, if anything, to relieve its harmful effects. Capitalism, when unregulated and properly tuned, is designed to promote upward social and economic mobility along a broadly defined cross section of individuals and groups. Its (historical) track record has (especially) produced the highest margins among the lowest socio/economic groups in proportion to other income classes that are more financially secure. Despite its occasional shortcomings, (no system is perfect), Capitalism, especially in America, continues to provide the greatest benefits to the greatest numbers in a manner unparalleled in recorded history. Comparative exceptions owing to proportional differences in Character, Talent, Habit(s) and Motivation, however, are likely to produce a variety of ("disparate") results. Such does not negate, however, its (overall) salutary impact on society. Certain groups in recent generations, however, have been hampered, for political and social reasons, perhaps, by bureaucratic "visionaries" whose (utopic) imaginations and impractical zeal for alternative (economic) reforms have repeatedly impeded economic progress, if not encouraged underachievement.

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Our perceptions are oftentimes unreliable, predisposed to conditioning and experience that undermines an individual's ability to see and think clearly.

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What is not freely given is not worth giving...or having.

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The American People have historically supported the argument that in the event of a national or catastrophic emergency, the Office of the Presidency should be vested with unusual or extraordinary powers or, in time of war, ("unlimited") wartime powers, in order to facilitate effective leadership unencumbered by political (party) partisanship. Such powers including, but not limited to, (temporary) wage and price controls, rationing, production quotas, extra-legal surveillances and curfews, limit, to some extent, a society's freedoms. These draconian measures, however unpleasant, are sometimes required in order to get the nation back on track. President Lincoln, for example, limited Free Press, threatened to incarcerate Pro-Southern sympathizers in the Maryland Assembly and suspended Habeas Corpus during our nation's Civil War. Although he wasn't president at the time, General Andrew Jackson declared Martial Law in New Orleans after a number of its prominent citizens were preparing to negotiate a separate peace with the British. ("The Union Must and Shall Be Preserved") In the absence of political consensus, common in Republican Democracies, a certain degree of latitude and discretion should be extended to our nation's leaders with appropriate checklists in place.

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The alarming increase in anti-social behavior, especially in our inner cities, is, by every historical standard, unprecedented. Arguments exploiting "root causes" by advancing false notions based on questionable economic assumptions, rather than devolving moral standards, have gradually promoted our society's collective disregard for human life while providing little if any credible solutions to this problem. Abortion, for example, has not only diminished us as a society, but undermined the very notion of our Humanity; that "life is cheap"! The conditioned qualities defining sympathy and compassion, charity and kindness have been marginalized; reduced to propositional afterthoughts. The banishing of prayer in the classroom and religious censorship in general are other examples that have engendered a moral and spiritual vacuum; especially among the middle classes. The nation's (public) school system, in keeping with its own socialist agenda aimed at undermining parental authority; has purposely encouraged self-centered attitudes extending beyond the limits of conventional tolerance. Its emphasis on sterile, uniform "teaching" methods designed to promote "esteem" rather than learning, has further undermined an educational-based value system and moral character by providing "sustenance" to a growing number of mechanized, unthinking boys and girls overcome by their own (perceived) importance. Violence and outrage have increased considerably among socially and morally alienated young men and woman whose manners have seemingly lost all sense of proportion.

In a society where youth is de rigueur and old age a nuisance, such (calloused) indifference is seemingly consistent with a society that has lost touch with its venerable customs. We have reached a stage in our "evolution" where, as a society, we are no longer willing or able to (either) appreciate or acknowledge the legitimacy of anything or any idea extending beyond our own immediate interests thereby engendering a Ptolemaic mindset where Man has become the center of his own universe.

• • •

Central Authority increases in proportion to a society's Aggregate Demands. That is to say, authority is often conferred as a quid pro quo in exchange for (public) favors. A society that has grown comfortable with largess may consider private enterprise a threat to popular dependence. Individuals who have grown accustomed to such "favors", let's refer to them as tributes, will often take a rather dim view of exceptional or enterprising talents conveniently perceived as the personification of "greed" incarnate; mobilizing, for their own personal "needs", resources that might otherwise serve the interests of people truly in need of assistance at the expense of other individuals who would rather manage their own affairs. This symbiotic arrangement has worked out quite conveniently for the appointed guardians of the "underdog" entrusted with their "welfare". Isn't it any wonder that the politics of victimization has often been the calling card of the governing rather than the "governed"? The more "victims," the more power invested in those who govern. The key to retaining political power, of course, is to replenish the political caldrons of potential victims or those in "need". To its

credit, Big Government can be very creative when it chooses to be. That it would employ its creative efforts in fulfilling its intended promise(s) by encouraging productive and self reliant attitudes rather than government dependency, such endeavors would go a long way in achieving a (morally) wholesome, more vibrant society.

Chapter 2

Road to Damascus1995 - 2001

Ayn Rand's Philosophy of Objectivism constitutes a cynical rejection of Altruism. Its (hardened) principles are based on the assumption that "existence exists", operating independently of "consciousness" and that the decisions that an individual often makes are based on Reason, (alone); that is to say, Reason is our (only) "proper guide to action". In this manner, the love an individual expresses for another individual is conditioned by self-interest and that the underlying motives behind every kindly and selfless act conceals an (inner) need or emotional requirement that an individual seeks to fulfill. Following this line of reasoning, a practicing Christian, for example, may perform charitable works for the sake of his or her (own) Salvation (counting in his or her favor) or a mother may selflessly place her (own) life in danger in order to save the life of her child whose absence would (otherwise) render that mother's life meaningless and without purpose. In the case of the Christian, (the) fear of eternal damnation is the underlying factor that informs his or her decision; the mother, an intolerable existence without her child. Another example is a philanthropist, or "good deed doer", who seeks admiration from his or her fellows; who therefore engages in charitable activities in order to enhance his or her reputation or popular credentials as a reliable advocate of worthy causes. The list is endless. In other words, no loving or kindly deed is performed for the sake of the "beloved". Rand's theory seems plausible enough on the surface. Most of us are conditioned, on some level, by the need to love and to return love in (proper measure). In this manner, every selfless act may be perceived as the outcome of conditioned designs motivated by a (reciprocal) rewards system that returns love for love. Rand's cold-blooded philosophy, however, fails to factor the spiritual dimensions that (also) inform our actions...perhaps more so... extending beyond the internal limits of our "calculated" thoughts and emotions. Her theory is intellectually and morally shallow (because it doesn't probe deeper into the essential nature of "being"), cynical (because of its disclaimer of kindly actions for their own sake), and mean (because of its negative constructions). It does not permit unselfish feelings or affections because such "designs" are perceived as being deeply rooted (or motivated) in the individual (alone). Generosity and Kindness and Compassion for their own sake or for the sake of others we love or care for, have no place in the movement's sterilized environment. It is a philosophy of form without feeling or (spiritual) substance; a philosophy that considers "things" as they "are" in a manner that rejects the notion of God in whose image Humankind was created; endowed with the capacity to freely love one another as God loves His (own) Creation; unconditionally. The self-centeredness embodied in Rand's thinking is a prime example of Individualism carried to an extreme.

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Government's diminishing odor represents the triumph of Structure and Style over Substance.

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Credibility (reflects) Prior Conduct.

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A number of practicing Christians have misinterpreted Christ's meaning ("Ask, and Ye Shall Receive"). His promise was to provide for the Faithful according to their (spiritual) needs rather than their (material) assumptions or desires; that such provisions underscored Questions of Faith. ("If he asks for a fish, will he give him a serpent?") His (eternal) promises were not intended for this world but markers pledged for the next. ("My Father's House has many mansions")

• • •

Anger, Resentment and Shame are passionate expressions internalized by individuals who habitually rely upon, for a variety of reasons, private or public support without which many would be unable to (properly) get on with their lives. This is especially true in cases where people who require some form of support, whether it is financial, emotional or intellectual, are unable to return such "favors" (or reciprocate in kind). The "weaker", on some (uncertain) level, will often resent the kindly efforts of other individuals perceived to be "stronger", however well intentioned. The unsettling (perception) of being beholden to other people oftentimes engenders troubling notions of an individual's private failings that seeks its own outlet by projecting that individual's sense of frustration (and shame) on his or her "benefactor" whether it be a family member, a close friend or someone more abstract like (the) taxpayer. As such sentiments relate to the latter, the perception that financial support hasn't been freely offered but "coerced", rather, enhances some of the passions indicated above. This is because nobody wants to feel obligated to someone else although some measure of financial assistance is called upon when needed.

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One of the advantages of abbreviated life expectancies is our being able to pass the buck to Posterity for all our thoughtless indiscretions!

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Religious attitudes are private matters that need to be (popularly) reinforced lest a society's gradual indifference to ideas and their

subsequent forms vanquish religious belief altogether thereby creating a spiritual vacuum that Secularists would be all too eager to fill.

• • •

Per Capita Income, however much it has increased among (native) segments of our population, has been barely able to keep pace with the rapid rise in immigration whose recent emigrants are living on the (economic) fringe in unprecedented numbers. Higher fertility rates, common among the poor, exacerbated by lax immigration policies, have strained our nation's productive and material resources beyond their capacity to accommodate even the (basic) material requirements of its working classes. Improperly conceived immigration policies are compromising the quality of life in areas where poverty, congestion, disease, drugs, crime, substandard housing and decaying infrastructures are demoralizing (complex) social and cultural arrangements (and civility) as an alarming number of our citizens are feeling alienated from mainstream conventions that no longer seem to provide any meaning. It's a power keg waiting to explode! Our nation needs to recover its sense of balance while being aware that each additional unit to our society should be prepared to return what it receives in measure. Such thinking is implausible; perhaps, given the rise in social costs exceeding in proportion the exploited wages many of these families oftentimes receive. Equally important, is that our society's customs and traditions be preserved. This is supplementary to our present argument, however.

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What is generally referred to as National Sentiment is a composite of all the essential features (or values) embodied in a society's political and social institutions reflecting the consonant viewpoints embraced by every member of that society as well as its single-minded regard for its traditional customs and practices. Such lofty ideals, however, are theoretical, of course!

• • •

The cornerstone of the American Constitution, upon which its principled assumptions rely, is its judicial system. The rule of law, while providing legitimacy to the executive and legislative designs of government, is (potentially) non-binding unless it continues to inspire the popular belief of its stated mission; to correctly interpret the laws of our land, that it remains politically impartial and impervious to fortune and special interest groups without compromising its sacred trust to the American People lest it strains its credibility beyond repair.

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The Clinton Administration's inept handling of the Bosnian crisis can be best described by its unwillingness to lift the Bosnian arms embargo (lest it encourage further hostilities) thereby preventing that nation from defending itself while its citizens are being ethnically cleansed.

A (thoughtful) society mourns its Dead and honors the Living.

• • •

...Social Scientists preconditioned by fixed ideas and flawed assumptions raise conflicting propositions...human experience...one size fits all...

• • •

"Progressive" parents are oftentimes likely to appeal to "reason" rather than exercising proper parental authority whenever a child misbehaves. However well intentioned, this misguided approach to child rearing is characteristic of modern attitudes where level playing fields often encounter parents behaving (or reacting) like friends rather than parents. A child requires appropriate developmental guidelines that reinforces an underlying awareness of what is right and wrong, what is acceptable behavior and what is not; that he or she will one day be accountable not only for themselves but to other people as well. In order words, children have to be socialized. Balance is required, however. A child should be properly commended as well as disciplined whenever either situation calls for it. This system of rewards and punishment should not be arbitrary but applied in a consistent manner, rather, on the basis of acceptable standards of behavior. Some parents, I feel, place too much emphasis on wanting to be "liked" rather than running the risk of alienating their children's affections. In any well-adjusted environment, however, liking and loving will generally take care of themselves. Placing parent and child on an equal footing will inevitably work against the parent who must otherwise come down to the level of a child; who, unseasoned, is often unable to render sound judgments or make the right decisions at the right time. (This isn't T.V. Land) Excessively indulging a child's every fancy and whim must further weaken a parent's standing as a teacher and proper role model. A child may arguably reason within the limits of his or her experience or competence. To presuppose, however, that parents

and children should operate on the same developmental plane undermines the notion of comparative stages of emotional and intellectual development. All this notwithstanding that love/liking and respect necessarily walk hand in hand.

• • •

Nature does not distribute its bounty equally. We are all distinguished and/or limited by (the) essential designs conferred upon us by "Chance" or according to God's Will; (whichever you prefer). To assist Humankind in managing its inherent shortcomings, however, Nature or (God), (whichever you prefer), has endowed each of us, to a greater or lesser extent, with the capacity to think critically, to form opinions and render sound judgments, especially in matters relating to right and wrong. The decisions that we make are oftentimes informed by our conscience or custom; (whichever you prefer), that seldom fails an inquiring mind. At whatever (intellectual) level we are operating at, most of us have the ability to think and to reason clearly and to give proper pause to the consequences of our decisions; unless such processes have been either undermined by mental illness or moral corruption; that is to say, a nature that has either been or corrupted itself. In other words, every one of us possesses an innate capacity to make the right decisions.

The purpose behind jails is to 1) incarcerate criminal offenders and 2) (hopefully) rehabilitate them. The former should be quick and certain while the latter, I suppose, is problematical. Although society's ultimate goal should be, wherever possible, the rehabilitation of its hardened citizens; and allowing that a rehabilitated, productive citizen must necessarily accrue to the mutual advantage of that society and that polite and polished manners otherwise enhance the quality of life or, if not for humane reasons only, its immediate objective should be maintaining the safety and security of its law-abiding citizens by keeping them out of harm's way. Such should remain its preemptive course.

Society's are formed by majority consent joined together by common laws established by popular customs to ensure the safety of person and property without special consideration to an individual's social or economic standing and that inalienable (human) rights be protected with especial provisions provided for the sick, elderly or disabled who, for a variety of reasons, are oftentimes unable to fend the arbitrary designs of the strong who would likely seek to enhance their reputations or good fortunes at the expense of that society's (weaker) elements who must otherwise seek the protection of the law in order to ensure that they (too) are being treated justly.

Each of us is characterized by our own (conditioned) habits, however good or bad. Some habits like brushing our teeth, buckling-up our seat belts or arriving to work on time, are considered good or salutary habits whereas using drugs, smoking or drinking to excess are considered destructive habits. Many of the (constructive) habits we (normally) adopt are not inborn; that is to say, performed "automatically," but are conditioned or reinforced, rather, by social customs and practices essential to form. These habits are considered healthy and normal. Individuals lacking (the) capacity to (naturally) charm or amuse their fellows often adopt, unintentionally, perhaps, the crudest manner(s) of obnoxious behavior.

(God's) Natural Law affirming Humankind's fundamental Equality has been undermined by Ambitious Designs.

.....following its own purposeful ambitions without regarding inalienable rights predicated on eternal assumptions.....consensual agreements and traditional arrangements weakened by privilege, contrary to..... (relative) standings....

Modernist classifications of mental "disorders," superseding more traditionally restrictive definitions, embodying a broader variety of "aberrant" or unusual forms of behavior, provides a margin of freedom in interpreting "sociopathic" or "anti-social" forms of behavior otherwise considered offensive to conventional customs and manners. Knowledge and Experience, properly considered, render (sound) Judgment.

Marginalized communities existing on the (economic) "fringe," normally consisting of recent emigrants, although many such groups often include native born Americans, who, for a variety of reasons, have been unable to elevate themselves above the "poverty" line, are oftentimes perceived or treated unfairly, as if their present social or economic standing were entirely owing to questionable value structures predisposing many to under achieve. These unfavorable impressions may be overcome in a variety of different ways including: 1) Making themselves less conspicuous by adopting conventional lifestyles and habits i. e. "Mainstreaming" 2) Considering every possibility i. e. "Beating them at their own Game." 3) Developing positive attitudes by believing in themselves; that is to say, having sufficient faith in one's self and becoming what he or she expects "to be." 4) Lastly and most importantly, be passive on the "outside" however active on the "inside." What our Founding Fathers (properly) understood by the Separation of Church and State was the essential right of every citizen to convene, for religious purposes, in houses of worship; allowing each to (freely) worship his or her God in his or her (own) manner) in accordance with his or her (own) private beliefs in conformance with his or her (own) conscience; unencumbered by central authorities; (ever) mindful of the essential role of religion in society, in promoting an individual's moral development without (unduly) seeking to influence that society's formal designs. Many of them sought to instill the highest moral and ethical standards in its citizens reflected by the nation's political and social institutions in a manner consistent with Judeo-Christian principles. They all understood, whatever their religious beliefs, including those who were not religious at all, for that matter, the inestimable value that religious principles imparted on the spiritual vitality of well-ordered society mindful of its eternal origins; and that true Wisdom was destined to achieve its loftiest expression(s) in the highest moral offices that properly instruct the Conscience of Men lest they fall prey to Tyranny or other capricious designs.

Learning pursued half-heartedly or lacking enthusiasm, however, will oftentimes yield unwholesome fruit; casting shadows over substance, engendering unformed assurances and intellectual arrogance by its failure to elevate itself to its highest potential; commending itself to half-measures or incomplete truths that are untrustworthy.

Underprivileged groups, that is to say, people living in (economically) depressed or impoverished areas, with some (notable) exceptions, have historically committed violent crimes disproportionate to their numbers. Such outcomes are not final consequences or random indictments of any particular member of that group, however. In whatever manner many have been unfairly characterized by virtue of their group identity; the majority of otherwise law-abiding citizens are oftentimes viewed with suspicion because of their ethnicity or the color of their skin or because they are simply poor. Some fears are rational, however. Few of us, acting on our own accord, would be willing to walk (alone) in an unsafe neighborhood at night, including people living in those neighborhoods! Whenever our (social) fears are carried to an extreme, however, many of us will likely look for a convenient target or scapegoat; something or someone who will validate our fears.

• • •

(Macro Level) Excessive (government) spending and higher tax rates negatively impact long-term economic growth by withdrawing (potential) capital from the private to the public sectors. It reduces productivity growth rates by inhibiting innovation and capital formation. Increased (government) spending increases interest rates which decreases private investment. It creates market uncertainties which reduces the return of long-term investments. Higher tax rates reduce incentives for employees to work longer hours or small business owners to expand their operations; that is to say, it reduces participation in the labor force by creating disincentives to work. It makes labor markets more rigid by hampering the efficient flow of workers from declining to expanding industries. It encourages "rent-seekers" to waste resources by currying political favors; thereby distorting (economic) markets, reducing economic growth and undermining the Free Market Ethic. Such are the opinions rendered by the Joint Economic Committee.

• • •

(Micro Level) Excessive (government) spending, especially over the last half century, has instilled unwholesome habits among Americans whatever their social or economic station; individuals who, from whatever walk of life, are unwilling or unable to concede its "entitlements" that many perceive to be a "right of passage," who have grown indifferent, perhaps, to fiscal restraints however often (many) feign their pretended support for balanced budgets on the political battlefields, if not in their parlors. It is easy to support abstract spending initiatives provided such measures do not directly impact an individual's "sacred cows." Our society has reached a point of no return where far too many of us have come to rely on Big Government to foot the bill for our extravagance. Unqualified

tendencies to accept what is "freely" given, once carried to an extreme, becomes a self-filling prophecy; conditioned as many of us have become to living beyond our means, leaving it up to nameless/faceless (taxpayers) to foot the bill. Such are the opinions rendered by Al Baldi.

Politicians are routinely elected into office on the basis of their (presumptive) promises to deliver the goods, to bring home the bacon, not the elimination, however, of goods and services the public has come to rely upon. In some respects, government assistance has become an extension of our paychecks. Some people may argue that they are merely receiving their proper due; that is to say, receiving in kind what they themselves have already paid into the system. Perhaps, but "reciprocity" as such doesn't hold water when disbursements consistently outstrip receipts otherwise referred to as Deficit Financing.

• • •

The search for Truth must necessarily extend beyond an individual's immediate consciousness or sphere of (self) awareness although such is arguably a good starting point. (Know Thyself.) At some critical juncture along this extraordinary journey, however, the traveler will (inevitably) be required to scale the guarded barriers of determined designs intended to protect that individual's intellectual and moral assumptions. Truth seeks its own inestimable rewards. It avoids convenient or simple solutions to complex questions or easy expressions for hard-nosed assumptions that require testing, at every level; prepared to accept in whatever manner, the pretentious challenges of misleading or presumptive propositions whose attainment is (sufficient) reward in itself.

Assumptions by modern revisionists seeking to belie historical traditions, avidly supported by special interests with political axes to grind, however discredited such assumptions oftentimes are, may further promote muddled-headed thinking by ultimately winning the battle of ideas, however questionable their premises, by perpetuating falsehoods that, on the surface, oftentimes appear plausible to variable, "discerning" young minds armed with partial knowledge, but sufficient enough to receive distorted impressions at their face value, rendering many vulnerable to questionable or unlikely propositions that bear little or no resemblance to the truth; advanced by (political and social) deconstructionists alienated from their (hated) customs, offering in exchange, contemporary standards predicated on historical fallacies, deception, inflicted reasoning and ignominious viewpoints.

Latent aptitudes oftentimes conceal, however invariably reveal, underlying potentials that an individual will (hopefully) develop in his or her (own) good time; provided sufficient encouragement and support; that such emerging currents essential to that individual's moral and intellectual standing must first discover a suitable outlet for his or her natural expressions.

Governments do not reduce spending; they may (sometimes) reduce (accelerated) levels of spending understood as "rates of growth." Attempts at reducing growth rates, however, are oftentimes perceived as spending "cuts" by political party opponents (who otherwise favor more spending) although spending has actually increased, however at a declining rate.

Discredited Arguments often seek refuge in Ridicule!

A thoughtful society is understood in the manner it treats its elderly and disabled; whose kindly and compassionate measures will ultimately achieve its (own) loftiest rewards.

That certain societies encourage thoughtful expression(s) allowing the private concern(s) or interests of an individual to take precedence over their own generic interests should never supersede in whatever manner, however, the critical requirements of those societies.

Engaging in irrational behavior in an environment that has ceased to be rational or "normal" is considered rational whenever such behavioral patterns either conform or comply with the (otherwise) irrational standards of that environment.

Security should always take precedence over Rule of Law. Safety first, Freedom second! The former pre-conditions the latter!

Television, I believe, has assumed the role of surrogate parent for a number of children which is not a very good thing. I believe its (television) automated influence over the impressionable minds of young boys and girls has produced a crippling effect on our children's imaginations. Many need to step outside their virtual environment and interact more with other children their own age; engaging in recreational activities and "doing" rather than "watching."

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There was a time not so very long ago when families routinely convened at the diner table to eat and talk about the day's events. Typical conversations were oftentimes ordinary and uneventful.....unless a daughter announced that she was pregnant, in which case all hell would break loose.....otherwise it fulfilled its (dual) purpose of recharging our nutritional batteries while engaging family members in casual mealtime conversations that brought the family (closer) together as a unit. Among the more traditional households, "formal" arrangements as such were seldom optional; they were expected, rather. Table talk was not always pleasant; it could be confrontational or trying, at times. Nevertheless it provided an opportunity for everyone to sit down and interact; kinda get to know one another better or iron out some of the rough spots. Unfortunately, in today's faster paced environments, with working parents working longer hours, spouses and their children, alike, have become (virtual) strangers living together under a common roof however alienated on a number of very important levels.

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Dollar Value lacks precise measurement. It's an artificial invention based on the number of dollars the consumer is willing to spend on goods and services based on its perceived value at some particular point in time. In this manner, a dollar is said to lack intrinsic value or worth. Not unlike other "commodities", its ("timely") value is subject to variable supplies and demands; that is to say, its value is generally determined by the perceived impact (variable) monetary and fiscal policies will have on the supply and subsequent demand (for dollar currencies). The volume of currency in circulation, understood as "money supply," whether in paper dollars in the hands of the consumer or investor or held on deposit by financial institutions or the currency reserves of Federal Reserve Banks or the United States Treasury are indicators that will either stimulate or deflate investor confidence and subsequent consumer spending. Investment and Consumption decisions often receive their cue from the economy. When the value of a dollar has decreased in relation to its (historical) value; that is to say, if a dollar in today's market will purchase less of a particular commodity than it would have, let's say, a week ago, the consumer, everything being equal, will either purchase less of that commodity or seek (product) substitutes at a lower cost. The price inelasticity of certain, much needed or desired commodities, such as gas or cigarettes, (for those who have acquired the nasty habit) will often compel the consumer to purchase them at whatever cost. Such commodities could be said to possess an "indispensable" value to the consumer. Such isn't lost on producers and manufacturers of such commodities or tax extortionists, for that matter, who artificially increase prices on their own accord by simply reducing supply (while increasing profits) because of its negligible impact on consumer demand. Government price supports is a prime example of artificially induced prices, scaling back on the supply of oil by pumping less of it, is another. "Sin" Taxes is yet another. The possibilities are endless so why belabor the point?

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In planned economies, "unlike" our own, foolish or whimsical policy decisions adversely impacting the economy have generally created multiple market disequilibrium's in which case all hell breaks loose. Wage and Price controls and excessive regulations are prime examples that have produced dire consequences on the open market. Then again, aren't such Keynesian practices still being routinely championed by legislatures in our own country?

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It remains a mystery to me how the mind is oftentimes influenced by initial impressions. Perhaps it's because the sudden awareness of something or someone does not provide ample opportunity for (pause) or thoughtful reflection; that is to say, having been taken off guard, it is "reduced" to (merely) observing and/or reacting willy nilly, rather than properly perceiving (and assimilating) new

impressions. Such impressions (or events), for that matter, are more often than not, either circumstantial or incidental to what is (actually) perceived to be their essential characteristics. Initial impressions, however, are not "necessarily" subject to critical thinking. A well-ordered, unbiased mind, properly conditioned, will likely regard such impressions intuitively as well as "factually" rather than accepting them at their face value. Modifying uncritical impression(s) of someone or some idea requires open-mindedness rather than intellectually binding assurances. It also requires a level of (intellectual and moral) honesty allowing an individual to systematically revisit original assumptions formerly thought to be true. Such efforts further require a remaking of one's (own) Self by discarding ancient prejudices likely to color our impressions. It is not uncommon, however, that many of us are neither able to see nor understand "things" beyond the limits of our conditioned preconceptions; that is to say, beyond our conditioned mode or state of "being." Our unwillingness to reconsider them as they actual are rather than how they appear to be by testing our (presumptive) assumptions is rooted in intellectual arrogance or fear which are hard to overcome.

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Whether or not "hate crimes" have increased in recent years as a matter of fact or (by definition) is not necessarily a function of diverse impressions, (although they might be) especially when there is nothing of material value to be gained other than the perverse enjoyment derived by inflicting harm on someone considered socially or morally offensive or inferior in some manner or for no other (apparent) reason than someone's race or ethnicity. Our society has been conditioned to trivialize the "root causes" of violent crimes committed by one race (Black) against another (White) by advancing abstract arguments centering on "institutionalized racism," although such crimes are oftentimes incidental to race. Such arguments are often advanced to score political points or are simply the by-products of ignorance. There is no question, however, that such perception(s) often provide irrational motives for individuals bent on committing some arbitrarily violent action for its own sake. For such individuals, race is simply a triggering mechanism that justifies (latent) violent behavior. As indicated elsewhere in these pages, many of us seek convenient targets to justify our hatred and fears. What such arguments conveniently overlook, however, is the disparity of intra-community assaults committed against members of some community by members of another community, racial, ethnic or otherwise, in relation to those committed by individuals living inside their (own) community; that is to say, violent crimes are often committed against individuals living within the same community. Such communities have been historically poor. At the turn of the present century, many Whites were similarly threatened by predacious White Gangs living in their own communities. This sociological phenomenon owed more to circumstance rather than bias. That crime rates have increased dramatically over the last forty years doesn't alter the principled argument that crime is indifferent to race or ethnicity. It may be further argued that the rapid increase in urban crime, quickened in large measure by the gradual departure of (mostly) working and middle-class families to outlying regions, exacerbated the conditions of those who were unable to exercise similar options. Stable neighborhoods, however poor; that is to say, neighborhoods whose residents share a common interest in its overall health and prosperity, have traditionally, as far as may be expected, been able to hold crime reasonably in check. Families residing in traditionally ethnic neighborhoods were often able to acquire, in some measure, the resources required to promote safer neighborhoods. Once opportunities beckoned, however, the more talented or determined among them departed for "greener pastures", leaving in their wake neighbors and friends lacking similar opportunities for a variety of reasons. Many of those left behind possessed neither the (financial) nor (political) wherewithal to preserve the integrity of their communities. Following this massive withdrawal, a rapid decline in innovative and entrepreneurial attitudes (and moral) purpose become apparent. The alienated poor have seldom felt the need for developing such attitudes. Despair will often do that to people. (Some of my conservative colleagues will undoubtedly take issue with me) Be that as it may, many of those left behind, law-abiding in every respect, were/are destined, it seems, to share a common environment with criminal elements and other (social) misfits who continue to create havoc in their lives, whatever their skin color.

(whose) experience is (correctly) understood within the context of plausible events.... joined with the present..... each summoning propitious visions for the future...

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Specialization in the Workplace...intellectual designs superseding muscle and rote...adaptation (American Worker) ...will become the critical requirement for many...retraining...acquisition of new knowledge and skills...modernization...cost efficiencies...rendering traditional descriptions obsolete...(faster paced environments) the "culprit"...velocity of change unsettling to most...(to the swift go the spoils, however)...especially for those firmly adapted in their ways...adaptively (inelastic)...unlike their younger counterparts... more adaptable to change...(faster paced environments) operating beyond (human) endurance...(Toffler)...witnessing, perhaps...the second coming of the Industrial Revolution...or an extension thereof, perhaps...or substitute Service in its stead...amounts to the same thing...History repeating itself?...anomie, displacement, broken homes, social diseases, political unrest, gradual erosion of moral values...meaningless...hyperbolic...perhaps...in whatever manner...(good) jobs remain the cornerstone of a stable society...provides dignity to the worker...as well as a paycheck...provides leisure (time) to develop sound (moral) values...provides (time) for family and friends...provides (time) to pursue other interests...provides (time) for introspection, (time) to develop into thoughtful human beings...or (time) to do absolutely nothing at all.... however insufficient (time) to promote mischief...Progress...necessary and inevitable...should proceed with caution, however,...lest unfavorable (social) side effects...override its stated (economic) advantages...

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It's no longer a game! The modern athlete, caught up in the whirlwinds of big business and long-term contracts and commercial endorsements, playing up to fans but not for the fans, not really, and highlight reels that burnish self-serving credentials, begs the question, how about the love for the game for its own sake that has (seemingly) become secondary to self-centered attitudes and inflated egos; where gamesmanship has superseded sportsmanship? Bizarre behavior, taunting and jeering an opponent, especially common in higher profiled sports, has (sadly) provided the modern athlete with a receptive audience. Such mannerisms that, in a more congenial era, would have been properly frowned upon by a politer society, are now routinely encouraged in today's bread and circus "sporting" environments that "vicariously" indulge an athlete's baser instincts. Have (true) sport legends ever truly existed or were/are they merely figments of our boyish imaginations? Or has our society simply grown more cynical, its own egos requiring its own vicarious outlets? The athletes of my youth, not unlike many of us, were flawed individuals. They weren't altar boys. At least they had dignity enough not to carry their flaws on their sleeves or flaunt them as something to be proud of!

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The increasing demand for skilled labor has gradually rendered (traditional) labor requirements obsolete...hastening the departure of (un))skilled workers...commitment and loyalty no longer the (corporate) virtues they once were...workforce(s) composed of interchanging parts...expendable in many cases...always have been...time sensitive...constantly changing...faster paced environments...job requirements more broadly defined,intellectual resources... skill specific..... giving rise to...material disparities...technology rapidly progressing......unable to keep up....the new quickly superceding the old...in a heart beat!.... challenging...securing plum jobs...transitory...restricted to the ablest and brightest...although not (necessarily)....the American Dream under siege, novel propositions challenging antiquated assumptions...no longer valid...

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The Beast is not a co-partner in Nature with Man. Man was given dominion over nature's bounty including everything that walks on four legs, crawls on its belly, swims in the oceans or flies in the air, to put into use for his own material comfort; responsibly and humanely; neither abusing nor mistreating (God's) creatures entrusted to his care, while administering to his needs.

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Humankind and Beast both share a common characteristic, the Survival Instinct. Of the two, Humankind, above all earthly creatures, is (the) more adaptable to its immediate environment by virtue of its superior intellect and remarkable ability to manage change by utilizing the tools of Reason. Humankind, not unlike the Beast, is guided in part by Instinct. Unlike the Beast, however, Humankind enjoys the singular advantages of native reasoning to promote its survival. The Beast, on the other hand, must rely on its instincts alone in order to ensure that it too survives. A conscious "awareness" extending beyond the "imagined" limits of its immediate environment is questionable, to say the least. The Beast is unable to make provisions for its long-term survival for the simple reason that it lacks the necessary predicates required in making reasonable long-term decisions. In other words, the Beast cannot plan for the future. Its long-term survival is owing entirely to chance or custodial designs . Furthermore, The Beast lacks the intellectual dexterity needed to anticipate, if not directly control, the dynamics of change. Humankind, however, possesses another "remarkable" attribute uncommon to Beast, the capacity to render extinct, members of its own species for reasons (oftentimes) considered dubious at best.

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Whenever the cost of labor becomes prohibitive or (comparably) higher in certain markets in relation to others, most businesses will likely gravitate toward (the) cheaper sources of labor. In modern times, with the exception of importing cheap(er) labor from (Mexico) or migrating to friendlier working environments in (Right to Work States), a growing number of companies are fulfilling their labor requirements by (Outsourcing) abroad. This not so extraordinary phenomenon, that seeks the path of least resistance, does not bode well for America's blue collar workers whose jobs are being systematically eliminated at alarming rates exceeding the market's ability to replace them, if such is its intent, which it is not, I feel. The comparative advantages most companies seek are not unusual in competitive market environments. In fact, everything being equal, (healthy) competition is a necessary requirement for strong, prosperous economies. Supply and Demand cuts both ways, and in most instances will (actually) generate higher salaries for workers in conjunction with their job's specific skill requirements. Everything, however, is not equal and therein lays the rub. The American Worker is likely to face (unfair) competition from overseas markets whose (worker) salary "structures" are anything but competitive or balanced as one might expect in a planned market economy (China) or fledgling, sweatshop economies (Everywhere) whose (native) pay scales, "good" for the native(s), perhaps, whose alternative lies in sleeping on city sidewalks, has given rise to salaries and wages that American blue collar workers could never hope to (viably) compete against. Although I don't object to salary/benefits reductions in principle, (such measures are sometimes necessary in order to keep a company solvent), I nevertheless object to workers being paid \$1 an hour, let's assume for argument sake, for a pair of sneakers selling for \$100 on the American Market. This is beyond the pale. Such practices, prompted by sheer greed rather than (simply) profit, are contemptible and should be properly regulated. Any (American) company operating abroad and selling cheaply made products at "home" at an exorbitant profit, should, in my opinion, be hit with the stiffest import tariffs imaginable to help defray the social costs incurred by the taxpayer for individuals who have otherwise lost their jobs or are (under-employed). A society that measures its economic output in terms of per capita GDP, a useless indicator in many respects, without regard to its components (people), may ultimately discover its social costs equally prohibitive.

The Freedom of Choice, within acceptable limits, is the cornerstone of a Free Society. With choice, however, comes (privileged) responsibility. The choices that we make say a lot about ourselves and the society in which we live. Many of us, unfortunately, have proven ourselves unworthy of such "rights" by the choices we oftentimes make. This is the inevitable outcome, perhaps, of a society that fails to pay proper attention to its choices; that is to say, to the consequences of its choices. The litany of abuses predicated in the name of free expression, or proxy "decisions" made on behalf of others who are unable to make informed decisions, are understood by the hordes of mentally ill people roaming the streets, who should be otherwise institutionalized for their own safety, if not for the safety of our society, for that matter, who remain on the streets, unable to properly care for themselves, mandated by civil rights organizations fearful that their rights may be jeopardized, people otherwise incapable of making a rational assessment of their own condition; not to mention conferring legitimacy to sexual deviancy in all its varieties that many of us have casually resigned ourselves to as "simply" alternative lifestyles or championing (equal) protection under the law, that, in some instances, should call for censorship, or implausible assumptions regarding the "unborn," (Abortion) remanding millions of innocents to an early grave, a convenience for women fretting over their figures or professional careers, abetted by spineless politicians, who for expediency sake, continue advancing legislation denying them ("unborn") their own inalienable right to choose, had they the means, or encouraging a culture of death (Euthanasia) for the convenience of (the) would-be custodians of the terminally ill or perhaps to (simply) reduce the increasing costs of Healthcare, or the legalization of drugs because that too is a convenient alternative for a number of individuals who have seemingly lost the will to rid our society of rampant drug abuse and therefore justify such (hare-brained) schemes from the vantage point of opportunity savings or reduced social costs, or movements to eliminate God from the public consciousness lest society be reminded of its sins or perhaps because many of us have (conveniently) chosen to become our own gods. This is the inevitable outcome of a society that exercises choice without the benefit of proper moral guidance.

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The bankrupt policies of both major political parties (in many ways two peas in a pod) may soon usher the emergence of a (major) third party although old habits are difficult to break.

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Economic challenges pose the greatest threat to family unity, its dignity, moral values and purpose. Although gainful employment does not (necessary) guarantee a loving/supportive family environment, eliminating (financial) worries, however, increases the odds of families remaining closer together.

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Right Thinking should be properly encouraged, if not in its particulars, then certainly as a general rule.

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Virtue seeks its own reward(s) for its own sake in harmony with First Causes.

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There appears to be among Men of Science a Will towards God but nothing approximating the traditional Godlike Qualities that typify the faith of true believers but rather the assumption of godlike features originating from Reason's assault on Faith, that, having shaken its resistance, seeks to discredit the conventional propositions of Eternal Wisdom.

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Meaningful immigration reform is unlikely to occur anytime soon inasmuch as such efforts must necessarily conflict with the determined pursuit of higher profits by corporate interests at the expense of increasing numbers of underemployed (American) Workers forced to compete against cheap(er) labor from burgeoning Third World populations, whose (own) increasing demands for jobs are further reducing domestic salaries, (if salary is the appropriate word), paid to workers whose wages (that's better!) barely places many above the poverty line (although I suppose it beats living in the streets). Meanwhile, future (employment) opportunities continue to look grim for the American Worker as companies are presently finding themselves in the enviable position of being able to secure their labor requirements from an expanding (global) pool of labor including such (potential) resources who are routinely flaunting our nation's borders.

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Justice, I believe, is an uncertain proposition. It can only be approximated. Truth must (first) be understood before Justice may be properly served. But how does anyone go about discovering (the) Truth? If Truth is predicated on Natural Law(s) understood as God's Eternal Law(s), because such laws (naturally) proceed from God, "hidden yet pre-determined," and if Humankind's problematical interpretation of God's Law has rendered its meaning less viable than what was arguably uncertain to begin with, then how or where does anyone proceed in recovering important points of reference? Conventional wisdom, forged by the (social) dynamics of customs and habits and experience, is insufficient. It remains, on a number of important levels, uniquely speculative. "Truth" or Wisdom, in the conventional sense, is an approximation of Truth's essential designs, although an important starting-point in providing reasonable guidelines in the manner a morally, well-ordered society should properly conduct itself, however subjective such notions oftentimes appear. "Truth," in this manner, is understood by a society's perception of Truth based on its intuitive reasoning of "eternal truths" or "innate and a priori truths whose denials are contradictions." (Rene Descartes). Eternal Truths have a proper "seat in our minds" however unclear. Humankind's collective assumptions provide a number of approximations because none of us "thinks" alike and

because not every (worldly) assumption is completely false as others are not completely true. In this manner, a society will often settle on some inscrutable "mean" or center point, conceded by popular opinion, that, however lacking the essential requirements of Truth, provides credible examples for others to follow. Legal covenants governing a civilized society, its rules of law, are based upon a system of morals and values agreed upon by the majority of its citizens seeking some level of assurance while avoiding extremes. I am not suggesting that Truth lies somewhere within some pre-defined center; that is to say, falling between opposite extremes since even extremes are oftentimes difficult to determine. I am merely pointing out that it's a safer proposition for those eager to avoid uncertain positions. The (consensual) center, in this case, is a convenience rather than a certainty. Justice, in principle, reflects the interpretation of laws in a fair and impartial manner or to the extent reasonable assumptions guide it toward the "Truth" or what is understood to be the Truth. Although certain forms of behavior or crimes are generally understood, their (underlying) motives or reasons (or Truth) are not always apparent; that is to say, not necessarily evident in themselves although they should be to critically minded individuals. (Why do we do the things we do?) In other words, we may be certain that a crime has been committed but uncertain as to the hidden motives that explain why the crime was committed. An even stickier proposition may surface whenever conflicts arise between the peculiar aspects of Justice and private designs or what is properly referred to by many as Conscience, that oftentimes bows to its "own" Truth.

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Talent, Motivation and (Good) Fortune are the primary ingredients for Success.

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Adam Smith's "Invisible Hand," that guides free and open markets, is not (necessarily) a benign one (nor was it intended to be) but rather an efficient one, whenever left to its own devises.

Obscene payrolls in professional sports have occasioned a generation of boorish athletes whose churlish behavior has rendered many unfit to manage, in a mature and appropriate manner, the requirements of popular acclaim. This is especially evident among those whose pecuniary origins are well below standard. Arrogance, the off-spring of Low Esteem, is (fortunately) balanced, however, by the professional demeanor of other (exceptional) athletes with little or nothing to prove, whose quiet tenor, and business like attitude, free of pretentious designs and excessive self-regard; that is to say, individuals who are comfortable with themselves and in themselves, who feel that they have nothing to prove and are (generally) less likely to be influenced by money and glamour; speaks volumes about the fundamental character of an emotional secure individual.

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Choice remains the cornerstone of a free and open society. The choices that its citizens make, however, confirms the extent of that society's (collective) moral and spiritual evolution or its regression, whatever the case may be.

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President Clinton recently signed into law, quite reluctantly I might add, a Welfare Reform bill, much to the chagrin of his party's leftleaning radical base. This measure, designed to restore the dignity and proper standing of individuals living on the peripheries of (productive) mainstream society is, of course, very unpopular among Liberal Democrats likely to perceive any self-contained, self motivated individual as (potentially) one less vote come election time. This bill, ushered by Republicans and Democrats from both houses of Congress, promises to reduce the nation's deficit by \$56 billion over the next seven years, not to mention increasing revenues that, everything being equal, will further reduce deficits over that period. This should be welcomed news to everyone except politicians troubled by the "infringement" of their political base. Be that as it may, welfare reform is all well and good provided that it is supported by educational and economic opportunities. The next step(s) will be to properly educate and train this prospective workforce in jobs that will hopefully offer every able-bodied individual an opportunity to earn a decent living.

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The inherent "right" to terminate one's (own) life as it relates to vague or questionable notions defining quality of life, introduces yet another dubious precedent as it relates to Choice, especially in rather gray areas where the decision to either perpetuate or curtail an individual's life has been proxied (sic) at a time when that individual could not possibly foresee the (uncertain) consequences of such decisions entrusted to the care of family members or friends (concealing underlying motives for authorizing such decisions, perhaps) or where a potential illness at some uncertain point in time or that individual's problematical reaction (to that illness) could not possibly be understood in advance; that is to say, until that individual is actually sitting on Death's doorstep. Once push comes to shove, however, and despite all the rhetoric, few individuals will option for death, whatever the extent of their illness. By then, it might be too late. I wonder whether (similar) "progressive" standards relating to a "happy" and "rewarding" life can be far away?

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Humankind's attraction to things that amuse or provide entertainment "value", however shallow or essentially superficial, must inevitably give way to a despondent search for happiness which many are (seemingly) unable to internalize in any meaningful sort of way. Wearied of life in its simplest forms, many seek pleasures in "things" that are oftentimes foolish and vain.

Opinion Surveys, I have found, are of little or no consequence. "Popular" Opinion does not dictate but is dictated to, rather.

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Infinity, in a numerical sense, does not boggle the mind. We can increase the numerical value of any number by simply adding another number to it. Adding 1 to some number will increase the numerical value of that number by 1. Repeat the process through infinity, if one is properly inclined. This equally supports the argument that Infinity is a mathematical certainty extending in two opposite directions. (Simply subtract a -1 to reduce the value of that same number by 1) It necessarily follows that the forward or backward extension of Time and Space, in the absence of some quantifiable or numeric value, is not a difficult concept to imagine. Space, within the limits of human understanding, cannot disappear into Nothingness. Nostalgia, I believe, is a natural reaction for those who, for a variety of reasons, are either unable to cope with their lives or regret the passing of their youth or are (simply) hopeless romantics. (I fall in the latter category)

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Our nation's political leaders are not photo copies of electoral viewpoints; neither was that the original intent of representative government. An elected official is duty bound to serve as the people's choice but not as their surrogate "proxy"; that is to say, not necessarily in accordance with their (own) intended designs. An elected official, however "duty" bound to promote the interests of his or her constituents, is equally bound, if not more so, to serve the interests of the nation in whatever manner such commitments might (otherwise) conflict with (narrower) parochial interests or concerns. The requirement of leadership, on every level, necessitates a willingness to make impartial decisions unencumbered by one's (own) personal feelings or of special interests that seek to influence political decisions for their own benefit. It goes without saying that local and national requirements should be measured fairly and impartially. Any politician who is either unwilling or (unable) to govern objectively; that is to say, in accordance with the requirements of public office, should step down. (Fat Chance!) No elected official, however, (it gets sticky) should be expected to lend his or her political (or moral) support, to questionable assumptions, however popular, that, from the standpoint of that politician's private viewpoints, are considered either unethical or immoral. (I am speaking here of social issues rather than economic or security issues) There are many notable examples which need not be elaborated. Matters relating to Conscience should be considered in light of that individual's privately held (core) beliefs. ("What good is it for a man to gain the whole world, yet forfeit his soul"?) Once again, these (internal) conflicts should give pause to whether or not that individual should otherwise tender his or her resignation. Everything being equal, however, our political leaders remain duty bound to serve, whenever possible, the interests of his or her constituents. In all other matters concerning national interests, however, each is obligated to address its pressing requirements in a

manner consistent with the needs of the nation.

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Having recently read about the passage of partial birth (whatever that means) abortion in today's newspaper, I firmly envision a day when some undetermined grace period, a year or two, perhaps, will be extended to "distraught" mothers who, unhappy with their "untimely" decision to have a child, will be offered an opportunity, an escape clause if you will, to "correct" their "mistake". During that period (or window of opportunity) mothers will be permitted to dispose of their infant/child in a manner adjudicated by law. Society, I believe, will need to secure a euphemism for infanticide, some inoffensive term or meaning that will neither (completely) assault the sensibilities of a civilized society nor trouble the Conscience. Perhaps something suggesting an under-developed or not fully "conscious" stage of development or unformed potential or irrational.....or what does it matter! In any event, I will leave such devious constructions to more creative types. Aren't such euphemisms, after all, the staples of any civilized society that doesn't really destroy its young? Or do they? Oh yes. I nearly forgot about the ancient Greeks!

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Knowledge lacking the proper shadings is an intellectually precarious proposition.

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An individual who fails to support his or her nation during a time of war under (the) transparent pretext of it being an "unjust war," or worse, provides (material) substance or (moral) support to his or her nation's enemies, under the guise of free expression, is guilty of Treason; and having breached the (social) compact, subsequently forfeits all of its essential rights.

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Television sponsors have traditionally targeted specific segments in specific markets at specific times in an effort to promote their products. What has become troubling in recent years, however, is the "in your face," oftentimes violent, antisocial messages cutting across all segments of the population that have become commonplace. Such (distractive) manners speak volumes about how "progressively" impolitic we have evolved as a society; reflected in part, by commercial advertisements likely to offend the sensibilities of many viewers who don't otherwise consider them "amusing."

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The Republican Party has been operating under the mistaken assumption that it will be able to successfully rally its conservative base, never traditional allies to begin with, by pushing for higher tax cuts. Although tax cuts promote investment, production and (economic) growth, not to mention spending, that fuels all of the above; and while such measures should be vigorously pursued whenever possible, the underlying crisis concerning most (critically minded) Americans is (correctly) understood as Moral rather than Economic; especially among social conservatives, the illegitimate offsprings of an Establishment Party who will not be easily swayed by the prospect of a few additional dollars in their wallets.

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Leisure capital, however vital in supporting "quality" standards of living, is not (the) primary factor that develops moral character, although it certainly helps not having to worry about where your next meal is coming from. A child "learns" from environmental examples; that is to say, a child formulates the necessary tools that promote sound moral character. It is therefore the responsibility of thoughtful parenting to establish a (morally) structural foundation autonomous within definable guidelines.

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.....conducive to developing upright moral attitudes whose benefits are (oftentimes) lost on families living in unfriendly environments under unfavorable (economic) conditionsalthough money has its advantages...it cannot impart (moral) values or increase confidence or enhance (self) esteem or teach an individual how to behave properly.....

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Altering an individual's material environment without giving proper pause to that individual's spiritual requirements will not necessarily guarantee the "good" life, for such an awakening must necessarily transform itself from within.

The eternal fires of Hell are too horrible to imagine! I would "prefer" thinking of Hell as the absence of God, which is sufficient punishment in itself.

Opponents of Capital Punishment seldom base their arguments on religious reasons, as evidenced by their cynical regard for the "unborn," but rather on fluent expressions predicated upon equivocating propositions that appear less hypocritical.

Timid and/or expedient politicians pandering to off the wall, lunatic fringe groups, whose members should have their collective heads examined, have lent legitimacy to peevish, ill-tempered designs in exchange for political party loyalty.

The frequency that a society (re)defines itself is a fairly accurate barometer of that society's collective anxiety.

Taking things one day at a time does not necessarily imply living for the moment but living for every moment that comes our way.

A society does not merely invest its capital in order to meet its present requirements. If that were the case, its proceeds would cease accruing for the benefit of future generations. Such thinking also applies in the manner a society overspends or accumulates debt. Its (supposed) advantages or encumbrances will be either "enjoyed" or endured severally; including those who weren't involved in the decision making process to begin with. Any society should properly consider the impact that its elections will have on future generations who will most likely be affected, in whatever manner, by that society's "binding" decisions.

The Rebuke of Conscience, I believe, confirms the existence of God. Unlike Physiology that monitors a body's physical and biochemical processes; that is to say, ensures that (the) body's (mechanical) processes are functioning properly or Genetics, that provides a "comprehensive" blueprint of an organism's biological "inheritance," Conscience remains uniquely indifferent to the Laws of Science, but not to the Laws of God. It's origin is spiritual, not organic. Its spiritual essence transcends material ascriptions. It transcends the local authority of conventional prescriptions. It informs our moral judgments. Self-Development is a distinctly unique process that, when managed properly, completes the requirements of Character by assessment, reflection and taking corrective action.

...... an individual may sometimes engage in conciliatory alliances between formal conventions and artificial (behavioral) constructs driven by impulse rather than essential designs...fashioning a hybrid identity that can no longer be properly called its own.....

.....the moral elasticity of "modern" societies defining the manner a society chooses to either define or transform itself as prescribed by the "times," liberated by variable designs or unshaken by "popular" traditions, reinterpreting or bringing to task the legitimacy of (erstwhile) creditable customs and practices, great civilizations laid to rest, the mercurial fortunes of the vanquished, of rudderless societies that have ceded their moral and intellectual authority...

.....when (the) judicial interpretations of constitutional laws consistently run counter to original intent or are interpreted in a manner seeking to promote some "hidden" (political) agenda, inevitably paves the road towards civil disobedience...

• • •

Should sound moral character be a civic requirement for higher political office, or any elective office for that matter? If an office seeker is perceived to be immoral in his or her private lives, should that individual's character deficiencies override the potential for good works?

• • •

Consumer spending conditioned by "easy credit" will one day leave the taxpayer with an enormous tab to settle.....unfortunately not

the recklessly extravagant who have grown accustomed to living beyond their means...or off their inheritances.

• • •

America's "expanding" middle class is merely an artificial construct synthesized by the fusion of "easy credit" and arbitrarily defined (economic) assumptions. The "growth" of the American middle class is generally defined by its spending habits and adopted lifestyles rather than capital or income. The buy now pay later approach to consumer spending has provided many families opportunities to imitate extravagant lifestyles that many could not otherwise afford if left to their own resources. A car in every garage and a television in every room is the stuff that middle-class dreams are made of! It is questionable, however, in light of diminishing incomes and job displacements precipitated by the emergence of cheap(er) labor from across our borders and the outsourcing of jobs overseas, not to mention a bubbling economy, that American families will be able to sustain its frenzied lifestyles once that bubble bursts.

Income disparities are not troubling per se, nor should they be, provided that increases in marginal family income(s) (based on performance) are comprehensive and that every (qualified) individual enjoys fair and equal access to market opportunities as they present themselves. (During periods of low unemployment, the lower monied [sic] classes have historically enjoyed the highest "marginal" gains in disposable income.) Problems arise, however, when economic opportunities are discriminatory. Such is, quite rightly, likely to provoke (social) unrest.

I feel that it is only natural that a parent should expect a reasonable rate of return on his or her "investment." Cold-Blooded as this may sound, parents have a vested interest in the future success of their children; especially parents who have dedicated a great deal of time, emotional capital and... money, on their children's spiritual, moral and intellectual development. Although it may be personally rewarding to see one's child financially secure, it is equally, (if not more so), important that that child develops into a model citizen, an example for others to follow, a kind and thoughtful human being, considerate of others and of sound (moral) character, an individual who serves his or her family, friends and the community in which he or she lives and works, with distinction. There is no placing a price tag on such exemplary qualities that, in my estimation, are the hallmarks of a truly "successful" individual. These parents, I would argue, have much to be proud of!

History should never be judged by contemporary standards lest we fall off the "shoulders of giants."

The Articles of Confederation were conceived as a federation of "United" States with each state retaining its own sovereignty and independence apart from assigned powers (otherwise) delegated to the federal government. This arrangement was a concession to skeptical opponents of centralized forms of government. Such fears were justified, in part, by the legitimate concerns of an incipient nation engaged in a war of independence against the British Monarchy. The "Articles" were created by chosen representatives from each of the states to secure the freedom, sovereignty and independence of an emerging nation. This system of government was unworkable, however, for a variety of reasons, not least of which was the federal government's inability to promote a national agenda, or any meaningful legislation for that matter, which might otherwise conflict with local interests. Government resolutions, requiring ratification by nine of the thirteen states, were, because of hardboiled regional rivalries and parochial prejudices, virtually impossible to adopt. In the final analysis, the main reason for its failure centered on the federal government's inability to levy taxes during times of national emergency or for public works or in order to advance the nation's burgeoning commercial interests. Such powers assumed far greater importance at a time when our fledgling nation was especially vulnerable to political intrigues foreign and domestic. I mention this to raise a point: that this form of government failed at a time when the American People, with few exceptions, were socially homogenized in the manner of language, culture, custom, habit and style, and, despite some variation in scriptural interpretation, predominately Christian in their outlook. In other words, its citizens, sectional differences aside, shared a common identity; that is to say, they were Americans. Of course, it was a different nation back then; a nation alienated by distance rather than ideology. I find it ironic, however, that while Americans have been brought closer together in time (and space), we appear more ideologically estranged in a manner unthought-of two centuries ago. I wonder whether as a nation we aren't slowly gravitating toward an ideological federation of sorts, prompted by our increasingly diverse customs and beliefs.

How is it that the absence of mail disappoints us, even some unsought for advertisement or unwanted invoice?

The scarcity of intelligent designs and absence of original ideas in both house of congress characterizes the sophomoric attitudes prevalent in modern politics.

• • •

Unimaginative concepts in automotive design(s) have rendered most automobiles, even higher-end models, extraordinarily common in appearance unlike the classic styles and elegance of yesteryear.

• • •

With few notable exceptions, perhaps, the most anyone can hope for is an approximation or likeness to Truth, not Truth, itself, however.

• •

The time has come and gone when a rough estimate of a worker's paycheck may be determined by the color of that person's "collar."

• • •

Language is the cornerstone that defines a Culture.

• • •

Reality concedes certain advantages to Art, whose (creative) boundaries are endless, at liberty to move freely and explore imaginary venues without regard to either space or time, where the laws of nature need not apply and irrational designs may (routinely) supersede logic and reason; whose artistic expressions need only answer to its own purposeful intentions.

• • •

Talent is either an acquired or natural aptitude; that is to say, it may be either acquired by the steady application of one's (own) determined efforts or quickened by natural currents. Although talent and its subsequent rewards(s) is praiseworthy, special consideration should be given, however, to individuals who have had to work (especially) hard in order to achieve their stated goals. Traditional Populism understood the limitations of the "common" man; cynically appealing to common sentiments through demagogy and "catch-all" politicking designed to get out the vote by "connecting" with the "people"; the factory worker or farmer, for example. Political oratory was embellished however simple in style. It appealed to passion rather than reason. It was neither pedantic nor donnish; over-stated on a number of levels, perhaps,.....everyone enjoys a good show every now and then.....however delivered in a manner that oftentimes resonated with the uninitiated. Such overtures, depending on the (underlying) designs of the speaker and the receptiveness of his audience, could be incendiary and volatile at times, not unlike (the) rhetorical expressions that pass for populism in our own times. The country was much simpler back then. Oratorical gamesmanship played well with crowds that were less sophisticated.....perhaps (even) more so than what one might encounter today, as difficult as it may be to imagine. Horse or common sense resounded well among agrarian and industrial segments of the population; especially backwater, rural areas or inner cities populated by blue-collar workers, immigrants and transients. Although I am not entirely certain where I'm heading with all this, it appears to me that most politicians on both sides of the political spectrum, perhaps more so among Conservatives, often display an annoying tendency of intellectualizing social and political points of arguments; that is to say, of talking over an audience rather than to that audience in a manner that resonates with average people. Every (political) movement, of course, requires its pundits. For Conservatives, a William Buckley, for example, to help define the moral and intellectual climate of conservative viewpoints. It also requires a Phyllis Schaffly, however, to clearly articulate those positions to less erudite, average audiences unlikely to have read "God and Man at Yale." The Conservative Movement, I believe, has yet to fully recognize the vast pool of potential converts, people who are principle conservatives in their everyday lives yet are seemingly unable to define themselves politically because their values are not being properly reinforced by the "mainstream" media or are not being "targeted" by conservative groups, including members of the Hispanic and African American communities, who, aside from their voting "habits", are otherwise socially conservative in many respects. These individuals need to be "nurtured" by simple, straight-talking "folk" clarifying traditionally conservative social ideologies that are unambiguous and intuitively understood however seldom reflected in polling booths. The African American and Hispanic Communities, in particular, are two such groups that offer an untapped source for Conservatives seeking to advance principle traditional values.

Knowledge lacking perspicacity is analogous to striking a book of matches without first understanding the principles of fire.

An Intellectual Coward, oftentimes encountered among the ranks of our political leaders, however becoming increasingly common among politically motivated senior management corporate (types), is an individual who side-steps or evades difficult controversial

positions that he or she may privately support; that many perceive, however, to be at variance with "popular" opinion... and what is even worse, vigorously championing such positions by embracing them as their own!

Sport is a mesmerizing distraction. Give the people sports and turn their attention away from unforeseen, consequential events that may inevitably impact their lives!

The foods that we eat should not be subject to gastronomic scrutiny as if some life or death proposition were weighing in the balance. An individual should acquiesce to the demands of his or her own appetite provided that such (private) decisions properly fall within the requirements of a well-balanced, nutritional diet......although it's permissible to indulge every so often!

The prophet Moses, upon receiving the Lord's Commandments on Mount Sinai, was instructed (by God) to return to the people and proclaim His Laws inscribed in "stone". He soon discovered that, during his uncertain absence, the people had morally corrupted themselves (of their own volition) by pledging their allegiance to Baal. "These are your gods O Israel, who brought you up and out of Egypt." Secularism, in modern times, may be properly considered the (metaphorical) false idol superseding the God of ancient traditions. Indifference to customary (religious) attitudes is a cause of grave concern; especially among practicing Christians and (Orthodox) Jews alike who perceive the gradual erosion of the underlying principles and teachings of proud (religious) traditions and its demoralizing effect on society; of Christians and Jews in name only who are routinely abandoning their churches and synagogues while shedding their religious customs and beliefs in alarming numbers to worship before the alter of the "golden calf".

In view of the fact that vehicular congestion on our major highways, especially during commuter rush "hour," understood as falling between the hours of three and eight at night, has become a common, everyday event that seldom seems to vary, why not simply prerecord radio (traffic) advisory updates, revising them every so often whenever some unlikely event should happen to occur such as the miraculous absence of traffic!

Reconciling the past in an (intellectually) honest... forthright manner... embracing... without bias or prejudice... or colored by revisionist designs... its remarkable achievements... as well as its inherent failings... however troubling to present sentiments...that no society is immune to sin......faithfully regarding its legends or myths....however narrowly or broadly perceived...that typically defines a society and its culture... nothing more or nothing less... while arousing the imagination....making possible "things", possible... that is a good thing....a hopeful sign... while coming to terms with its traditions.... that form the basis for the future ... approaching it with an open mind.... with an eye towards things to come....although...for some, perhaps...that is only natural... or selective memory or (post) determined arrangements or conveniences designed to appease troublesome assumptions.... rather than instruct ... neither should any progressive society purposely seek to undermine or underestimate....the historical limits of its traditions... that for better or for worse.... have made that society what it is and... what it hopes to become... that its historical conventions... receive a cordial reception... however considered... irrelevant... by present standards... (whose)... propositions are/were (however) ill-conceived or improperly managed... if in fact they were/are.... that society should seek to inject vitality... and meaning to novel expressions.... without rocking its customary foundations... the requirements of an evolving society....operating within the proper limits of change.

(Social) Conservatives are a nomadic group in search of a (political) home. Although Conservatives may be found among the ranks of both major political parties, shifting political and social alliances in recent years suggest a preference for the Republican Party; in whatever many of the rank and file have been oftentimes marginalized by Republican Party leaders. Although this "group" is routinely characterized by the "mainstream" media as right-wing fanatics, this enigmatic contingent, commonly referred to as "swing voters," have, more than any other "political" group, perhaps, decided the (recent) outcome of national elections. Widely pursued by both major political parties, this "faceless" group consisting of (social) synergies comprising a vast number of individuals from every walk of life, represent what President Nixon referred to as the "silent majority." Many came out in record numbers to support Mr. Nixon's presidential candidacy (1968) although once in office, his casual indifference, if not outright rejection of conservative principles, and the voters who supported them, betrayed the confidence of his faithful followers who had come to expect so much from him. Years later, President Bush (1988) would similarly disappoint them, although his breach with Conservatives was not entirely unforeseen by politically astute individuals suspicious of Mr. Bush's (putative) conservative credentials to begin with. Nevertheless, despite their many disappointments, Conservatives continue to be courted by the Republican Party and its vast array of chameleon "Conservatives" who routinely alter their political stripes once they assume public office. Many (Social) Conservatives were typically old-fashioned Democrats until the mid-sixties when the party made a calculated, if not risky decision to move to the left of its traditional base, utterly abandoning, without pretense, its populist principles in favor of centralized government platforms, (some might properly argue socialized), that ultimately demoralized its moderate base. In the process, the party sought to fashion new alliances with manufactured "victims" whose "needs" the party could (properly) administer to. It should also be kept in mind that subsequent generations had already started mainstreaming and that many individuals no longer considered the party's divisive platform appealing. Self-reliant as

a rule, many Southern Conservatives, having felt abandoned by the party of Jackson, would eventually seek friendlier quarters perceived (more) in keeping with their social and traditional values. It is arguable that the passage of the Civil Rights and Voting Rights Acts was the (final) straw that broke the (proverbial) camel's back although I'm not so certain considering that a greater proportion of Republicans rather than Democrats supported these measures. Nevertheless, race unquestionably influenced their decision although I believe there was something more to it than that; a feeling, perhaps, that workingmen and woman were somehow being marginalized; that is to say, their religious, moral and social values were being discredited. Be that what it may, having weighed the possibility of a third-party (George Wallace) and finding it untenable or perhaps untimely might be the better word, many (Conservatives) sought refuge in the Republican Party who many believed reflected their values. Many, however, have become sadly disillusioned by rhetorical assurances that seldom seem to live up to their promises. Pleased perhaps, by the prospect of attracting a new coalition of voters. (Yankee) Republicanism, traditionally urbane in its demeanor, was nevertheless determined to preserve its (own) political identity that generally embraced liberal viewpoints as they related to domestic and social issues. Many Republicans, especially Northeastern Republicans, generally favored New Deal programs, Welfare and Civil Rights reforms. The only difference separating either political party was the notion that Republicans believed they could "deliver the goods" more efficiently than Democrats. (Not exactly a match made in heaven!) Rockefeller Republicans, in particular, have never really warmed up to these apostatizing (sic) "upstarts." Their resentment has manifested itself repeatedly over the years as Conservative influence within the party has gradually increased in proportion to its rapidly increasing numbers. If the truth were known, however, Yankee Republicanism has never been (instinctively) enthusiastic with conservative viewpoints; traditionally progressive and libertarian as many of the party faithful were/are in their social and religious attitudes. In this respect most Moderate to Liberal Republicans vary little with their Democratic counterparts. I am certain that had it not been for well-organized grassroots efforts by Conservatives in support of Life, the "Warren" Party would have jumped at the first opportunity to advance Abortion Rights long before the Democrats turned it into a campaign issue. It's nearly Machiavellian the manner in which this "desirable" although not so favored group continues to be courted by the Republican Establishment. The Reagan Revolution vindicated the Conservative Movement. Whether or not it will be able to maintain its momentum is problematical in view of a me-tooism mentality that has become firmly embedded in its thinking. Another problem confronting a number of disillusioned conservatives is that for years many were on the outside looking in whereas many have now become a part of the political "establishment;" that is to say, they subsequently sold out." It remains to be seen whether or not their leaders will remain reliable advocates of conservative causes or become submersed under the currents of political mainstream ideologies. Be that what it may, their numbers can no longer be ignored or casually dismissed and besides, who's to argue that some progress hasn't been made despite so much party in fighting and intrigue. Perhaps Conservatives are expecting too much too soon. Thirty years of time and effort, however, should immediately disqualify the notion of any third-party political movement in whatever manner it may appeal to "hard-core" types. The Democratic Party's socialist agenda is not a viable alternative, however. Conservatives have established a base of operations that will hopefully advance and preserve their social and moral directive. I suppose the Republican Party serves as good a place as any. Besides, where else can they turn to for an occasional tax-cut? And there you have it!

......an agenda that seeks to discredit traditional assumptions...sowing seeds of discontent...especially among the working classes...in industrialized societies...especially...restless people...the disgruntled masses...the uprooted....contrived victimhood... class consciousness...(often)...more imaginary than real...questionable propositions...that go unchallenged.... yielding higher dividends for (social) nihilists...and deconstructionists......hateful customs... detested...for their own sake.....reshaping existing covenants, rejecting "tired" traditions...encouraging a single-minded purpose... enlisting abstract designs...however unworkable or untenable or undesirable or unstable.... compensating privileges and preferences... conferred by the self-appointed guardians of the public weal... costly investments yielding improbable returns...that must inevitably (morally) bankrupt that society...once enterprise has been dampened and initiative hammered beyond recognition...has the transformation of centralized forms been completed...

An individual cannot always control the currents of his or her own thoughts although it lies within that individual to critically examine the appropriateness of such thoughts or ideas that might otherwise influence his or her behavior in an unseemly manner.

Television sitcoms are sending mixed messages to young audiences. Although the purpose of television is to entertain (and instruct) and to provide a meaningful outlet for a child's (incipient) imagination, it should do so in a manner that correctly distinguishes between what is real from implausible or uncertain (impressions) that that child normally receives; that is to say, that otherwise obscure what is real from what is not real (or make-believe) but only appears to be real whenever taken out of context. Wisecracking, precocious young children superseding the worldly "wisdom" of their well-meaning but oftentimes bumbling parents, more often than not, the father; portrayed as "agreeable", however (somewhat) pompous, over-bearing, self-regarding and someone who just "doesn't get it." Awkward, juvenile attempts at "connecting" with their children is inconsistent with real life situations facing most parents who generally have to deal with a broad variety of (uncertain) thoughts and emotions that oftentimes alienate young children coming age. Most require the steady assurances that come with experience, not to mention proper role modeling. Children require the guidance and unconditional support of parents who should properly behave like parents rather than the lingering adolescents oftentimes portrayed on television. Fifties sitcoms did not necessarily reflect, but sought to project, rather, the ideal prototype of the "typical" American Family that in many respects was atypical of families in general. Such programs often featured a traditionally strong-minded, however loving, thoughtful father who was firm yet approachable. He wasn't perfect, however. Mom would sometimes have to come to the

rescue and bail him out. Even a father could learn a thing or two from his children; examples he had forgotten as a boy but remembers later on in life through his children. Nevertheless, our natural failings, common among those of us with "feet of clay," is a condition that even the wisest among us must occasionally endure. However apparent, they never dampened a child's love and respect...and gratitude. As indicated above, such programs also featured a wise and "knowing" mother who, although ceding "authority" to the father, knew when it was the right moment to step in and run interference for her children....and her husband, for that matter. She did so in a firm, yet unobtrusive manner that did not attempt to undermine the father's parental authority. After all, wasn't he the "head" of the household? However unrealistic such programming may appear by conventional standards, they remain real in the sense that they underscore the importance of what many contemporary children are often lacking; meaningful parent/child relationships. What audiences are routinely being exposed to, however, are parents portrayed as unaware, uninformed, unstable in their own manner and out of touch, much to the chagrin of their complacently smug and obnoxious children who always seem to "Know Better."

Ignorance, I believe, is a (conditioned) state preferable to Partial knowledge. The former is merely "harmful" to the individual who may be otherwise perceived as being uneducated or uninformed or deficient in some manner whereas the latter oftentimes tries to pass itself off as Consummate Knowledge irrespective of its (inherent) limitations or (uncertain) effects.

History must one day hold this generation, along with our feckless Congress, accountable for the transgressions of the present (Clinton) Administration. Mr. Clinton's betrayal of public confidence, too enumerable to mention, is a troubling reminder of the Republic's moral regression and indifference to standards of decency that its citizens need only look in the mirror to understand why this man has never been brought to task!

Events shaping our lives are sometimes owing to accident or chance although more often than not by our determined actions or.....assignable causes!

We mourn (externally) for others, such as the passing of a loved one. We grieve, (internally) however, for ourselves.

Walking along the streets of Manhattan with some friends the other day and seeing so many homeless people sleeping on city sidewalks and in narrow passageways bundled up in cardboard boxes to shield them from the elements was a deeply troubling and humbling experience for someone like myself who has been very fortunate in life. That afternoon served as an unpleasant reminder of how their presence not only demoralizes us as individuals but diminishes us as a (civilized) society.

A society in moral and spiritual decline seldom fulfills its constructive designs although it often provokes cries in the wilderness among remarkable men and women not quite ready to surrender what remaining capital that society has squandered.

Essential Nature is transforming, Human Nature is not.

• •

Believing is not Knowing although the (casual) relationship "uniting" the two oftentimes encompasses a broad variety of assumptions consistent with an individual's (private) belief system internalized by Reason and Intuition or externalized by Experience and Custom; each secured by Faith.

Wars fought with guns are (oftentimes) harmful to the body whereas wars of ideas are (sometimes) damaging to reputations.

I would like to express some (scattered) thoughts about Dress: Dress defines a society and its people; its customs and habits. Now call me old-fashioned but I subscribe to the notion that the way a person dresses says a lot about that person and how that person regards himself...and (perhaps) other people, as well. Our society's "casual" (hey!) indifference to proper attire has rendered formal/casual distinctions obsolete. Dress typically structured an individual within the context best "suited" (no pun intended) for some specific or special occasion. Dress, because of its "uniformity" (Ha Ha) was once considered society's equalizer; that is to say, Dress transcended Class. (An individual did not have to be a person of means to dress appropriately.) Dress did not need to be stylish or elegant but conform, rather, to some "suitable" (Ouch!) standard. Some people take pride in "slumming"; especially the well to do affected by an abstract need to "connect" with the "people" ("Hey, I'm just a regular guy like anybody else") while others, on the other hand, enjoy flaunting conventions for their own sake whereas others (may) feel that "proper" attire is no longer relevant and then there are those who have simply developed lazy habits.

An (evolving) society should seek to promote wholesome dialogue among its citizens. Familiarity with other cultures and customs other than our "own" helps facilitate the orderly transition of a pluralistic society. Its open-mindedness, however, should neither compromise nor invalidate the exceptional character which makes that society unique. That is to say, (the) parts should seek to accommodate (the) whole.

There exists an associative order endemic in (any) society; that is to say, of associations prescribed by custom where the "servant" shall abide the "master," the "lesser," the "greater." Such relationships are observed on a variety of levels as for example between parent and child, teacher and pupil, doctor and patient, priest and congregate or any number of relationships that typify the everyday workplace; obedient to (the) laws governing conventional wisdom and knowledge, experience and natural endowment tempered by amity and goodwill where prudent influences abiding in good faith seek to promote the (mutual) benefit of the respective parties involved.

The rescission of loyalty in the workplace has left many individuals little recourse other than maintaining allegiance to the specific requirements of their vocation, for such fidelity to an individual's chosen profession ultimately defines, in part, the character of that individual whose exceptional integrity and commitment to duty remain its primary rewards.

Our Creator has a vested "interest" in His Creation for whose (spiritual) well-being He has not left nothing owing to Chance; for creation remains, in its fullest measure, an extension of the creator, encompassing all that is considered good, for no one willingly creates something that he or she would otherwise consider unworthy of his or her (creative) efforts or without some (ultimate) purpose in mind. In this manner are Deist assumptions that God created the universe however did not interfere with its internal affairs, discredited.

The Saints provided many notable examples on how to lead a virtuous existence however troubling such examples of piety, benevolence and kindness are for modern times. Although, as practicing Christians, we should make every effort to follow their commendable examples, it is inappropriate, (perhaps), that we plead their divine intervention since these petitions, as they inevitably relate to our eternal salvation, are best directed toward the Final Arbiter who, alone, must ultimately determine the merits of our entreaties.

When popular opinion rejects discredited or controversial propositions considered morally vague or of questionable value, the stewards of "conventional" wisdom will (inevitably) reintroduce their highly regarded viewpoints, less obtrusively, perhaps, although in strict accordance with their own privately held beliefs in a manner designed to either mislead or misinform the public.

Guilt is a solitary phenomenon understood by a troubled Conscience. Shame is the unmasking of Guilt that seeks its own redemption. In other words, Shame is a cry for forgiveness. That an individual has been exposed is not necessarily a bad thing. Humankind would be more inclined towards respecting its native differences if not for all the (troublesome) time and energy (otherwise) spent emphasizing its differences to begin with!

Character no longer appears to be the single overriding issue concerning most Americans accustomed to voting with their wallets...routinely electing into office men and women perceived to be morally flawed...seemingly of no important issue to the average voter, however...in this manner... character deficiencies are (otherwise) outweighed by promising fortunes... cynical and indifferent to moral designs has the electorate devolved...where behavior is considered a "private" matter...in a society whose disturbing tolerance to unprincipled and unseemly behavioral attitudes has increased in proportion to the size of its (financial) portfolios.

Who was it that said adversity brings the best out in people? I sometimes wonder whether or not what our country (really) needs isn't another good old-fashioned Depression! Our nation was once a whole lot poorer back then. Nevertheless its people were, in many ways, far more humane and considerate of others. Perhaps I am being unduly harsh in my criticism of American Materialism. How about a Virtual Depression, just a partial glimpse, perhaps?

The Republican Congress, in its infinite wisdom, has recently proposed a measure that would allow the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico a Plebiscite for Statehood. The party's leadership is hoping that this questionable electoral strategy will curry favor with Latino Voters. Republican leaders are operating under the mistaken assumption that the Latino "Community" is a uniform political and social body. "Latino" is an artificial construct comprised of Spanish speaking people each possessing their own (ethnic) identity, united in some degree by language, perhaps, that is insufficient in itself to achieve the party's broad-based political objective of "getting out" the Latino Vote. This one size fits all approach to politicking also ignores another very important fact; that most second and third generation Latinos have comfortably settled into the American Mainstream and that, not unlike most Americans, ideas matter the most. Aside from encouraging a scenario that promises to increase the national debt, Republicans should also be cognizant of their own diminishing fortunes once Puerto Rico routinely begins electing Democrats into office once this measure has been ratified. What's next on the agenda, proposed Statehood for The District of Columbia that will further increase the number of Democratic seats in both houses of Congress on the chance of attracting potential African American voters? This bill is without question a lose/lose proposition for the Republican Party which would better serve its (own) political interests and the interests of the nation by attracting party support on the quality of its (own) party principles rather than its transparent pandering for problematical votes.

Not unlike Iraq, America had to deal with its own domestic factions (Tories) who favored conciliation with Brittan and were willing to provide aid and comfort to its majesty's armed forces for economic reasons. In this manner the revolutionists had to contend with contentious factions both foreign and domestic. In fairness to the Iraqis, however, the Colonists, properly Americans, enjoyed the singular advantage of democratic traditions (as did Germany); however unbalanced both governments were at times. The Iraqis, on the other hand, have not (yet) enjoyed such traditions other than the (remote) examples of other nations whose democratic customs appear vaguely uncertain and undesirable, perhaps. I am not certain that Iraq would be able, at least in the short term, to manage its newfound freedom(s) should such an opportunity present itself if and when Saddam Hussein has been forcefully removed from power, replaced by Who or What? Such a scenario is reminiscent of Imperial Japan, a nation lacking historical democratic traditions. The aftermath of the Second World War was a period of adjustment for victor and vanquished alike. I mention this in passing because the day may very well come when such decisions will have to be made by parliamentary government or proxied by other nations. History has oftentimes shown that however primitive a culture or underdeveloped a society, most people are generally receptive to freedom. Freedom, however, is an acquired habit. I believe that this rule equally applies to Iraqis if given the chance.

When principles of non-violence are either self-contained or practiced unconditionally under circumstances (otherwise) calling for a measured response, (sound) judgment and common sense appealing to the requirements of a peaceful, well-ordered society that every citizen (otherwise) owes an obligation, and whose conspicuous merits, perhaps laudable in some instances, however questionable at other times, and where (such) natural impulses are routinely rejected, even more remarkably when Property and Person and at times the Nation, are at risk by (anti-social) individuals determined to provoke harm; weighs in the balance, and where (institutional) recourse is problematical or uncertain, an (individual) is required, inasmuch as it lies within that individual's capacity to do so, to discourage such annoyances as they may present themselves to that individual as well as that individual's family and friends, however contrary to that individual's "nature," lest that individual's misplaced pacifism further encourage mischief makers and bullies alike, by providing license to habitually upset the harmony and safety of private and public concerns as it (otherwise) suits their primitive whims.

• • •

Revenue Sharing is similar in some respects to Progressive (Income) Tax Rates in the manner that the greater the payout, the less likely the Return.

• • •

Inflation occurs when the (marginal) increase in consumer spending (Demand) exceeds the (marginal) increase in the production of goods and services (Supply); that is to say, more dollars chasing fewer goods and services.

• • •

Never dwell on the future; anticipate and plan for it, instead!

• • •

(Our) failure to attain (our) full spiritual, moral and intellectual potential as human beings places a heavier burden on those entrusted to (our) care, especially (our) children who, requiring the best instruction possible, predicated upon the highest formative examples, otherwise suffer a grave disservice.

• • •

The phenomenon of public opinion, or its volatility, I should say, is rooted, in part, in the (composite) uncertainties of a society's moral, spiritual and intellectual positions that are often unclear, if not incomprehensible to individuals who have never been properly instructed to learn or to think critically about what they have learned or make proper sense out of what they have learned; whose "thinking" (otherwise) lacks keen insight into the (essential) nature of the things they have "learned". In other words, "right reasoning." Many individuals susceptible to teeming influences extending beyond their capacity to assimilate what is being conveyed and in what manner and why, for that matter, entirely dependent has the public become on its media "mouthpieces" commissioned to do their thinking for them in a fruitless attempt at sorting out unintelligent pieces of information that, taken collectively, are even more meaningless, thereby frustrating further efforts to attain (true) knowledge while unsettling core beliefs.

•••

Everyday language has become vulgarized; less refined, functional, (however) lacking structure and style; expressing ideas (however) lacking the underlying essentials that (otherwise) provide quality and meaning to our thoughts.

• • •

The passage of time should never diminish the highest regards a society retains for its historical heritage.

• • •

Ancient cultures firmly embraced the customs and traditions of its venerable past in a manner unlike (modern) evolutionary designs underscoring a society's social development; that is to say, adapting to changing values; especially pluralistic societies that seem to be constantly redefining themselves. I believe that this was due, in part, to the homogeneous nature of their culture(s) that remained (relatively) stabile for centuries. I am referring to their (highest) core traditions remarkable for their constancy.

• • •

....novel or varied expressions... "Intruding".....conventional mainstream.... "Enforcing"preferential viewpoints...and... prejudices....pressing requirements..... overriding (historical) issues..... rejecting.... uncertain customs....meaningless.....irrelevant....more so.....native born...restless...uncomfortable......(historical) assumptions.... inconsonant...present fashions.... (inevitably) superseding.... (Society's).... storied traditions.... legendary characters.....provisional champions... sympathetic....amenable to.... modern conventions.... marginalizing... historical reference.... hastening... new heroes to admire.

Ideas are formed (by) the mind....they are influenced....however....by conditioning!

• • •

As purses keep rising through the roof, the modern-day boxer can no longer be properly considered a "prize" fighter.

• • •

Inorganic foodstuffs have seemingly acquired a numinous value.

• • •

There is a very disturbing trend evolving towards a problematical "new age" spiritualism or modern day Gnosticism superseding official church doctrines and teachings considered inflexible and dated for undisciplined individuals pursuing an easier "religion" grounded on an individual's (own) considered opinions; whereby that individual becomes the guardian of its (own) conscience, its (own) road to salvation, its (own) judge; in a word, its (own) custom-made god answerable to its (own) self.

• • •

I would like to express a few thoughts about Equality and Freedom: Equality implies an objective standard or rule of measurement; for example, two individuals equal in height or weight or of "comparable" intelligence or athletic ability (however imprecise) or other material objects or propositions subject to precise measurement like spatial dimension, volume or geometric quantities. The same principle holds that "all men are created equal": that is to say, that each enjoys Equal (Natural) Rights as ordained by God, (however problematical in practice). In this manner, a quality perceived, if not completely understood, is considered subjective and therefore resistant to precise measurement; that is to say, (sentient) ideas do not share (intrinsic) equal value or meaning. Such principles, as they relate to Equal (Civil) Rights, for example, are recognized by social and political conventions allowing every individual, who is legally registered, for example, the right to vote or a licensed driver the right to own or operate an automobile or a prospective home buyer, with sufficient capital or credit, the right to purchase a house or a condo or whatever falls within his or her means. These inalienable rights offer expression to multi-lateral decisions conforming to the right of every citizen to make comparable decisions. Equality, however, does not (necessarily) imply Freedom although some might (otherwise) argue by the examples indicated above; that every individual is allowed certain latitude (or Freedom) in making personal decisions. Equality, unlike Freedom, however, implies a condition of "Sameness". Individuals held in detention are Equal; that is to say, they are all (equally) imprisoned although some may enjoy certain privileges that others may not, but that is besides the point inasmuch as even the favored among them cannot properly be called Free. The same argument (once) held for slaves who were Equally degraded as men and women. Some labored in fields while the "favored" among them were retained as house servants. These people, it might be argued, are/were Equal in status (as prisoners or slaves) but not Equal in (relative) rank. Equality, therefore, is not necessarily conditioned by Freedom although Freedom oftentimes conditions Equality. Any number of individuals, as indicated above, enjoying equal rights and privileges consonant with the legal requirements of a free society, may differ in a variety of ways; materially, intellectually, physically, morally, spiritually, by temperament, motivation, its expectancies, the list is endless. These differences must necessarily circumscribe or limit, whether influenced by natural designs, circumstance or purposeful intent, the decisions that (we) make or don't make, or are unable to make, for that matter; for example, a below-average student seeking enrollment at an Ivy League College or a modest wage earner looking to buy a home in a pricey neighborhood. It might be properly argued that we are all Equal to the extent that we are all Free, but that we are unequal or limited in the manner we are able to exercise our freedoms. Equality of Opportunity is the closest any free society may hope to attain "Equal Freedom." For a variety of reasons, however, it remains problematical that equal access (if such really exists) will achieve equal results.

• • •

(Social) Revolutions reach a fevered pitch whenever the traditional barriers to Change (once) considered impregnable are gradually breached, further arousing popular expectations.

• • •

Perfection will not, indeed, cannot transform (itself) into anything less than what it already is. It does not aspire to anything that is higher than (itself) because nothing higher exists. It does not require anything other than (itself) to complete what has already been completed or fulfill a potential that has already been recognized. It is self-contained, wanting or needing nothing. For this reason, would it make any sense that it would purposely seek a condition or state of "being" other than (itself)?

• • •

The shameless remain impervious to their (internal) indiscretions!

• • •

News is (generally) unbiased. Those reporting the news, however, (generally) are!

••

Although marijuana use may not necessarily lead to harder drugs, it is certain, however, that those habituated to hard drugs started off on "softer" ones. A circular argument might be appropriate: Although some (undetermined) percentage of motorists have never been involved in a traffic accident, it is a 100 percent certainty, however, that any motorist that has, owns and operates a vehicle.

• • •

Any individual who decides to become a member of some community must (necessarily) subordinate a measure of his or her private interests in support of broader, public interests.

• • •

A mind's pre-conceived designs oftentimes determine what an individual sees, thinks or feels or believes he or she sees, thinks or feels or what he or she may wish to see, think or feel. In other words, Reality is oftentimes what an individual "expects" it to be.

• • •

Success, I believe, enjoys its own (inestimable) rewards based on an individual's internalized set of core values or beliefs. As a rule, every individual achieves some measure of success in keeping with his or her own purposeful designs, however modest or exceptional. Many of us, however, are oftentimes influenced by (uncertain) material standards that (otherwise) inform our judgment. This is especially true in today's competitive environment where "success" is generally measured in terms of (material) affluence(s), that, for comparative reasons, is oftentimes difficult to determine who, for example, is "successful" or who is not or who falls somewhere in between or whose fortunes are rising or falling and how such measures are determined by questionable premises that (otherwise) limit our perception of (material) success.

. . .

When standards of success are reduced to (material) things, they must necessarily limit our understanding of success. Success is oftentimes informed by Culture. In biblical times, a successful man was measured by the size of his cattle or vineyards. In oriental cultures an engineer was held in higher esteem than the physician. During the Renaissance, the revival of classical art and literature was considered the highest intellectual and (moral) achievement. (The Renaissance Man) For others, loving God and following His Commandments is the (true) measure of success. "What does it profit a man to gain the whole world and lose his soul?" On a strictly material basis, however, wealth accumulation is considered the highest standard of success that partially explains why the stock market crash of (1929) caused many investors to commit suicide or why many of us grow despondent whenever our financial portfolios or 401K's suffer a setback. The true standard of success, it would seem, is "When your heart is at peace and content. When you have positioned yourself to follow your dreams. When you are happy." (Wiki)

• • •

Material Designs are self-limiting inasmuch as they oftentimes fail to consider every (human) possibility; that is to say, an open, discriminating mind receptive to all (reasonable) things that (properly) completes an individual.

• • •

What may be determined with some degree of certainty, however, is that an individual having acquired x amount of material substance; that is to say, accumulated more or less property or wealth than some other individual, has achieved more or less (material) success than that other individual although that individual's success on balance, in the absence of underlying measures, remains problematical.

• • •

Success, on a variety of levels, implies achieving some desirable goal; owning a modest home or receiving high grades in school or financial success or achieving popularity or (perhaps) having "made a difference" in someone else's life.

•••

Success may also be defined as having achieved a stated goal.

• •

It may be reasoned that an individual who enjoys more of something is more successful than someone who has less of that same something who otherwise desired more of that something. In this manner it may be correctly argued that the former is more successful by having exceeded the mutual designs of the latter.

• • •

That an individual may possess more of a particular something than another individual desiring that same something is limited or qualified, however, by their (private) designs; that is to say, each may be equally satisfied with the quantity each acquired of that same something.

• • •

We may furthermore amend our argument by stating that someone who has more of something is "better off" than that someone who has less of that same something. It raises the question, however, what does "better off" really mean? Who is to argue that someone with more of something is comparatively speaking, better off than someone possessing less of that same something?

• • •

Another problem arises once we begin engaging in the how much or how little or how much is enough or not enough circular (type) arguments. Such questions must further frustrate our efforts in defining (material) success that oftentimes relate, to some degree, to private decisions revolving around (the) individual. If (some) indeterminate (amount), that individual may conceivably go on endlessly chasing his or her own tail which is hardly the formula for success. Perhaps the (materially) successful person is an individual who requires nothing more or nothing less than what is needed. Perhaps this is too simplistic a view. In the final analysis, lacking some fixed standard by which to measure (material) success, such arguments must necessarily remain problematical. I have limited these observations to (material) success. There are other forms of success whose nature is internally defined. Unfortunately such "abstracts" are seldom apparent to those who, in compliance with conventional practices, are exclusively committed to pursuing material things for their own sake. These individuals are sadly diminished; however, I will not argue the point here.

• • •

An individual's sexual orientation is a private matter that should be confined to the bedroom, behind closed doors. (This explains why bedrooms have doors to begin with.) His or her attitude towards sex involves intimate choices best left to that individual and that individual's (consenting) partner to decide. Sexual preferences do not require the ratification of public opinion whose "consent", in any event, would (merely) constitute formal acquiescence after the fact. This is especially true in today's (modern) environment where "evolving" standards are generally tolerant of unusual or "quirky" (sexual) manners (otherwise) considered remarkable by traditional standards provided they neither openly flaunt nor challenge a society's established customs. Such is often the case, however, with a number of "reform" minded individuals or groups harboring a decided agenda or with political or social axes to grind. Everything being equal, however, the average citizen is oftentimes content to live and let live, to "accept" what it may otherwise perceive as odd or peculiar in a manner consistent with an individual's right to privacy. Such includes sexual behavior that some might otherwise consider, in other respects, inappropriate. (Note that I am referring to "consenting" adults of legal age!)

• • •

....if not for obnoxious attitudes seeking neither tolerance nor acceptance, per se, however the purposeful restructuring, rather, of traditional customs and practices considered a threat to emerging (designs) seeking authentic parity......

• • •

Critical Thinking, given its essential ambiguities, must ultimately return to Questions of Faith.

• • •

Moral Relativism is incompatible with Core Beliefs.

•••

What recourse remains for Youth whose Elders have rejected the Moral Argument?

• • •

The House of Representatives recently voted to begin impeachment proceedings against William Jefferson Clinton, a wicked man indeed!

• • •

Honor and Virtue oftentimes emerge during times of social and political unrest whereas Rank and Privilege are likely to accrue during moments of relative ease and tranquility.

• • •

Law(s) must necessarily embody a moral premise otherwise its judicial interpretations will fail to inspire confidence among the people.

• • •

(Self) Discipline is "the" essential ingredient required for Learning. It's "the" controlling or (motivating) factor needed in achieving Erudition (or any other goal for that matter).

• • •

When the Rule of Law is uneven; that is to say, arbitrarily applied, its inconsistencies or lack of uniformity must necessarily call its legitimacy into question.

••

An individual who sleeps on average eight (8) hours a day as opposed to someone who (otherwise) finds six (6) hours sufficient, sleeps 8.3 percent more than the latter. Projected over an average lifespan of eighty (80) years, the former has (potentially) squandered 6¹/₂ years of his or her life in bed. Oh precious time!

Perhaps nothing is more unsettling to unprincipled men and women than being in the company of virtuous people.

• • •

Urban (traffic) Congestion over the last half century has exposed the improvidence of infrastructural planning that have become inefficient before their time. Such are the (underlying) misconceptions of myopic designs that "visualize" future requirements within present time frames. These miscalculations will need to be corrected in the future, especially when rapid population growth will eventually transform many of our rural areas into bustling towns and cities.

••

There are many of us who are seemingly incapable of performing a kindly deed for its own sake but for the sake, rather, of anticipatory rewards or promises; such purposeful acts of kindness and goodwill have become "means to an end".

• • •

.....reciprocation of some kindly deed in exchange for some other kindly deed offered in proportion to what each party hopes to receive in return......

• • •

Television has engendered a generation of Americans lacking imagination or (creative resourcefulness). Such (thoughtless) attitudes are (especially) apparent among certain segments of our Youth who have grown indifferent, if not impervious, altogether, to nuance, irony and wit or subtle designs or delicate shadings that (otherwise) require a receptive imagination rather than taking "everything" at their face value, (as many of them seem to do); conditioned as their minds often are by the requirements of material "evidence" and visual "proofs"; neither able to draw inferences nor reach (meaningful) conclusions from underlying sources, opting, instead, for the path of least (perceptual) resistance.

• • •

Unless an individual has been properly tested, it remains a matter of opinion how he or she might (otherwise) behave or react under trying circumstances or conditions that he or she has not been properly exposed to. (Adversity ultimately defines the limits of Character)

• • •

Liberals seem to need a "guilt" check every so often in order to restore discipline among the ranks!

• • •

Humankind uncovers what God's Wisdom inspires.

• • •

In anticipation of tomorrow's (December 17th 1998) scheduled impeachment hearings, the Clinton Administration has authorized "preemptive" air strikes against selected Iraqi targets in "response" to weapons (inspection) violations sanctioned, but nominally enforced, by the United Nations following the Persian Gulf War. A politically opportune, diversionary tactic orchestrated by the cynical Mr. William Jefferson Clinton!

• • •

Sound coaching principles (generally) inspire winning attitudes. Good coaching is limited, however, by a team's willingness to receive proper instruction. Such is unlikely in today's marketing environment where coaches will oftentimes receive the ax before a highly profiled, highly salaried, highly flawed and underachieving athlete is either called on the carpet or benched for failing to perform up to his or her capabilities or who (routinely) places his or her ego ahead of the team. In this manner, owners seek to protect their "investments" by making sacrificial lambs of those whose job it is to properly teach and instill team discipline.

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What is it exactly that constitutes a "classless" society; an elimination of (income) disparities, achievement and its highest rewards, uniform thoughts and opinions, a recasting of traditional social arrangements, cordial social environments or... rude and boorish behavior, lack of (social) etiquette, mindless conformity, intellectual mediocrity, sameness, "equality," a rejection of lofty ideals, a cynical disregard for the natural order of things, Utopia?

• • •

When language lacks cognitive or measured expression, its symbols faintly perceived or understood; it falls on enlightened custom to settle its intended meaning.

• • •

Which of the two constitutes the greater evil, the emergence of (widespread) social immorality or a society's casual indifference to

unsavory practices (otherwise) considered offensive to binding moral principles? It may be reasonably argued that both attitudes are equally reprehensible. Moral Excellence must necessarily recede in proportion to a society's collective reluctance to either admonish or reprimand inappropriate or disagreeable behavior by (otherwise) setting the proper examples for others to follow.

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A foundation that is (intellectually) hollow or (morally) unsound must weaken its structural integrity. Such, appropriately applies to families and to the institution of marriage.

• • •

"He who is without sin cast the first stone" is a warning to (all) sinners who would otherwise stand in judgment of others. This admonishment does not recall the forgiveness of sin(s) but the penitent sinner, rather. "Go and sin no more."

• • •

The problematical assumption of Free Speech in our society, I believe, demands broader (interpretive) judgments than at any (other) time in our nation's history. Freedom of Expression is testing the limits of our collective tolerance like never before. The elastic demands imposed on our courts by modern impressions advancing the (unlimited) right to free expression have stretched its traditional boundaries in a manner that the Founding Fathers could never have possibly envisioned given the moral climate of the times in which they lived.

. . .

Individuals, who are thoughtful and/or unaffected by extraordinary circumstances, never allow unusual designs to influence the manner that they (otherwise) perceive themselves; always mindful of changing fortunes likely to alter the course of their lives in one manner or another.

• • •

Imagination complements Learning. An engineering student, for example, may acquire practical skills like mathematics or statistics and (subsequently) apply that knowledge to some specific design conceived by artful planning or that individual's (own) creative resourcefulness. Such inventions, however, stem from inherent qualities that cannot be acquired from book learning.

• • •

America's political landscape needs a heavy dose of "Progressive Conservatism" prepared to challenge the socio/economic assumptions of both major political parties that seem to have lost their vision in recent years; especially among Liberal Democrats and "Moderate" Republicans whose anachronistic ideas about the role of government and the people it purportedly serves has transformed their political platforms into a tireless repetition of recycled platitudes that no longer seem to meet modern requirements; especially those of working men and women. Conservatives need to provide (viable) economic alternatives to bilateral assumptions whose differences are oftentimes formal rather than essential. Conservatives should continue to encourage tax reductions and operating efficiencies that will further reduced government spending accruing to the benefit low-income earners and small business owners. It leaders will need to provide comprehensive guidelines articulating its position on abortion, assisted suicide, affirmative action, civil rights, conservation, environmental and family issues, education and the death penalty, among a number of issues of the political aisle who seem to have forgotten the voters that elected them into public office or the reasons why they were elected to begin with. Such discussions should avoid narrow-minded, abstractly ideological arguments that are (oftentimes) indefensible or meaningless and serve no other useful purpose than scoring political points among its "hard-line" supporters (otherwise) indifferent to concerns of popular importance.

• • •

Conscience is understood as an (internalized) set of morals and values whose critical references, in whatever manner obtained and (assimilated), must necessarily enhance or diminish an individual's sense of guilt or other such feelings and emotions proceeding from that individual's private understanding of right and wrong or good and evil; that is to say, how that individual observes (external) events and assimilates the information that it receives. A moral relativist, on the other hand, is likely to embrace a broader set of (moral/ethical) assumptions whose arbitrary premises are less in keeping with absolute ideas that otherwise require critical thinking. Individuals might be less likely encumbered by Conscience although many straddling the fence may otherwise side in favor of customary expressions or principles considered worthy of their highest regard.

• • •

.....troublesome... Conscience.... assaulting (our) subconscious faculties.... on some level...... (the)...normative designs of conventional designs....providing form and meaning.....to...individuals.......however!

••

There exists an underlying current of confidence inherent in teleological designs reposed in a (presumed) understanding of "things" that are unknown however known, undefined however (not) uninformed. In this manner, immanent knowledge is understood by ideas that lay hidden and unseen, yet intuitively understood. Such explains a child's (implicit) trust in a parent however untested.

• • •

That the media considers it their sacred trust to correctly "inform" their viewers rather than properly "informing" them, speaks volumes about our society's collective (intellectual) lassitude and (general) lack of critical thinking. The public's reflexive response to fast food journalism and casual explanations that otherwise require measured thought runs interference for individuals who, for convenience sake, are prepared to accept (almost) anything at its face value without (first) questioning its authenticity.

• • •

The Stock Market reacts irrationally at times although "irrational" (investor) behavior, influenced by (seemingly) plausible signs, (oftentimes) represent illogical adjustments or illogical responses operating under illogical assumptions whose illogical designs are seemingly logical. Every market hiccup seems to trigger what has predictably evolved into wholesale (selling) frenzies under pretexts that (otherwise) appear to validate sporadic selling or profit taking by institutional investors whenever relatively sound (market) economies would (otherwise) dictate staying the course. In this manner, an occasional (market) quirk or (uncertain) political event would seem to "justify" bailing out; in turn spooking unsophisticated investors into selling off their own shares in order to cut their losses before their portfolios hit rock bottom thereby setting the table for savvier investors to acquire them on the cheap.

• • •

Wealth, in whatever manner acquired or however abundant, is never entirely our own; that is to say, an individual's (purported) wealth is oftentimes contingent upon a government's need for Revenue. In this manner, Wealth, however much an individual accumulates, remains a provisional (financial) arrangement between the "owner" and the government. How much or how little a government decides to spend generally determines what portion of earnings or savings, for that matter, an individual will be permitted to keep; that is to say, individuals are "entitled" to whatever portion the government is willing to allow in proportion to its (own) "urgent" requirements. If this sounds like so much hyperbole, the reader might properly consider the confiscatory tax policies of socialist governments that have routinely driven many of its most productive citizens to safer (tax) havens in order to ward off efforts designed to appropriate their wealth. Individuals are subject to indirect taxes as well. These taxes include, however are not limited to, consumer taxes, school and property taxes, "sin" taxes, egregious taxes on inheritance or the "death tax" and capital gains taxes whose earnings are taxed twice, no less. It should not be inferred from the aforementioned that I am principally opposed to taxes. I would be the first to argue that any orderly, well governed society requires the cooperation of all its (productive) citizens and that each should properly contribute his or her own proportionate "fair" share of the burden otherwise required for public services available to every citizen regardless of income. There was a time, however, when our government was less prolific and wasteful, the demands placed upon it less urgent; a time when most individuals looked to themselves and their families first, rather than the government for assistance. These are different times in which we live, however. I fear that there is no turning back the hands of time. By having surrendered our inherent right to make personal decisions considered appropriate to our own particular lifestyles and needs, we have summarily relinquished our customary right to appeal such decisions made on our (own) behalf by government institutions that we've provided with (reckless) authoritative powers far exceeding their intended scope and purpose; institutions that no longer pretend to be our servants but the masters, rather, of our own determined way of life.

Is Ignorance the beginning or the "end" of Wisdom?

• • •

Social Engineering and Micro-Management have become the political norm(s); government largess broadening its horizons, transcending every segment of society, bar none, including the "Middle Class(es)," once counted among the government's severest critic(s), nevertheless compromising its middle-class principles and values in exchange for its own "fair" share of the (public) spoils—for shame!—disregarding the effects of (historical) extravagance(s) in proportion to its own evolving "requirements"...unprincipled chameleons and unwitting accomplices of (Big) Government's unending designs to expand its scope and meddling influence over the private affairs of its citizens, maintaining lockstep precision through its march to the promise land of "milk and honey" and prodigal spending that must inevitably disappoint many, including unlikely bases of support!

...indifference to national loyalty.... not its (material) assumptions, however......highly recruited....functioning (best) in free and open markets.....neither affirming (formal) allegiance to (host) nation.....nor its customs and manners..... indifferent to domestic affairs...... unless prevailed upon...faithful to its (own) appointed ends.....wherever (such) commitments (may) lie.... operating within "unassigned" parameters...inconsonant with prescribed (legal) authority.... circumstantial or variable.....in whatever manner....incidental to intended design(s)... morally "neutral"... unencumbered by borders... exploiting market opportunities.....

It is possible to "go home again" provided (that) we have properly mended our fences.

Intellectual Lassitude is conditioned by Habit reinforced by lazy attitudes; that is to say, a tendency (not) to investigate "questions"

thoroughly through applied effort.

• • •

An individual's essential makeup in conjunction with that individual's acquired habits oftentimes (render) popular opinion problematical although such difficulties that are likely to ensue, in the absence of a broad-based consensus, necessarily submits (to) a communion or joining together of distinguishing viewpoints commonly agreed upon, in whatever manner construed, (by) gravitating towards some amenable, plausible center that most individuals are willing to concede in the interest of a well-ordered society.

• • •

Freedom is informed by National Custom(s).

• • •

Truth, however "self-evident," when indecisive or poorly crafted must inevitably succumb to the unwavering dynamics of deterministic authority.

• • •

Loyalty in the workplace was once considered a (corporate) virtue. In today's increasingly mobile/faster paced environment(s), however, dedication and (long-term) commitment to one's company is likely to raise a few eyebrows rather than merit approval!

• • •

Events in and of themselves do not necessarily shape (public) opinion in whatever manner such events are (oftentimes) regarded by the (public) general.

• • •

I was reading recently where prime time commercial advertisements appearing on Superbowl Sunday are running upwards to \$53,000 a second. Are such sums imaginable? Commercial Vulgarity in its lowest form, unparalleled and unequaled by any conceivable standard, gives pause to the hordes of unemployed; cast aside by their employers because of specious budget "constraints." How many layoffs does each advertising unit measured per second equate to the number of potential jobs that might have otherwise been created (or retained for that matter) for every marginal reduction in advertising expense? How to transform precious seconds into jobs; a suppressed yawn for each livelihood, including employee benefits every year!

• • •

Ambition must oftentimes concede, if not altogether abandon, its challenging assumptions by softening its (own) urgent requirements that (otherwise) justify its Will to Power and Influence (inevitably) superseding rooted sentiments that (otherwise) kindled such eager designs to begin with!

• • •

Every society is subject to an undetermined, however certain life expectancy that varies in proportion to a society's demographic components, (the) statistical effects of (its) technology and medicine, temperament, market designs and......evolutionary standards of (moral) decency! At some indeterminate juncture, having (nearly) exhausted its loftiest social, cultural and intellectual ideals, a society begins striking diminishing or marginal returns, also understood as the "law of relative increasing costs." In this manner, a society ceases to evolve and begins to (gradually) retreat from its traditional boundaries until it is no longer able to effectively fulfill its intellectual and moral obligation(s). Whenever social costs begin to (marginally) exceed their intended benefits because (limited) resources are either inefficiently allocated or mismanaged or depleting revenue is (simply) unable to keep pace with spending requirements or whenever non-recoverable anti-social attitudes begin to compromise that society's quality of life or whenever that society's efforts to rehabilitate its economic, intellectual or moral infrastructures or restore flagging morale are no longer effective or have lost their (spirited) momentum or whenever (public) proposals fall short of (private) expectations is that society said to be in a state of decline. This not so unusual phenomenon is oftentimes apparent in densely populated (urban) areas whose complexity and "urgent" requirements demand a higher level of financial, intellectual and moral support. Although it is unlikely that aging societies will.....or could, for that matter, be restored to their former rank, (age has a manner of setting limits on its own resiliencies or ability to heal itself), each retains a remarkable capacity (or genius) for transforming itself into something new, that is vibrant and wholesome although not altogether new however retaining, in some manner, its former character; allowing a society to maintain its relevancy in a changing environment in search of a "new" identity. A society that hopes to (otherwise) reinvigorate itself must redefine itself; that is to say, determine beforehand what it hopes to become. Such decisions should be carefully mapped out as they are likely to impact the course of future generations (curiously) different however (remarkably) similar to present conventions. In a word, change must inspire confidence in a society that must "die" in order to be reborn again.

• • •

Dietitians seem to be in a state of confusion; one moment commending the nutritional value of certain foodstuffs and the next warning the consumer of their harmful effects on the basis of controvertible studies predicated upon questionable assumptions and flimsy

evidence "consistent" with politicized "science" and "popularized" eating habits rather than (true) nutritional science, whose openended studies must necessarily promote uncertainty. A well-balanced diet consumed in moderation is therefore prescribed to the uninitiated and hopelessly naïve who have allowed dietetic hysterics to (otherwise) inform common sense.

• • •

Suffering (oftentimes) defines or softens the heart of an individual by making that individual (more) receptive to of other individuals who are suffering or who have suffered in some manner. It would seem that compassion is not some feeling "acquired" outside an individual but rather an impression internalized within that individual who, having endured his or her own (private) hardships, is likely to display a more benign, sympathetic attitude toward other individuals who he or she shares or has shared a trying experience; although suffering (in kind) is not a necessary requirement for individuals who would naturally express sympathy for other people because it falls within their "nature" to do so.

• • •

A wholesome environment, that is morally and spiritually instructive, guides and directs the activities of an individual. An exemplary environment, however, should never be (overly) excessive or overbearing that it discourages creative thought or initiative. It should be flexible enough in a manner that allows an individual some (important) measure of intellectual continuity and free-expression. There are notable exceptions such as our armed forces, for example, where the successful achievement of some military objective oftentimes requires absolute compliance and uniformity of purpose vital to its success. (On the other hand, brilliantly unconventional strategists have oftentimes altered the course of History)

• • •

Democracies have historically degenerated into the meanest populist forms or an equality of social and intellectual mediocrity or leveling (diametrically) opposed to the highest standards of achievement and exemplary behavior, for that matter. For this reason, modern societies are experiencing a (societal) devolution of manners from the cultured to the lowbrow, from the genteel and refined to the vulgar and crude, from creative imagination to common expressions, from the enterprising to the feckless, from (thoughtful) liberalism to (intellectual) intolerance, from broad-mindedness to censorship, from inquiring attitudes to moral and intellectual indifference, from gallantry to loutishness, from economy and prudence to improvidence, from principle to expediency, from Rule of Law to Mob Sovereignty.

• • •

We are all limited to some extent by our (natural) designs or (social) conditioning; that is to say, by "origin" or customs and manners influenced, in part, by our imperfect natures or, as some might correctly argue, the consequence of (original) sin that is shared by everyone although varying by degree that is partly negligible, however, when measured against every individual's (underlying) potential for improvement.

• • •

A comparison of Liberal Attitudes past and present: Upton Sinclair's graphic exposé (The Jungle) written in 1906 was a resounding indictment of the meat packaging industry at the turn of the present century. Its theme centered around inhuman working conditions, squalid housing environments, disease, illness, (premature) death, ruthless commercial exploitation, below average wages, rip-off company cooperatives, prohibitive mortgage rates, economic uncertainty, innocence, hope, anguish and despair. Fast forward to 1999 where Modern Liberalism is more likely to raise (moral) objections over the "mistreatment" of animals led to the slaughter.

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The noblest (social) inheritance is model citizenship.

• • •

Pardon the Sinner, never the Sin!

• • •

It's not how one starts, inasmuch as how one finishes!

• •

The Nativity confirmed the coming of The Christ. The Resurrection consummated the Faith.

• • •

Liberty, unless affirmed by (popular) consent and validated by (lawful) customs and practices must (inevitably) devolve into Libertinism.

•••

As a rule, every student should (generally) concede prudence and "wisdom" to those best qualified to teach, keeping in mind, however, that, however well-intentioned, the possibility of error and invalid assumptions are always present.

The Law seeks to preserve, not to promote Freedom. It therefore remains impartial to the (broader) designs of any individual.

• • •

When America's Public School System was first establish in 1830, its primary mission was to assimilate Americans into the (collective) mainstream at a time our nation was predominately agrarian and (widely) dispersed; to harness our (fledgling) nation's intellectual resources as well as laying the moral foundation(s) of model citizenship by instilling Republican Virtues and establishing guidelines for being or becoming an American.

• •

First Amendment interpretations have gradually evolved from verbal expressions to (expressive) manners, whose (penumbral) "legalities" must continue reinforcing every conceivable form of "inappropriate" language or behavior.

• • •

Whenever our daily routines are (being) constantly modified in order to promote serialized forms of amusement do we (quickly) tire of new diversions?

• • •

...commissioned to ensure that the Natural Rights of Man remains inviolate and uncompromised in whatever manner an individual chooses to worship without prejudice or bias to (any) individual with respect to that individual's (religious) customs and beliefs including nonbelievers; upholding such practices privately invested in the Individual and not the State without undermining the Public's (inherent) awareness of an Almighty Presence.... (including) other inalienable rights, for that matter, afforded to every citizen; providing equal access and protection under the law and the right of every Individual to redress affronts to person and property without ruinous (material) effect on that individual or that individual's character or standing....

• • •

...television's (gross) mischaracterization of "Conservatives" and Conservative "Viewpoints"...targeting impressionable young audiences and rallying their (intended) victims...

• • •

Wisdom and Justice, in whatever manner they may vary as practical matters, remain the (twin) cornerstones of Truth. Each ultimately defines a society's probable place in History. The rejection of this simple (truth), however, must inevitably "reassert itself and exert greater wonder than that which was previously understood." (Rudyard Kipling).

• • •

The (supposed) demise of Socialism has been greatly exaggerated. It continues flourishing in a variety of different forms in "free and open markets" much in the manner Organized Crime operates under the pretext of Legitimate Business.

Liberal strategies aimed at dividing our nation along racial and ethnic lines will continue heightening (social) unrest until their political designs are finally exposed for what they are; a pretense for harvesting votes while deceiving otherwise well-meaning individuals who are (otherwise) hoping to promote "honest" dialogue among a divided nation. • • •

Ours is a generation that nourishes a morbid and irrational fear of growing old...and death, perhaps; thereby occasioning (a) need to retain its youthful appearance(s) at whatever cost; inconsonant with age, at the expense of its (own) dignity, "eternally young," "young as one feels," (youthful) fashions and lifestyles, (adolescent) designs, the accomplices of artificial youth, pining for what is no longer

retrievable, envious of younger styles also marking time.

• • •

...whereby we seek to become the architects of our own salvation...a salvation grounded on shifting sands...on death's denial...and self-deception...wherefore have we abandoned God...our eternal (spiritual) comfort...and (final) ray of hope?...mischaracterized by modern times as a disinterested bystander...(some) intangible being of uncertain (spiritual) quality or substance....exceeding worldly comprehension... who has (seemingly) withdrawn his (unconditional) love and support...leaving each of us to our own devise(s)...in our own manner... in desperation...seeking to ward-off growing old(er) by renouncing ageor remanding its inevitability to some uncertain future...for that which awaits Death, may well bide its time...

• • •

A memo to (insecure) parents: Unconditional Love is (oftentimes) an Immature Love. A truly loving and thoughtful parent understands that meaningful guidelines are essential for a developing child who hopes to one day stand on his or her own two feet.

• • •

More irritating to conservative sensibilities than a Northeastern Liberal, perhaps, is a Guilt-Ridden Southerner with a "Conscience!"

• • •

The social upheavals that typified the sixties resulted in a (net) reduction in (higher) culture as well as a devolving of (traditionally) sound arrangements. The nihilistic zeal to "reform" society in its entirety, vanquishing the good as well as the bad, has (subsequently) left an intellectual and moral vacuum in its wake.

• • •

A (social) courtesy or kind word may seem (relatively) unimportant to some people; of no remarkable occurrence. Nevertheless, its composite impact on polite society cannot be overstated. This is especially true in modern societies where formal manners and/or casual expressions are oftentimes feigned or forced; cheerless gestures or conveniences, artificial and insincere, neither genuine nor real; impersonal, lukewarm and detached, a solemn duty performed without conviction (or meaning). Our society's casual indifference to traditional amenities that have come to typify modern attitudes, must eventually shatter (the) social conventions that have "habitually" fostered goodwill.

• • •

I have encountered a number of practicing Christians over the years who are (seemingly) unable to resolve religious "questions" such as the Immaculate Conception, the Assumption or Transubstantiation, for example; considering such (doctrinal) propositions set forth by the church as operating outside the prescribing (rational) limits otherwise informed by Reason, who are unwilling to contest, however, the Incarnation, Resurrection and the Holy Trinity as matters of Faith.

Had we the means of prolonging our lives so we might allow ourselves "sufficient" opportunity to correct our historical indiscretions (or private failings), our (naturally) stubborn/inquisitive nature(s) might very well produce the same deleterious effects!

• • •

The liberal establishment appears reluctant to provide proper allowances for the underlying influence of genetics on (intellectual) achievement; brushing aside native assumptions in favor of environmental arguments lest such discussions undermine (custodial) efforts aimed at micromanaging the everyday affairs of the American People at every level of our society.

When legal customs fail to impart Wisdom or properly inform Citizenship are Republican Institutions destined to collapse!

• • •

How ironic that Republican Principle(s) designed to protect the rights of the American People are oftentimes the very catalysts that contribute to their debasement!

• • •

Friendship achieves its ultimate expression once common experience rather than private designs or exceptional requirements seals the relationship.

• • •

The Present receives its instructions from the Past by "restructuring" its customs and manners and "adapting" them to accommodate modern requirements. It does not seek to alter traditions that no longer seem relevant or consequential to conventional practices merely to fulfill neo-modernistic "requirements". A society that has developed an immunity to shock or feigns indifference to offensive or inappropriate behavior when it should be properly outraged should consider itself in a transitional state of moral decline!

• • •

A savvy investor is seldom carried away by high P/E (Price/Earnings) ratios occasioned by frenzied speculation, overvalued stocks and lower than average earnings. With few exceptions, P/E Ratios should normally fall in line with industry averages. Insert appropriate stop features wherever possible!

• • •

This, in sharp contrast with other individuals who have enjoyed every conceivable (material) advantage however squandered such opportunities because of indolence, indifference and lack of moral and intellectual stamina.....

• • •

A journalist who enjoys a First Amendment right to obtain certain information as it relates to his or her pursuit of a "storyline" should properly consider the sensibilities of the individual being interviewed; that questions raised should be fair and balanced and not intended to either harass, embarrass or otherwise offend that individual and that the highest (professional) standards should be (properly) observed at all times and that that journalist should neither conceal some hidden agenda nor interpose pre-conceived biases that purposely seek to discredit, distract or place that individual in a compromising position and that answers to stated questions should never be taken out of context or pre-determined and that, (most importantly), privacy rights should be observed at all times. The aging process is a fact of life. Therefore, how fortunate for many of our venerable movie stars who are able to preserve their youth in "reel" time while we, the movie-going public, continue growing older?

• • •

A strong economy may very well reduce government deficits but it remains a conditional expedient provided that the government is committed to reduce spending. Conditional because economists and lay people alike can ever be quite certain how the economy will continue to perform although the one remaining constant remains runaway government spending, especially when supported by a vibrant economy that continues generating (higher) revenue(s).

Individuals who are either unable or unwilling to form meaningful relationships with people outside of their immediate families or who generally walk in restricted circles have, in some manner, shortchanged themselves.

• • •

This is not some recent phenomenon, although it may oftentimes appear that way in light of the many enhancements that continue to emerge without reprieve, but a cross-generational work in process, rather, that often assumes different sizes and shapes yet whose fundamental principles remain constant. Observing an object up front and close or from too great a distance, for that matter, will oftentimes obscure or distort an individual's visual perception. The same principle (equally) applies to an individual who is witnessing an "historical" event (like the Civil Rights Movement, for example) unfolding before his or her very eyes. In this manner, contemporary biases and prejudices will (often) cause that individual (or that society, for that matter) to misread or misinterpret the historical significance or social ramifications of that (current) event or misjudge its future implications as it relates to (race relations). The further removed from time and space from some noteworthy event, but not so far as to reduce that event to an historical footnote, but far enough to allow the passage of time to ease a society's (collective) anxieties; future generations, no longer encumbered by such matters of immediate concern(s), will be in a better position to place these (historical) events in proper perspective, hindered as they might otherwise have been by contemporary currents or personal biases indigenous to the time(s) these historical events took place; that is to say, by being too close to the "action".

• • •

Politicians seeking imaginative ways of defining poverty in our nation by targeting its "root causes" plays well among certain audiences however fundamentally flawed their analysis. There has been a disturbing tendency in recent years to categorically broaden (read: create more poor people) descriptive statistics designed to either support or reject existing assumptions relating to poverty rates that are oftentimes overstated, unreliable, unsupported by fact and likely to provide biased conclusions about poverty, its definition, extent, causes and prognosis for the future. Government has its own peculiar way of driving people to extremes!

Addendum to the above: Poverty is a relative term that should be properly considered in relation to a society's (rising) economic expectations. The higher the bar is raised so too will the poverty line be raised in conformance with that society's (rising) consumer standards. All classes or groups (generally) move in the same direction. As America's "Affluent" Society becomes even more affluent so too will the "poor" expect its proportionate share of the wealth.

Addendum to the above: The undermining of traditional values has precipitated a socially divisive undercurrent in our nation that has further alienated lower income groups from the very values and customs that typically defined "middle-class" success; principled standards that have (historically) improved (its) social and economic standing in a variety of ways over the years.

.... how many of our alienated poor have (unwittingly) permitted our government to appropriate decisions best left for an individual to make, that must (otherwise) demoralize any individual naturally inclined to making his or her (own) decisions (otherwise) pre-empted by "social caretakers".....

....although (general) economic conditions require improvement...poverty is not a universal phenomenon... measures designed to increase productivity and growth.....

• •

Although "intellectual designs" are invariable in nature, such does not prohibit, however, the (inherent) capacity of most individual's to reach the highest thresholds of their (native) potential.

• • •

Addendum to the above: What I refer to as the components of intelligence; that is to say, memory, assimilation, recall and the capacity to reason, may be developed by application and conditioning; although striking diminishing returns at some point. This law applies to everyone!

• • •

Addendum to the above: Although I am not entirely certain that Reason is an actual component of Intelligence, there is no denying its (practical) value that oftentimes exceeds the highest intellectual powers.

• • •

Who has never grieved or mourned who has (once) loved?

• • •

"Living for today" is not analogous with "Taking things one day at a time." The former is bound by present conditions (only) while the latter cautions that an individual should neither feel discouraged nor overwhelmed by present conditions or expect everything to happen all at once.

• • •

An individual's character represents the sum total of other people who, in whatever manner, have "touched" that person's life. In the final analysis, we are (all) completed wholes or complements of one another. Death itself does not have it within its power to diminish lasting impressions whose effects continue to define who we are.

• • •

Conscience: A Homeric Struggle of Epic Proportions!

• • •

When every word, every thought becomes a question of honor, what else remains?

• • •

That Free Will may be properly rebuked or applauded by Conscience is a testimony to God's Divine Guidance!

• • •

An individual who behaves or reacts in a manner consistent with his or her nature should not be equally commended with another individual who behaves in a similar manner under comparable conditions otherwise contrary to that individual's (own) nature (I am speaking here of heroic deeds). In this manner, a timid or shy individual who performs some courageous act for the right reason(s) should be commended above another individual whose similar acts of courage come naturally. (This is not to imply that the latter should not be commended only that the former, by stepping out of character by doing something out of the ordinary, arguably displayed greater courage)

• • •

As a general rule, I disclaim fanciful notions like epiphanies or cognizant awakenings; those special moments of unusual psychic occurrence that (unexpectedly) heightens an individual's spiritual, moral or perceptual awareness; unless providential, that is unlikely to happen. Addendum to the above: Somewhat likened to Endangered Species!

• • •

...rejecting the notion that virtue or (goodness) is an applied rather than a natural condition...that the will toward moral excellence or (goodness) is not (necessarily) assigned by (formal) conventions...(although a society scripted in exceptional manners would likely encourage lofty manners)...that seeks its (own) goodness for its (own) sake... rather than goodness' sake...(that nevertheless offers its own special rewards)...that, notwithstanding, would (equally) satisfy universal sentiments...and that a society, however primitive or advanced, seeks its own goodness because it is considered good for that society to do so...that it naturally follows its (own) immanent understanding of what is good, whatever its form, to begin with...setting aside, for the moment, such advantages that might otherwise accrue to that society...(and) that...such goodness, however, should never be confused with eternal standards of goodness or (moral excellence) that naturally evolve in communion with Humankind's (inherently) perfectible nature, that, properly informed, provides meaning and (further) insight and guidance into the essential nature of things or ideas or what it meant by "Good"...

Despair is a spiritually wretched condition underscored by a lack of Faith.

• •

An individual should not be judged by his or her sins because aren't we all sinners to a greater or lesser degree? Otherwise, who would be left to condemn the sinner; who other than God is best qualified to judge a Man's heart?

• • •

Addendum to the above: A sin is considered apart from the "sinner." It remains up to God's (own) inestimable discretion to judge the sinner in the same manner an ordered society adjudicates crimes against society in accordance with its (own) rule of laws.

• •

Truth, in whatever manner it is misrepresented or discredited, is oftentimes sufficient in itself to overcome the censorship of its harshest critics. Witness the "re-emergence" of the Roman Catholic Church amidst the rubble and ashes of a morally decadent Soviet Regime.

• • •

Superior (material) advantages do not necessarily provide the margin of victory. Such outcomes are oftentimes decided by keenness of mind and a swift heart.

• • •

The Creator of all Things will one day vanquish the forces of spiritual and moral denial, humbling self-imposed "doubts" and worldly conveniences suited for material comfort and private designs rather than spiritual necessity. At that time, the fallen will "discover"

what many have intuitively understood all along however conveniently ignored for their own inestimable reasons. This sudden, cataclysmic (sic) reawakening of the mind will prove an unpleasant experience for most.

• • •

A song does not necessarily require an elaborate arrangement whenever simplicity suffices, although such arrangements will oftentimes enhance the melodious quality of a particular tune.

• • •

Dignity and Self-Esteem are the constitutive ingredients of any Self-Contained Individual.

• • •

Values and Interests are never (quite) settled. Such qualifiers that otherwise define an individual remain subject to revision; modifying attitudes, a (calculated) means toward an uncertain end, that, when understood in the aggregate, however, ushers a uniquely complex, multi-dimensional individual unrestricted by the limits of determined viewpoints.

• • •

...that will leave a spiritual vacuum in its wake..."material" bodies overcome by a heightened sense of misery and despair...of unimaginable horrors aggravated by God's absence...producing (surrealistic) images of ourselves in manner inconsonant with our own (naturally) perceived likeness...an essential emptiness maddening in its effects...every hope shattered, abandoned ...bringing shadows to light...unshakable despondency...left behind...alienated.... without (further) recourse to (our) loved ones...destined to walk along deserted streets...alone, in a dreamlike state of unbearable finality without (eternal) appeal...

• • •

...by their actions will they be judged...discrediting the worthy while commending the impeachable...applauding boorish behavior while disparaging character as mawkishly old-fashioned... war veterans, homeless..... while draft dodgers are elevated to higher office...where death is an option...where narrow-minded assumptions routinely dismiss Truth's proper standing...where prescriptive authority seeks its (own) rewards rather than the public good.....where arbitrary corruption attends to its self-inflicted wounds, a tragic reminder of our (political) leaders who have lost their moral compass...

• • •

An individual's "personal" relationship with God, however commendable in its designs, poses an uncertain intimacy whereby an individual may freely invest license to challenge or take issue with, (as if engaging in a casual argument with an equal), theological points of reference or doctrines inspired by the Holy Spirit and (subsequently) passed along to the Faithful by Church Traditions.

• • •

Addendum to the above: The greatest risk to an individual's spiritual well-being lies in theological assumptions seeking to reconcile what that individual understands to be (private) matters of conscience and what God (otherwise) expects from His followers. We would all be well advised to proceed with caution. The ways of Man are not (necessarily) what God has intended.

• • •

Addendum to the above: I will conclude by saying that each of us should carefully attend the explicit divisions separating God and Man. This should not imply, however, that we must not make every conceivable effort to draw ourselves closer to God. After all, such was God's intention when, for our (own) sake and for our (own) salvation, He became Man.

• • •

Hackneyed expressions such as "great" or "greatest", as they relate to professional athletes, have, in my estimation, lost much of their (traditional) relevancy in recent years. Exalted characterizations of the modern athlete are consonant with neo-prejudicial impressions and lack of historical perspective.

• • •

Democracy's most egregious failing, (depending on one's point of view), lies in the inestimable opportunities afforded Ambition that oftentimes seems to attract the meanest and commonest of "talents" lacking natural distinction and merit; promoting an imprudent compromise of the loftiest standards in order to accommodate the requirements of (social) egalitarianism; however mediocre its outcome.

We are all (ultimately) defined by the choices we make whether or not such choices are circumstantial or embarked upon voluntarily.

• • •

D.H. Lawrence observed that "what the eye doesn't see and the mind doesn't know, doesn't exist." He was probably referring to God

or, should I say, "God?" Our religious beliefs notwithstanding, it is axiomatic that people, places and "things" (or) ideas exist in their (own) manner however unknown or unformed (in our minds). I believe that Mr. Lawrence is confusing Being with Knowledge. The eye can neither see nor clearly perceive everything that exists, limited as we are by time and space; not to mention our (limited) intellectual and immanent capacity to perceive or understand "things" clearly. That things and ideas exist in our minds, however, (necessarily) proves their existence inasmuch as they reside in (our) thoughts; that is to say, along the surface of our conscious awareness that equally supports the notion of similar thinking "beings", (much like ourselves), with whom we share an (phenomenal) "bond". Mr. Lawrence may freely plead ignorance of such matters that remain unknown to him. On the other hand, an individual may reasonably argue that the eye or the mind will often deny what it chooses not to see or believe; in this manner invalidating whatever objective or (plausible) certainty might otherwise allow. That we all perceive things differently is a matter of conditioning rather than their (underlying) essence. It would seem that such "unknowns" or perhaps distortions or what the eye doesn't "really" see are merely conveniences designed to support our (own) private prejudices or impressions under assault by the mind's eye.

. . .

Whenever a group of individuals gather around to establish a community, it is effected with the explicit understanding that each member is expected to surrender a portion of his or her ("natural") freedoms; duty bound to impartially support, in a manner that is not prejudicial to any (single) individual, community laws ratified by popular consent for the benefit of every member of that community, without exception, lest unyielding power and influence fall into the hands of the Quick and Strong.

Silence, Order and Discipline are Essential for Better Learning!

• • •

Every generation, it seems, has appealed to a "kinder," "simpler" past unencumbered by the dynamics of modern conventions considered either uniquely complex or morally deficient. For this reason, many individuals who may (otherwise) feel a (present) detachment seek a wistful alliance with a problematical past considered less alienated and more secure. These reflections represents momentary fancies that (alas) few of us are immune.

• • •

The "healing process" (I am speaking of severed friendships) is oftentimes achieved (less) in the manner of redressing (root) cause(s) but by not bringing them up at all.

• • •

An individual's values (and interests) is oftentimes a study in contrast. For example, a child may be reluctant to part (at any price) with a prized baseball card of his favorite sport hero. Years later, that individual (adult) may be willing to sell that card if the "price is right." That adult might be said to have "rationalized" his or her decision-making processeseither because he or she needs the money or because these collectibles no longer hold the same intrinsic "value" that they once did, so why not part with (them) for a profit? This is not meant to imply, however, that that individual's principled belief system has been fundamentally modified in any manner; such accommodations do not (necessarily) alter the underlying (moral) assumptions that (otherwise) defines that individual. Something "valued" is not to be confused with a "moral" value.

• • •

Henry James' rejection of "Moral Realism;" an ontological defense of "being" that at least some moral claims actually are true, underscores the position that moral absolutes are not the exclusive property of any particular individual or group. For example, that the needy are morally elevated while the wealthy are morally debased. Such propositions are (oftentimes) based on class antagonisms reinforced by common sentiments. An individual, irrespective of his or her material status, should be (otherwise) measured by the quality of that individual's Character and that "fundamental" arguments of questionable design have less to do with that individual's economic standing but that individual's moral content, rather, that transcends class distinctions; that is to say, that individual's (natural) state of goodness; and that an individual, however rich or poor, may be either meanly disposed or kind and generous in consonance with his or her Nature.

• • •

That we are oftentimes aware of our (own) failings explains in part our reluctance as individuals to correctly censor unbecoming behavior. Of greater concern, however, is our (own) growing indifference and casual acceptance of our (own) private shortcomings that rationalize their (own) "rewards".

• • •

Whenever the underlying assumptions supporting unlawful acts remain constant although the consequences of such actions considered separately may vary in their intended effect(s) does the final outcome of such actions either lessen or enhance their implied intent.

. . .

That the confiscation of personal property and private fortunes promotes wealth creation is a non sequitur!

Who's to question the limits of endurance characteristic among individuals resistant to self-improvement or to what extent a breach of self-confidence?

• • •

There are many roads leading to Heaven. Some take longer to get there than others, however!

• • •

If Moral Turpitude were a parade, William Jefferson Clinton would be the Master of Ceremonies!

•••

The Will to Goodness is the rejection of behavioral attitudes repugnant to an individual's highest (moral) standing.

• • •

A surefire way of increasing job performance is by reducing performance standards! (Same rule applies in promoting academic achievement.)

• • •

Since the inception of time our world has never lacked for lawyers: its membership exceeding (all) the grains of sands in (all) the oceans multiplied by (all) the stars in the heavens. I suspect that one was in readiness at the time Cain bludgeoned his brother (Abel) to death preparing an opening defense argument for temporary insanity.

• • •

A quick word about two separate issues: Gun Ownership and Abortion: Gun Ownership (in itself) does not constitute a determinate act against Society. That a firearm may be used (illegally) by a criminally minded individual in a manner contrary to its intended purpose(s) counts against the potential action of that individual possessing the firearm rather than that individual possessing a firearm or the firearm itself or any other "potential" weapon for that matter. It is axiomatic that a probable action that exists as a potential does not necessarily imply criminal intent. (I am not concerned at the moment with formal legalities but potential actions.) The same argument equally applies to an individual who is considering having an Abortion that should be otherwise perceived as the pre-meditated taking of a (human) life. A determined action of this nature should not be considered apart from the purposeful action of having taken someone's life; that is to say, such potential no longer exists once it has been superseded by a definitive action. In this manner, the consummation of that action (Abortion) ceases to be a private matter, unlike Gun Ownership, that is not (unnecessarily) an unlawful act in itself, but the willful act of taking the life of another human being.

Addendum to the above: Counterargument as follows: An individual should neither entertain uncertain designs nor engage in questionable activities that are considered potentially harmful to the personal well-being of another individual whether or not they are properly executed with the intent of harming that individual or that may otherwise effect unintended harm, in either case legal precedence or (experience) should carefully consider the feasibility of preempting such decisions to begin with.

Addendum to the above: In which case, Abortion should be considered illegal! (Legalized) Gun Ownership, however, remains a topic open for discussion.

• • •

The Bush Administration's proposed subsidization of faith-based organizations intended to provide financial support to religious groups in their efforts to feed, clothe and shelter the poor is likely to encounter strong opposition from both sides of the political aisle. Modern Liberalism, naturally suspicious of religion to begin with, is generally reluctant to support initiatives that it (otherwise) considers a violation of constitutional provisions mandating Separation of Church and State. Conservatives, on the other hand, are (properly) suspicious in their own manner of federal programs that might otherwise compromise the operational authority of religious organizations as it relates to their spiritual as well as their humanitarian mission. (So much for the poor!)

...Eugenics' potential for modifying an unborn's natural makeup.... advancing in instead, lifeless creatures without humor or soul....reminiscent of Huxley's production line of trancelike zombies depicted in his "Brave New World"...

• • •

The Past should never be judged by contemporary standards. "Modern" Society has always been complacent of its "exclusive" (evolutionary) mission; overbearing in the manner it assumes a (uniquely) higher moral authority predicated on vague, oftentimes mistaken (historical) assumptions (improperly) formed by modern ideology. There are many individuals who might argue otherwise; that Historical and (Social) Evolution are the exclusive properties of (the) Modern Society. (Such thinking isn't new, however.) The

only certainty is that the integral components of society, its institutions and its people, oftentimes remain an uncertain proposition and change, an uncertain process. Whatever we (as a society) once were, in relation to what we are now and what we hope to become, should not be considered separately. Although societal forms and conditions may vary, its essential foundations, as a rule, remain fundamentally the same.

• • •

Addendum to the above: Future Generations will undoubtedly enjoy similar advantages from the vantage point of time. Let us hope, however, that whatever judgments the future may one day see fit to render, will be tempered by gratitude for others who, having participated in history, made it possible for them to critically examine its failures as well as its accomplishments in an open-minded manner that will hopefully provide objective standards of measurement.

•••

...remains uncertain, especially when it begins questioning (its) time-honored customs and practices otherwise requiring a candid appraisal of (its) intended designs... of the covenants that shaped (its) social and political outlook and contributed to (its) moral and intellectual development....distinguishing it from other cultures and societies that properly enjoy their own customary set of values..... although once (its) singular characteristics have been properly ratified and affirmed by majority opinion..... the process may find itself encumbered by any number of unintended consequences or competing designs operating within that (social) environment...

• • •

Affected laughter is either attributable to hidden sorrow(s) or arrested emotional development or perhaps both!

• • •

Cloning promises to one day transform Humanity from Children of God to Children of Science.

••

Many of the classical virtues are understood intuitively. They remain unknown to a society that has lost its spiritual and moral compass!

• • •

Impractical Designs are the hallmarks of Wishful Thinking!

• • •

Good seeks its (own) internal rewards, not (formal) recognition!

• • •

The following feature presentation has been rated R by the Motion Picture Academy of Arts and Sciences. Adults above the age of twenty-one must be accompanied by a minor!

••

How many people who (have) touched our lives, however brief, (have) left a lasting impression?

• • •

There are three main reasons why I have distanced myself from populist rhetoric: First of all, most politicians care little, if anything, about advancing the fortunes of the "common man." Such expressions are more often than not cynical inventions conceived by scheming politicians to attract potential voters. Secondly, such intentions, in whatever manner their sentiments may be genuinely sincere, oftentimes fail to keep pace with popular expectations thereby heaping anger and resentment upon otherwise well-meaning individuals who may have fallen short of their intended purpose; that is to say, deliver their promises. Lastly, such attempts at stereotyping common attitudes merely serve to advance faulty notions of vulnerability and incompetence. In the final analysis, there are no common men, only common people!

• • •

Market Globalism has erased the "traditional" boundaries of American Corporate Patriotism, if such loyalty to nation has ever really existed to begin with!

• • •

The impartiality of our judicial system must be seriously called into question whenever fortune and fame, the twin offsprings of the privileged few, are able to unfairly influence the Commission of Justice.

••

Whittaker Chambers, lamenting on the imminent demise of Western Civilization, observed that "a nation cannot save itself unless it wants to be saved."

Rabid Commercialism, Intellectual Inertia, Moral Malaise and Public Cynicism are a few of the underlying maladies whose symptoms may one day pave the road to Rome.

• • •

Rising prices (or Inflation) are the result of more money chasing fewer goods and services (or production's inability to keep pace with demand). The general argument for Supply Side Economics generally proceeds as follows: that private and corporate tax breaks will encourage savings and investment that will increase production that will increase employment that will increase disposal income that will increase consumer spending that will stimulate the economy, so there!

. . .

Addendum to the above: (Consumer) Demand remains the (one) prevailing constant.

• • •

Insatiable material "requirements" have taken a definite toll on consumers, their families and society in general by giving way to lifestyles that many are unable to afford, working themselves toward the brink of emotional and physical exhaustion for the sake of "indispensable" consumer products quickly destined for (the) trash heap, (the) storage bin, (the) broom closet, (the) attic, (the) basement apartment, (the) garage, (the) root-cellar, (the) front yard sale, and the (poor) house.

• • •

Receiving a well-rounded education (if such is indeed possible in today's academic environment), finding meaningful employment (good luck!), earning a decent salary (however defined), giving something back (according to one's means), good health (a crap shoot!), a loving and supportive family (how very fortunate!), and good friends (same), constitute the proper ingredients of the "Happy Life."

• • •

Addendum to the above: A Happy Life (however) should never be confused with the Good life. There is a difference, you know!

• • •

Recollection(s) of our childhood friends and other acquaintances remain firmly frozen in time and mind. Have they, like us, grown older? In what manner would they appear to us today? Would something from our (irretrievable) past be lost should our paths suddenly cross?

•••

Every now and then we need to step outside (ourselves) in order to better observe (ourselves) from the proper vantage point.

•

I would like to express some thoughts about Scientology: Scientology is not a faith-based religion. Science and Technology are its principle fountainheads whose positivistic approach to self-actualization rejects every considered (theological) opinion or belief that cannot be systematically observed or measured; that is to say, it is an "applied religious philosophy" that does not require its followers to accept anything on the basis of Faith. What is true for an individual is what that individual has "observed" to be true. In this manner, truth is a function of how "things" or events are either studied or perceived. Knowledge about something is incomplete unless that something is understood without qualification. (I am speaking here of the Highest Order of Knowledge.) In this manner, awareness, whose condition is less certain or problematical, perhaps; that is to say more intuitive than substantial, necessarily applies to material arguments whereby an individual may be likely to feel the presence or awareness of that "something." Therefore, an individual might be sensible of an uncertain awareness of something spiritual, apart from a certain awareness of something in the material sense. The former is incomplete in a "certain" sense although the latter is complete in an "uncertain" sense. In my opinion, technology does not promote a heightening of self-awareness in a spiritual sense although it may advance, however, a "sense" of material awareness. In any event, it is doubtful that mastery over the material universe would lead any individual to recognize his or her immortal self let alone that individual's "divine" self! Have I made myself clear?

• • •

The Material and the Spiritual are competing dynamics!

Scientology does not seek to promote personal salvation (which otherwise requires divine assistance) but the culmination, rather, of an individual's "divine" destiny that seeks to become godlike through self-actualization. Such thinking runs counter to Christian assumptions that Man is an imperfect being and that his labors, however well-intentioned, must (therefore) be judged imperfect. For this reason, salvation is not (necessarily) the result of good intentions but the perfection of such intentions, rather, through God's (own) spiritual guidance.

• • •

Humankind may strive to achieve some (ideal) of Perfection; however, it remains certain that it will never achieve Perfection (itself) that is reserved for God alone.

• • •

Nothing arises from Nothingness. The effects of Movement or Change must necessarily proceed from conspicuous causes, which are observable and subject to measurement. That Nothingness fails to meet this criterion reinforces the notion that the "Initial Movement," from the vantage point of Nothingness, remains a permanent question mark. It is unlikely that Science will ever satisfactorily explain the Initial Movement that remains an eternal exception contrary to (worldly) causes and (their) effects and that God could not have created Himself because He always Was. God remains, of course, the "Primary Mover" or "First Cause" of the material universe; that is to say, God is/was not an initial event, that assumes pre-existing causal factors, but a "Being" rather, existing outside the boundaries of external causes. Therefore, God could not have proceeded from Nothingness but has always existed as an Eternal Being who endowed His creation with subsequent "Being" in His (own) image, however unintelligible to Science.

• • •

Such is the wondrous mystery of God that some would otherwise confuse with being one's own "god" rather than the offspring of God's (own) Creation; godly microcosms rather than God's (own) inestimable creatures.

• • •

An event, whether circumstantial or occasioned by design, is the outcome of some assignable cause. God could not occasion His own existence because such would imply (a) causation preceding His existence. Therefore, God "necessarily" exists.

• • •

Scientology: Finis.

• • •

Normalcy, (I am referring here to accepted standards of behavior) as understood by modern society, has devolved into a relativistic acceptance of (the) meanest forms of "casual" behavior.

• • •

An inquiring mind: a natural curiosity; an introspective diversion or spiritual awakening?

• •

Criticisms (occasionally) leveled against besieged nations engaged in defensive maneuvers against their aggressive neighbors; responding militarily in proportion "exceeding" acceptable retaliatory standards considered excessive, underscore the premise of modern warfare that is (seemingly) not to win a war but rather repel or contain the enemy within "reasonable" limits perceived by international naiveté, regional prejudices, expediency and other geo-political designs.

• • •

The hastening of scholastic mediocrity in America's (urban) Public School System is understood by the efforts of (its) soft-headed administrators and educators seeking to promote equality of results at the expense of its brightest students, many of whom are routinely held in check in order to allow their less talented classmates "sufficient" opportunity to play catch-up; oftentimes necessitating a lowering of academic standards for the "benefit" of other students who are intellectually less gifted, thereby promoting false impressions of academic achievement where performance results are (oftentimes) questionable. In this manner, mediocrity in the classroom has become a self-fulfilling prophecy that, for egalitarian reasons, seeks to "level" the intellectual playing field by penalizing students who (otherwise) have the potential to perform on a higher level.

• • •

The Tyranny of Law as it is gradually evolving in American Society is best described as a Politically Correct strangle hold!

• • •

It is sad to observe how many of us are (seemingly) unfit for Freedom, oftentimes overstepping its boundaries beyond the limits of acceptable tolerance by openly abusing them! I am certain that an individual having never tasted freedom (or understood what it really means to be free) and having (subsequently) acquired it through heroic efforts must come to appreciate it more completely than

someone (naturally) born into a free society. I understand that this is a difficult proposition from an American perspective indifferent, perhaps, to the hundreds of millions of people existing on this planet who either live or have lived in virtual bondage. It would be well advised, however, that free societies not take its assumptive liberties for granted as history has oftentimes proven on any number of occasions, its variable nature.

• • •

...socialist designs seeking to optimize a nation's economic output...and income equality.... within the diminishing scope of its intellectual capital.... despite (the) overwhelming examples provided by free market economies that have consistently outperformed planned economies at every level.... can only be understood in terms of achieving absolute power.... at whatever cost to its (hard working) citizens....

• • •

.....religious symbols considered by Secular Deconstructionists (Atheists) "insensitive," inappropriate," or formally offensive to "pluralistic designs" subsequently banished from the public forum despite first amendment arguments otherwise protecting such expressions, are transparent attempts at marginalizing religion by seeking to drive it (permanently) underground.....

• • •

It is unreasonable to assume that (natural) goodness is either capable of self or mutual corruption because what is (naturally) good seeks to promote "good things" (only). That an individual is (inherently) "good" and that the corruption of (natural) goodness is understood within the context of conventional designs does not follow in the manner that (natural) goodness would never compromise itself inasmuch as it would be contrary to its (nature) to do so; each social unit being (naturally) good; that is to say, (natural) goodness, standing side by side with (natural) goodness, would (naturally) reject its mutual corruption as well as its own corruption and furthermore, the assumed absence of evil, understood as the antithesis of "good," would (otherwise) preclude the introduction of unwholesome examples seeking to promote a corrupting influence on (natural) goodness; moreover, were (natural) goodness corruptible, the source of its corruption would (necessarily) lie beyond itself; that is to say, operating outside the parameters of (natural) goodness; some other agency (evil), whose intention would be the corruption of (natural) goodness.

Addendum to the above: Therefore, every individual must summon God's gift of Conscience and Reason, the arbiters of Good and Evil, for (perpetual) guidance in overcoming (foreign) designs that would otherwise conceal (their) evil intentions.

• •

I believe that Peta's (People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals) hidden agenda has less to do with advancing Animal Rights (a silly idea to begin with), than setting the stage for citizenship rights for animals in the future. (I've never been more serious!)

• • •

Young boys coming into their own, especially during their formative years, should not be discouraged from engaging in physical activities; that is to say, the type of "horse play" or "rough housing", common among growing boys, that gives vent to their masculinity; that is to say, gender characteristics underlying decidedly masculine attitudes inherent in the male species. Aggressive behavior, contrary to violent or destructive behavior, is a natural (masculine) expression that should be encouraged, within proper limits, lest our society give way to effete young men.

Addendum to the above: Aggressive should not be confused with Aggression! By definition, an "aggressive" individual is someone who is energetic and enterprising as opposed to someone given to aggression who intentionally seeks to promote harm to other people. The fine line separating Aggressive and Aggression is understood in the manner each is (socially) channeled, whether constructively or destructively!

Addendum: Feminists, of course, are hell-bent on softening the male ego by encouraging less aggressive, more passive (effeminate) forms of behavior designed to undermine male "attitudes," that, in the long run, will only serve to confound both sexes, if it hasn't already done so!

• • •

Addendum to the above: Prozac, I understand, works just as well.

• • •

To what extent should any society be willing to compromise its "individual" freedom(s) by imposing limits on such freedoms by compensating other individuals who've chosen to exercise their (own) rightful freedoms, in their (own) manner, without regard to consequence, thereby placing them in an unenviable position of living in a "free" society?

• • •

Question on Global Economies: Was Henry Kissinger's observation that G.E's. would leave many "working people" behind, a valid assumption? Will higher corporate profits and salaries concentrated in fewer hands create a pyramiding effect? What would be the economic and socio/political fallout for world governments that would otherwise lose their middle/center?

• • •

Question on the European Economic Community (EEC): Independence/Unilateralism: How long before Uncle Sam tightens the reins?

• • •

Question: Are environmental concessions commonly inserted within the framework(s) of most "comprehensive" energy reform packages legitimate components or merely transparent extensions of olive branches designed to appease extreme environmental factions?

• • •

Question: Will the future of the Republican Party rest on Immigration Reform; (especially) as it relates to the Hispanic Community, the fastest growing ethnic group in America? Will its resistance to open borders (if such were its intent) be perceived by members of the "community" as exclusionary and racist? How will changing demographics impact the party over the next half-century?

• • •

Addendum to above question: Should Western Culture step aside and let history take its course or is it possible for such groups to properly assimilate and operate within its broadest parameters?

• • •

Question regarding Mergers/Acquisitions: Are such destined to remain a permanent fixture in the American Corporate Landscape?

• • •

A flatterer is a parasite who relies on a (consenting) host for its venal nourishment; fodder feeding its vanity and conceit, that, having satisfied its provisional appetite(s), seeks additional sustenance elsewhere, unlike true friendship that is firmly grounded on genuine love and devotion.

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The manner an individual prepares for the (future) properly defines that individual's (present) mindset.

A Perfect Being cannot "cause" its own creation inasmuch as (the) subsequent effects of Creation imply an (existing) potential for movement or change and/or possessing a set of predicates or determinants otherwise lacking in a Perfect Being that is "entirely without limit or incapable of any infallibility, whatsoever." Addendum to the above: The Left is already starting to kick-up a storm over (supposed) ethnic/racial profiling at our nation's airports. That didn't take long, now did it?

• • •

A criminal act, whether committed by an individual against another individual or against a group of individuals, notwithstanding that such actions may be either random or pre-meditated, constitutes a crime against society inasmuch as every member of that society is considered a (potential) victim that should otherwise be provided equal protection under the law and that any crime, whatever the motive, directed against (the) one represents a (potential) affront against (the) many; especially when such crimes are committed indiscriminately, without rhyme or reason; that is to say, in a manner that renders every member of that society a (potential) victim subject to arbitrary or uncertain (criminal) designs.

The greatest (moral) "tragedies" are oftentimes self-inflicted by individuals who choose to orchestrate their own disappointments by making ill-advised (decisions) without giving proper thought to the consequences of their actions, who are/were nevertheless capable of critically examining every aspect of such decisions; that is to say, their moral and rational dimensions, had they been properly inclined to do so and who, having suffered the unhappy effects of "unexpected" outcomes, are wont to attribute their personal misfortunes to Chance rather than their own indomitable designs and indiscretions. Such outcomes oftentimes reflect a convenient form of denial advanced by thoughtless/reckless individuals who, although aware of the potential consequences of their designs, gave willing consent to forceful expressions in a manner detrimental to their own (personal) well being as well as the well-being of others. Perhaps the latter are the real victims of such "unforeseen" events.

What I find truly remarkable about the servile mindset of politically correct attitudes (which appear to have taken on a life of their own) are the (internal) conflicts that (must) oftentimes arise whenever artificial expressions of a questionable sort inevitably collide with the thoughtful judgments of individuals who, in their private moments, (would) otherwise know better than to acquiesce to affected manners. Tolerance for opposing viewpoints is the touchstone of a free society, within reasonable limits, of course. A society, however well-intentioned, ceases to be "tolerant," once that society allows itself to devolve into a sociopolitical checklist dedicated to the advancement of "appropriate" behavior and verbal expressions dictated by idiosyncratic designs rather than common sense lest its members be perceived as offending artificially constructed practices that have inexplicably seeped their way into the conventional mainstream.

Young People, enjoy the treasured companionship of your elderly loved ones while time allows!

• • •

A society is defined by its formal as well as its informal social and cultural institutions. The former is properly understood in the (traditional) manner as comprising that society's political and legal bodies (its parliaments and courts, for example); the latter, by its community organizations gathered together for some specific purpose or function including its churches and schools (along with their established customs and practices). The former stand out in full view while the latter are less comprehensive by force of (accustomed) habit. A society in the throes of a Cultural War (or a War of Ideas), whose socially transmitted customs are under assault, is never quite apparent to the uninitiated, (unlike the attendant violence of civil wars, for example, whose apparent destruction of person and property, not to mention its deleterious effect on the economy, are much easier to assess), and whose consequential impact on that society's traditions (usually) take longer for an non-engaging or morally indifferent society to absorb. Machiavelli correctly argued that internal revolutions that seek to transform a society's social and political cultural must (necessarily) retain that society's material forms in order to convey a semblance of continuity without seemingly undermining their essential character, notwithstanding its altering of prevailing customs and practices that would otherwise promote resentment among its citizens.

Addendum to the above: Historically, (impressionable) fertile young minds, the conduits for social and cultural change, have been their traditional catalysts as many are generally (considered) more adaptable to revolutionary thinking.

Eliminate national identity and thereby eliminate the characteristics and manners that properly define a Nation. Eliminate objective standards and rules of measurement and thereby eliminate inequality. Eliminate gender differences and thereby eliminate the particulars that distinguish the sexes. Eliminate religion and thereby eliminate Humankind's loftiest moral standing. Eliminate an intolerance for tolerance and thereby (promote) an overly simplistic view of (Human) Nature.

It is axiomatic that every individual who properly enjoys life, gives (reflective) pause to all that is meaningful and of certain value; held motionless by uncertain forms that have yet to take shape however aroused by such notions that (necessarily) compel he or she to probe deeper into their essential nature notwithstanding how they (may) oftentimes exceed the capacious limits of that individual's (private) understanding that nevertheless continues to intrigue inquiring minds cognizant of intuitive impressions part real / part imaginary yet real in the real sense of being One in All; (however separated) whose underlying presence, however, conveys a (higher) spiritual or moral standing...that the young, conditioned by the expectancies of youth united with the old seeking redemption for unfulfilled promises or missed opportunities; each converging toward the same starting/ending point, the one embarking on life and the other approaching its end, in some manner, however, occasioning a (new) beginning, a jubilee, an extension of life which becomes younger (while growing older), brought together, youth/age, childlike in all its manly/womanly innocence while the middle years patiently bide their appointed time.

There is a wide chasm that separates parents who try to provide certain advantages to their children from others who either pamper or (merely) indulge them. The former seek to provide an effective foundation (moral and spiritual as well as material), essential to their future well-being while the latter (unwittingly) engender a paralysis of will that stunts their children's emotional and intellectual development.

Whatever conditions or incites (human) emotions, such expressions are triggered within the (core) of an individual's (basic) nature whose (essential) ingredients seldom vary.

Material Apathy and Intellectual Humility are consonant with Spiritual Repose, the lack of which properly explains the nominalization of religious and spiritual attitudes common among the more affluent societies.

Evil has its own inestimable manner of penetrating the hearts and minds of individuals who, although not evil themselves, unwittingly serve as conduits for a variety of sordid practices and assorted mischief.

• • •

Whether the United States should suspend its forty-three (43) year embargo against Cuba and resume normal trade relations with that country's communistic regime is one of the overriding questions presently being debated by our nation's political leaders. Fidel Castro's supporters on the American Left have historically argued that 1) most embargoes are ineffective in subverting autocratic governments (note these are the same people who summarily called for embargoes against Iraq as a viable alternative to war), and 2) that such restrictions promote unnecessary hardship to its citizens and should therefore be lifted if not for humanitarian reasons, alone. What such arguments conveniently side-step, however, are the valiant efforts of individuals who have dedicated their lives to the cause of freedom, many of whom continue rotting away in Cuban prisons, and America's obligation to lend moral and practical support to these brave men and women who continue to put up the good fight despite the many hardships that they too have had to endure as a (heavy) price for freedom.

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What follows is a brief summary of President Bush's "Conservative" Credentials: 1) signed into law an education bill that even Ted Kennedy couldn't seriously challenge (so much for school vouchers and accountability), 2) proposed an immigration reform bill granting unconditional amnesty to illegal immigrants (so much for controlling our nation's borders), 3) signed into law a campaign finance reform bill considered by most constitutional scholars, unconstitutional (so much for Freedom of Speech), 4) signed into law a \$190 billion farm subsidy bill (so much for pork), 5) imposed import tariffs on steel (so much for Free Trade), 6) hasn't vetoed a single (spending) bill after two years in office (so much for fiscal restraint), 7) effectively restricted Israeli efforts to combat our mutual enemies (so much for the War on Terror), 8) unable to rein in renegade Senate Republicans opposed to oil exploration in ANWR (so much for independence on foreign oil). So much for Conservative Principles period! I suppose an Al Gore presidency could have fared a whole lot worse for Conservatives.

Ideas are the foundation of all our designs.

• • •

By its very "nature" artificial intelligence lacks the (natural) predicates that otherwise promote independent or self-contained thinking. At best, planned intelligence may imitate the various forms or likeness however not the sameness of human intelligence that cultivates its own rational manners by inherent rather than exterior designs. Such arguments extend to manufactured "emotions," as well. Although "correct" intellectual and emotional responses may be properly programmed, these "attributes" (inevitably) lack spontaneity of purpose or meaning or the (essential) qualities otherwise produced by nature.

On Baby Boomers: Television Sitcoms featuring dim-witted, out of touch parents made to appear foolish in contrast with their more enlightened, ratty off springs seems to be a by-product of deeply affected (adolescent) grievances common among aging "boomers" seeking vicarious payback or therapeutic relief from an Authoritarian Parent Syndrome whose symptoms many are seemingly unable to overcome.

Addendum to the above: The children of the Great Depression foreshadowed a coming generation of men and women destined for eternal adolescence. How could they have properly imagined how things would subsequently play out? Such was/is the inevitable outcome whenever parents, lacking proper perspective; that is to say, an appropriate level of giving (that oftentimes exceeds their means), subsequently choose the "safer" path of least resistance by giving more rather than less. They could be forgiven, I suppose, in wanting to give what they themselves had never properly enjoyed.

• • •

Addendum to the above: Happy as many parents were to provide a higher standard of living for their children (motivated in part by parading affluence), these "selfless" acts seldom elicited an appropriate level of gratitude or appreciation for their self-sacrificing efforts. The constant giving with no strings attached provoked childlike expectations among an overindulged generation of children whose detachment and immaturity caused many to incorrectly estimate or value the sacrifices made by their parents. Pampered and spoiled beyond their parent's willingness to control or muster the required checks that separate rights from privileges (inevitably) gave rise to increasingly selfish attitudes common among a growing generation of young men and women accustomed to having their own way. These parents (unwittingly) sought to love their children the only way they knew how, by buying their children's affection. Now their children are the ones paying a heavy price for it!

Addendum to the above: Every generation is influenced in part by the prevailing customs of its time; challenging the formal assumptions of preceding generations. Baby Boomers were unique in the manner many were drawn to a sociopolitical ideology governed by faulty premises, unformed impressions and partial truths that artificially manufactured hybrid forms of reality further obfuscated by uncertain, abstract realisms or shadows (of truth) that gave way to a fictionalized account of reality that (eventually) assumed a life of its own.

For these "reasons" school administrators are gradually phasing out games considered intimidating or harmful to the self-esteem of "underachieving" children. My biggest concern, however, is that these horrific events, that have recently come to light, are likely to recall arguments about married and, heaven forbid, women priests! That the feminization of the pulpit would likely follow should be reason enough to raise serious doubts among traditional practicing Catholics. (I understand that you and I differ on the question of married and women priests so I won't press the issue). I don't believe, however, that the Church needs to reinvent itself in order to accommodate modern "requirements." However I digress. What was it that President Nixon once said: "We are all Protestants now" or soon will be?

The unwillingness to forgive a perceived wrong is Pride's greatest Accomplishment!

• • •

A representative of the people should uphold the duties and (sacred) trust of public office by making informed decisions based upon the legitimate concerns of his or her constituents by promoting, whenever possible, majority interests without compromising the immediate demands of the nation. He or she should never pursue, however, his or her own immediate interests or the parochial interests of "popular" opinion that each may otherwise feel indebted.

• • •

Alexander Hamilton remarked in the Federalist Papers that "Power is neither too great nor too small; however "limited or proportionate to its intended purpose and that it is only excessive where its authority exceeds the limits delegated to some predetermined end." In pursuing this line of reasoning, Power, is not absolute but a variation, rather, of proportionate means and ends. Nevertheless, Power, however limited in scope or whatever its assigned role or whatever its form(s) or for whatever purpose (end) it is channeled, should be considered absolute or complete (or excessive) in the manner that it (Power) seeks to promote a desired end, and that however "restricted" by definition remains absolute in its intended design. I believe the confusion lies between Absolute Power and the (excessive) Abuse of Power (which need not be absolute in order to be abusive).

• • •

Addendum to the above: I have taken the liberty of defining Absolute Power as excessive since Power as an arbitrary construct, does not (naturally) lend itself to self-imposed limits neither does it readily yield to ulterior designs that would otherwise seek to curb its influence or abbreviate its prestige.

• • •

Once the brevity of human existence has been properly explored and the passage into the unknown of imminent concern, does the plausible expectancy of eternal life provide some measure of comfort? Such are the overpowering anxieties of Despair searching for the Light of Truth.

Reason, however compelling, is oftentimes no match against pre-programmed or "talking point" summations, biased opinions or ignorance in general.

. . .

Prozac has become the prescription drug of choice among feminist activists seeking to sedate the (traditional) male ego.

• • •

Although an individual cannot always (control) his or her (own) thoughts, he or she should be able to exercise sufficient control over his or her (own) actions.

• • •

We are all conditioned (to some extent) by conventional formalities that do not necessarily conform to plausible manners although possessing sufficient force in keeping with ceremonial progressions and appropriate customs.

• • •

Whether the (Holy) Scriptures should remain subject to generational contentions or modern interpretations, much in the manner that Constitutional Law is persuaded by the (legal) authority of evolving standards of decency, such arguments that otherwise provide recourse to alternative viewpoints, must be equally troubling as arbitrary viewpoints relating to Papal Infallibility or the Divine Rights of Kings!

• • •

Faith in a (theological) idea does not exist in a vacuum; proceeding as it oftentimes does from Experience and Reason that provide moral and intellectual support to the Faithful. Faith is a "subjective certainty" unproven by worldly standards of measurement however "something" that is intuitively understood unlike "non material" notions (commonly understood as "some things" unsupported or untested by facts). Faith does not imply a paucity of discernable evidence but an immanent reflection of ideas, rather, that must (necessarily) exist in the mind however apart from the mind inasmuch as ideas have foundations of their (own) that support their (own) existence. Ideas perfect a thinking individual in a manner that unites the two; that is to say, cause and effect become one, each assuming a "mutual" consciousness of its (own). Therefore, Doubt has neither the power to extinguish or discredit an (independent) thought or idea that had/has a prior existence of its (own) to begin with.

• • •

Addendum to the above: The assumption (here) is that Ideas have always existed in the mind; that they represent the hidden Wisdoms of God; that they are not formed as much as revealed to those courageous enough to seek them out.

• • •

Freedom is a privilege understood the most by individuals who were not fortunate enough to be born in a free and open society. The fortuitous advantages of those "born free" with a "Bill of Rights" inscribed on their sleeve, oftentimes display an annoying habit of setting themselves up as (global) role models without (considered) thought to (the) urgent requirements of oppressed peoples that must otherwise take precedence over manners of freedom formally understood by a free society.

• • •

The Electoral College was established to accommodate National and Federal forms of government (appealing to local interests). This plan was adopted as a compromise between political factions favoring the Popular Vote (states with larger populations) and others preferring a proportionate voice in government or (states with smaller populations). The E.C. has its (modern) critics, however, who are seeking to replace it with the Popular Vote. This measure, while upsetting the bi-cameral symmetry that remains the underlining genius behind our form of government, would likely invest (disproportionate) political influence in the hands of citizens residing in relatively fewer, however more densely populated states. What follows should give pause to those straddling the fence on this issue: California's popular vote (54 electoral votes) for example, could potentially neutralize the combined votes of Delaware (3), Maine (4), Hawaii (4), Alaska (3), New Mexico (5), Nevada (4), Utah (5), Idaho (4), Montana (3), Wyoming (3), North Dakota (3), South Dakota (3), Vermont (3), New Hampshire (4), and Rhode Island (4) or fifteen states in all presently under the "protection" of the E.C. This measure could conceivably undermine the (varied) interests and concerns of a nation whose (increasing) plurality presently spans an entire continent (and beyond).

•••

Addendum to the above: My line of reasoning may strike some as circumstantial or unlikely. I am making a case, however, for proportional voting. I exaggerate to make a point that although the E.C. is not the perfect solution, (a relatively handful of densely populated states strategically allied could conceivably influence the course of an election), abolishing it would further erode the (already) marginalized impact of voters residing in thinly populated areas.

• • •

Addendum to the above: Al Gore won the Popular Vote against (now) President George Bush, while narrowly losing the Electoral College. Democrats are still throwing a temper tantrum over that bitterly contested election nearly two years after its outcome has been (legally) decided.

• • •

A creditable opinion is conditioned by an underlying awareness of the (essential) properties inherent in its (tested) propositions.

A central requirement inherent in any informed opinion lies in the credibility of its (tested) propositions.

A veritable opinion must overcome the challenges posed by a variety of different viewpoints.

A formidable opinion must be willing to confront the testimony of other opinions that might otherwise seek to either refute or discredit its (tested) propositions.

Opinions are oftentimes the extensions of (predetermined) belief systems.

The absence of (determined) counter arguments, on the other hand, must inevitably preclude any possibility of intended results.

Most Opinions are oftentimes impressed upon an individual during the formative stages of that individual's moral and intellectual development.

• • •

There exists an "inner" wisdom or "consciousness of knowing" that is not immediately apparent; exceeding the sum of everything that is (either) known or has the potential of being known that is (otherwise) unknown unless an individual is properly inclined to pursue or know (it); that oftentimes seeks the supporting testimony of other individuals engaged in similar trials of their own.

• • •

Conversion should not be confused with inherited superstition but some (hidden) knowledge, rather, properly revealed in all its forms.

• • •

An individual having been raised in an atheistic environment lacking religious content cannot be (reasonably) expected to make properly informed decisions about the existence of God; that individual having been conditioned by a preemptive notion of God's existence to begin with.

• • •

"Objective" pursuits such as ascertaining the validity of a mathematical or legal postulate or some other undemonstrated proposition, for example, are conditioned rather than perfected by scholastic examination.

•••

An idea that has not been properly tested does not (necessarily) imply its non-existence!

••

That an individual may suddenly "feel" the unexpected "loss" of a close friend or loved one who is still living; conveying an (uncertain) sense that "something" is missing, whose "absence", occasioned by "unforeseen" events, are understood to promote suffering, conditioned as many of us are by the dynamics of the past/future that have already shaped and will continue shaping our lives.

• • •

Humankind is one with the Supreme Being whose inner-presence is a foretaste of His glorious designs that bear witness of Him, (yet) which is not Him, however suggestive of Him, (yet) unites us closer with Him, fashioned as each of us are in His own manner.

• • •

Christ's Resurrection is the cornerstone of Christianity. Without it, Christianity is a chimera, a fanciful notion. The de-emphasizing of Christ's Divinity by nominal "Christians," (Protestants and sadly, Catholics alike), stressing His good works and moral teachings (only); that is to say, His "Humanism" in contrast with His Divinity, is troubling to traditional believers who correctly understand that without the Resurrection, the redemption of sin occasioned by His own self-sacrifice is meaningless. Such thinking oftentimes resonates with radical religious viewpoints that have influenced Christian thinking in recent years; that is to say, have willfully misinterpreted the teachings of Christ in order to promote capricious notions of "social justice" and other "progressive" causes.

• • •

Visionary notions of a heaven on earth, aside from diminishing Heaven's supernatural standing, sets a disturbing precedence among individuals seeking to place a higher value on their own capacities on the basis of uncertain designs whose "inestimable" qualities must invariably promote arbitrary standards of excellence proceeding from fallible sources susceptible to lapses in judgment however

"well-intentioned." Where such perceptions are found to be extreme, the doers of "good deeds" are likely to internalize their own salvation through artificial applications that seek mastery over their own destinies.

• • •

Political Activism for some individuals, especially those coming of age in the sixties and seventies, has become a virtual fountain of youth that seeks to preserve a radical past within the framework of the present. Its youthful caricature has devolved into emotional and intellectual anachronisms indifferent to progressive methods and novel designs; unaware of society's changing requirements and where that society is heading.

• • •

Initiative functions best in a non-controlling environment.

• • •

A mistake is properly understood as some misunderstanding or misconception or miscalculation; that is to say, an error in "intellectual" judgment that should not be confused, however, with an error or lapse in "moral" judgment. The former is oftentimes based on faulty (intellectual) assumptions or premises or an inability to think (critically); the latter, on deficient reasoning. In this manner, a lapse in judgment due to neglect or an inability to reason (clearly) is not necessarily a mitigating factor for behavior that (otherwise) occasions undue hardships on other people, especially when the intended outcome of some particular action, in whatever manner conceived, should have or could have been properly determined beforehand; apart from such actions performed under abnormal circumstances or under duress that should be provided certain allowances, perhaps; otherwise, in all other respects the consequences of determined actions should be reckoned with. Neither is "ignorance" or an "improper" understanding of its "unintended" results justified in every manner that oftentimes provides a convenient outlet for informed individuals who were (consciously) aware of the probable affects of their actions to begin with.

• • •

The War on Terror is encountering a great deal of opposition from the (hard) Left who continue to advance the notion of American Moral Culpability; that is to say, that America is the (historical) root cause of (all) worldly grievances and should therefore make every conceivable effort to redress certain points of contention that have evolved from its own (alleged) transgressions; thereby giving (justifiable) cause to the underlying motives that led up to the events of 9/11. These appeasing designs (cloaked as open-mindedness) are being advanced from a position of weakness that will (inevitably) strengthen the morale of our ideological enemies while proportionately weakening our nation's resolve to defend itself from further attacks. • • •

Whenever I reflect on the "Holocaust" (one of many since the latter half of the twentieth century), I am reminded of how many of its victims succumbed to the loss of life as well as the untold indignities that many individuals were (otherwise) subjected to in one manner or another. The survivors of these atrocities have never completely recovered from the painful recollection of their miserable and demoralizing existence that sought to degrade the human spirit. Its perpetrators and willing accomplices responsible for these tragic events lost something as well: their souls! Such will prove far more difficult to retrieve than their (human) dignity. It may be a minor consolation to the individuals and families involved, perhaps. Nevertheless, it gives considered pause to the notion that tragedy burns its candles at both ends, directing its prominent characters toward some fated center that must inevitably come to terms; the

offended seeking retribution, the offender, redemption.

• • •

A number of (politically) prominent individuals have achieved historical repute for their providential and skillful management of exceptional events that defined their tenure in (public) office notwithstanding the reluctance of some who were neither willing or able to meet the extraordinary challenges that confronted them; provoked to action, however, by the enlightened examples of others before taking formal or appropriate action in response to such events. The morally and intellectually constant are oftentimes prepared to assume the mantle of leadership in sharp contrast with other individuals who, lacking courage or insight, are likely to dismiss such opportunities that Chance has otherwise occasioned. In this manner, contemporary events aligned with historical processes have oftentimes "conspired" in overriding the feckless apathy or uncertain character of political leaders who must be properly guided toward "destiny's" chartered course.

• • •

An individual can neither recall the dead nor make proper allowances to loved ones that he or she has disappointed in his or her lifetime. Nevertheless, I am not uncertain that many of us may one day reclaim their affections. Otherwise, why so much fuss and bother seeking redemption for perceived failings that made our mutual existence intolerable to begin with?

• • •

Addendum to the above: That the passing of a loved one whom we've disappointed may (otherwise) occasion a better person is some consolation for our mutual sorrow(s), I suppose.

• • •

Savvy is a highbrow counterpart to Street Smarts.

• • •

Moral Relativism lacks a supporting structure; that is to say, lacks a universal standard by which to (correctly) assess the proposed merits of some moral or ethical proposition whereas Moral Absolutism, drawn to its own (unconditional) point(s) of reference or final conclusions, oftentimes assumes too heavy a burden that must otherwise be lessened by degrees or fall under its own weight.

• • •

Unconditional forgiveness without qualification is oftentimes misguided!

• • •

Thought oftentimes transcends the material limits of its immediate environment explaining in part why the mind is never quite so much at "home."

• • •

Certain propositions may contain a kernel of truth however uncertain, unless properly considered in their entirety. Such notable exceptions, however, whenever (correctly) regarded, should not be understood as relative or measured truths as they may otherwise relate to suppositions perceived in a particular manner under peculiar circumstances or falling within exclusive parameters.

• • •

The greatest obstacle in the pursuit of Truth is an individual's reluctance to alter his or her (own) decided opinions.

• • •

So many stray and sickly animals, poor things! Once laid peacefully to rest, however, suffer no more; unlike the Human Animal whose quasi-spiritual nature (naturally) resistant to such designs has suddenly altered its course!

• • •

Ebbing (Spiritual) Faith in the wake of Secular Assaults designed to sow doubt in the minds of Believers by eliminating (Public) Reminders that further undermine Spiritual Resolve!

• • •

Among the notable screen legends of yesteryear, few commend themselves to modern audiences like John Wayne and Humphrey Bogart, both of whom continue to enjoy a certain cult following, impressing their mark on Conservatives/Liberals in a manner consistent, with some exceptions, to each's own particular social or political orientation. The "Duke" epitomized the embodiment of Traditional American Values while "Bogie" personified the "Anti-Hero." Addendum to the above: Lest we forget Loretta Young.

"I will vote for the best candidate," the best qualified to lead our nation, possessing the highest credentials, of unblemished character ad nauseam, are worthy sentiments that in practice, however, oftentimes succumb to the temptations of party loyalties.

• • •

Homosexual Priests, including those who have taken a vow of celibacy, falling prey to the appeals of temptation, whose sexual orientation are oftentimes viewed in broader terms, encouraged, in part, by a modern culture opposed to Traditional Church Teachings, form, on some subconscious level, at least, attitudes "naturally" opposed to such teachings considered either severe or inconsonant with "open-minded" modernist viewpoints.

. . .

Science has been able to modify the molecular structure of Matter understood within the (existing) framework of material laws; whose combination (of atoms) in specific alignment will alter its "identity." Tinkering with an atom by changing its valence through the process of ionization, for example, will alter the genetic formula or assigned components of some erstwhile element. On the other hand, no amount of social engineering can permanently alter the unyielding character of Human Nature that, left to its own device, ultimately returns to its natural condition on its own accord.

. . .

Christian Theologians are generally in agreement that Abraham's remarkable Leap of Faith; his steadfast obedience to God's command that he offer up in sacrifice his only son (Isaac), constitutes the highest example of Selfless-Faith encountered in the bible. I must place Joseph right alongside Abraham as a Pillar of Faith. I believe that you and I generally agree on apostolic points of reference whose teachings are "clearly" outlined in The Gospels. Where matters become a bit shaky for many practicing Catholics, however, are areas lacking definite assurances or clarity as they relate to the teachings of the Gospel or in the traditional writings of our Church Fathers. Many of Christ's teachings are "understood" in parables interpreted for the Faithful by Church Scholars whose explanations are oftentimes relied upon by lay people whose limited (scriptural) understanding requires spiritual guidance.

The fallibility of our priests who have followed their own conscience on matters of form and (personal) conduct, are gradually losing the traditional support of their parishioners. I am not necessarily speaking of homosexuality although that too has become an overriding concern to practicing Catholics in recent years.

I believe that many of us could use a little bit more of that old-fashioned-styled "Fire and Brimstone" conspicuously absent from today's sermons inasmuch as many of our priests have succumbed to politically correct manners inconsistent with church teachings. Sadly, a number of priests are reluctant, it seems, to challenge modernist viewpoints for fear of alienating their parishioners leery of a church presently under indictment by the courts of public opinion. (He who lives in glass houses.....

Speaking of which, while attending services this past Sunday, a semi-retired priest invited by our parish to say Mass, gave a sermon on family values. He stated in his sermon, and I quote, "God created Adam and Eve, not Adam and Steve." Can you image that! How fortunate for him a reporter wasn't in attendance.

I believe that the Church must begin distancing itself from secular viewpoints incompatible with traditional church teachings. What we need are more manly priests who are not afraid to brandish the spiritual sword.

I consider it a Christian Duty to be on the "wrong" side of History, if that in fact is where most traditional practicing Catholics presently find themselves. Since returning to the Church, I have made every effort, inasmuch as it lies within my power, to place principle ahead of falsely conceived notions of Historical Determinism. The choices we make are not inevitable. The results of such choices are independent of "preceding" designs, that is to say, each of us has it within ourselves to influence our own spiritual destiny through God's gift of Free Will.

One final point, I wish to clarify what I meant by the Church's Infallibility. I was trying to advance an argument on two levels: On the one, that the Church stands "apart" from its members while on a higher level, the Church and its members are united as one spiritual body (or Community of Believers). In this manner, its members are integrated parts constituting a common whole in the manner each part is considered one with that body. Should one of its members (part) transgress (sin), every member (whole) is equally offended, that is to say, the body (Church) suffers the consequences of that transgression. A simple analogy will hopefully serve to reinforce my argument. When some part of the human body is traumatized, it doesn't matter which part, the shock will resonate throughout the entire body, that is to say, make that body uneasy or unsteady. Its origin is useful, however, in the manner of localizing a cure. One might reasonably adopt a similar argument whenever a member (part) of the Church (whole) has transgressed. Every member brought together as a whole is equally affected. Another way of putting it is that each part is inextricably involved with the whole. Returning to the question of Sin, the Church, therefore, has "sinned" by association and must therefore be held accountable whoever the sinner. I said accountable, not responsible. There's a subtle difference here! Each member, if my part/whole assumption holds up, is therefore held accountable for the consequences that may otherwise follow because the transgressions of any single member has unfavorably affected the reputation of the (entire) body.

By "somebody", I mean the tendency many of us have of attaching far greater importance to ourselves than many of us justly merit, inclined as we oftentimes are of internalizing our self-importance. The Vietnam War was a defining moment in American and European politics that produced ideological divisions at home and abroad, giving rise to moral equivocations and modernist geopolitical assumptions whose (dire) impact on critical political thinking continue to resonate through present times. Existing political tensions transcending the boundaries of American Society have steadily undermined America's fragile alliance with Europe in recent years. Nowhere is this fissure more apparent than that separating its Liberal and Conservative components. Europe, in particular, has taken a decidedly leftward turn. Liberalism's gradual departure from traditional conventions and quasi/moderate viewpoints coupled with its uncanny fascination with centralized authority has engendered an utopic, foolishly optimistic worldview based on imaginary global assumptions rather than practical means. While not openly supporting Communism, the movement achieved its intended purpose that sought to deflect public criticism. Such arguments, of course, were designed to confuse and win over the naïve and (politically) gullible whose wayside seeds failed to firmly take root. What has indeed been assimilated from having lived yet having forgotten all; that is to say, wherein lay the principle examples of forgotten impressions?

That life ends before it really begins; destined to revolve eternally in circles.

That the Wheel of Life appears much too harsh and unforgiving!

More comforting a God whose unlimited wisdom, immeasurable leniency and boundless capacity for forgiveness – we commend our souls.

Inclined to sin – Humankind – forgivable – self - correcting – (through) acts of faith (and) contrition - clemency in proportion to the sincerity of the supplicant's request.

Materialism isn't so much a Condition of Wealth as a Condition of Mind.

• • •

We oftentimes hear people say "I believe that there is 'something' out there" (whether "it" be good, bad or indifferent). Such thinking, in my view, sets a disturbing spiritual precedence among "believers" who, having failed to establish a close, personal relationship with God, establish (instead) an unwholesome pattern of skepticism.

• • •

Its elasticity renders the Constitution a "living" organism subject to contemporary interpretations or (the) prevailing temper (moral climate) of modern times.

• • •

Laws, in the absence of binding (principle) origins constitute a transitory, variable system of rules conditioned by current fashions without regard to (the) underlying (moral) assumptions that otherwise provide (customary) perspective to a well-ordered, (continuous) society.

• • •

Whenever legal revisions are inconsonant with the underlying assumptions of Original Intent, such modifications are improperly considered and, in some instances, morally objectionable (Abortion) once their conceptual designs have been improperly compromised or incorrectly interpreted.

• • •

There are two forms of bias: The first is inductive, whereby specific premises or assumptions are employed to support some general conclusion about some individual or group: Christians believe in God; therefore all Christians are religious fanatics. The second is deductive, whereby general conclusions (relating to same) are adopted to reach some specific conclusion: Scotchmen are stingy; therefore Tavish MacDougal is a cheapskate.

Although I am not principally opposed to inter-planetary travel, it would seem that given the number of pressing social and economic issues demanding our immediate attention right here at home, financial resources otherwise allocated to NASA would be put to better use by attending to the requirements of a planet that our progeny will continue calling home for centuries to come rather than exploring (uninhabitable) regions for no apparent reason other than satisfying quixotical designs.

A Self-Contained Community is unachievable unless Human Nature achieves some measure of contentment.

• • •

Western Democratic Nations have been conditioned by questionable rules of military engagement or "proper" codes of conduct alien to Middle Eastern thinking. Such attitudes must inevitably foster uncertain hardships on our fighting men and women engaged in battle with an enemy untroubled by such scruples.

Introspection: or Quality Time with Oneself.

. . .

Critical Scrutiny is a necessary requirement in forming a proper Estimate of Things.

In the absence of absolute standards against which moral questions may be weighed, there can be no compelling argument between Right and Wrong.

. . .

A troubling (social) phenomenon has been gaining momentum in recent years: an increasing Islamic presence within the African American Community whose "converts" generally fall into one of two groups: Its more radical members with traditional "axes to grind" who have lost confidence in the American way of life or notions of a color blind society and a softer version that perceives the Christian Community as an extension of an oppressive "White Society." In either case, the general impression of unfulfilled promises has sparked defections in favor of a "religious" culture perceived as inclusive (sic) and generally more responsive to the "spiritual" and social requirements of that Community. I do not entertain any doubts on this score, that this movement is politically and socially driven rather than motivated by religious principles although exceptions certainly exist. Although my line of reasoning may appear to be an oversimplification of a complex issue, its basic premise, I believe, contains some measure of truth. Be that what it may, one of the more troubling aspects of this "apostatizing" movement is underscored by its more extreme examples (Nation of Islam) whose members have parted company with America's social and religious traditions adopting, in many instances, racist attitudes toward Western Culture that most feel alienated. More troubling, however, has been the emergence of Fifth Columnists who are using our college campuses, correctional facilities and, sadly to say, military establishments as recruiting (indoctrination) centers for advancing racist and anti-American viewpoints. Even more troubling has been the feckless compliance of our political and social leaders who have placed political correctness ahead of common sense by providing fertile training grounds for the "enemy within." (Lest I come under fire, I am speaking of hard-core elements of which there exists a growing number!)

Everyone is entitled to his or her (own) points of view provided they do not seek to mis-characterize the opinions of others.

• • •

Cigarette importers in Ireland are required by law to inscribe a warning label on every pack that reads: "Cigarettes Kill". That the Irish Government has no scruples over its unconscionable decision to levy taxes from the sale of a (toxic) product that it "knows" (for certain) is "definitively" lethal exceeds the hypocrisy of its warning labels. In this manner, the practice (of selling cigarettes) arguably constitutes accessory to murder!

Today the "One World Alliance," tomorrow the "Federation of Planets."

• • •

Whenever I find myself on a structured tour of a venerable home (or estate) of historical interest; one inhabited by "ghosts", perhaps, it (oftentimes) strikes me as if my (unwelcome) presence constituted, in some manner, a retroactive intrusion into the lives of its "former" occupants; that in some (uncertain) manner, such intimacies, once enjoyed by families and friends, have been placed on (public) display. So too are our (own) private affairs violated in a present/future conjunctive by the prospective dynamics of subsequent designs of uncertain origin.

Truth is correctly understood as the systematic arrangement of thoughtful ideas and reasoned assumptions conforming to factual standards prescribed by the (Eternal) Law(s) of Nature. In this manner, the Highest Truth(s) are correctly considered Absolute or Perfect in Meaning. Formal attempts to override its essential features, in whatever manner, will not alter the infallibility of its designs; that is to say, make it any less true. This argument does not necessarily apply, however, to "lower" or evolving truths; that is to say, immeasurable "truths" lacking infinite proportion; conditioned by circumstances or events that (oftentimes) require a reassessment of their former assumptions whose (ambiguous) validity lacks a critical center.

Justice and Fairness are prescriptive normatives; legal and social assumptions that find public expression in the (established) customs and practices (or historical traditions) of societies whose customary standards are a work in process subject to oversight and subsequent revision, whenever required.

• • •

Tolerance requires an "intuitive" capacity to render sound (moral) judgments as they relate to essential motives and/or principle ideas that form the template of a well-ordered society that do not reflexively support tolerance for its own sake without giving proper pause to discriminating factors that correctly defines appropriate conduct.

• •

Subtraction is a process whereby some known or (measurable) quantity is deducted from another known quantity. Therefore, it (necessarily) follows that nothing, understood as non-existence, can be subtracted from nothing. Neither can nothing be added to or create some other something, for that matter. In this manner, "Being" can not be the result of Nothingness but the outcome, rather of some pre-existing "Something."

Orestes Brownson once remarked that "man is not only a religious or spiritual being but a political or national one as well...[that] the absence of such military spirit, experience shows, encourages the evils humanitarians most aim to avoid."

• • •

Conscience is not always able to form a correct estimate of things; therefore, its "reasonable" faculties should be considered problematical unless assisted by Divine Wisdom or Right Reasoning.

• • •

Traditions are subject to changing societal assumptions operating within the prisms of modern insights that periodically revisit a society's established customs and manners although remaining faithful to their essential designs(s).

• • •

The underlying confusion over not being able to "tell the forest from the trees" lies in mistaken impressions that incorrectly estimate the relationship between a whole and its parts. Therefore, a forest populated by trees, in a manner that properly defines a forest, may be misconstrued by less discerning minds as a collection of trees (parts) rather than a forest (whole). The same argument applies, in part, to individuals "examining all sides of an issue." By focusing exclusively on a single dimension, (width, length or height), of some geometric configuration, for example, an observer may otherwise lose sight of what each spatial measure brought together properly represents; that is to say, a rectangle, square or triangle or some other material arrangement for that matter. In this manner, the vital link establishing a connection between integrated parts has been severed, thereby rendering each impression or idea, uncertain or meaningless by having assigned the essential character of that whole to each (constituent) part.

• • •

Addendum to the above: Therefore, by examining all sides of an issue, without giving proper thought to form, an individual may oftentimes lose sight of the issue, itself.

Anti-American sentiment hasn't changed much over the years with the (notable) exception that Communism has been superseded by Jihadist Islamic Fascism equally committed to the destruction of Western Institutions. To this purpose, a number of terrorist organizations are being routinely supported by hostile (Arab) Nations sharing a common, distorted primitive worldview of Western Values encouraged, in part, by soft-headed internationalists, self-congratulatory appeasers, and useful idiots who continue to provide a moral and intellectual base of support to the ideological opponents of Freedom. L.P. "Are you telling me that you would have someone arrested for picking a flower from your front yard"?

C.P. "Yes, I would."

L.P. "That's rather harsh, wouldn't you agree?"

C.P. "It's vandalism."

L.P. "Isn't the punishment rather severe for such a minor infraction?"

C.P. "So where do you suppose we should draw the line?"

L.P. "What line? We're talking about a flower, here!"

C.P. "A flower today, an uprooted garden tomorrow."

L.P. "Because of some minor infraction?"

C.P. "It may appear trivial to you, perhaps. Such attitudes, however, contributed to Mayor Giuliani's enormous success as a law and order guy."

Subject: Mortal Sin

Personal Sin(1846-1876)

A mortal sin is a fundamental rejection of God's love. By it, God's grace-presence is driven from the sinner. Mortal means "deathdealing." This sin kills God's life and love in the person sinning. For a sin to be mortal, there must be 1) serious matter, 2) sufficient reflection, and 3) full consent of the will (1854–1861)

A venial sin is a less serious rejection of God's love. Venial means "easily forgiven." A sin is venial if the offense is not serious or...if the matter is serious...the person is not sufficiently aware of the evil involved or does not fully consent to sin.

A premeditated (action) is a self-motivated (action) whose (calculated) designs and (intended) outcome are planned and understood beforehand. Its specific aim or, as a point of argument, subject of intent, is not necessarily the overriding factor (however) but rather an ancillary consideration with respect to intent; that is to say, incidental to pre-existing intentions as such intentions and ensuing actions may (otherwise) produce unintended results triggered by original intent in whatever manner the outcome was unintended. Therefore, when some intended action has promoted harm to some individual other than the intended individual or subject of that intended action, and although the intended subject of that intended action has been spared injury, the unintended result of the intended action is considered a premeditated action against the injured party although that individual was not the intended subject of that intended action to begin with.

Addendum to the above: The "intent" is premeditated!

• • •

Reason is subject to a variety of propositions, uncertain assumptions and questionable councils that oftentimes limit its ability to estimate things correctly or by passions likely to promote a corrupting influence on its ability to make rational decisions. In some manner, Reason, unlike Instinct, lacks a natural capacity for self-sufficiency.....(and spontaneity). Reason must be carefully instructed in order to achieve the highest level of its natural potential unlike Instinct whose adaptive nature, restricted (solely) to immediate things, need not concern itself over substantive matters that should otherwise give pause to critical thinking.

• • •

I am not certain that per-capita income; that is to say, what each worker receives in monetary value on average from the yearly (gross domestic) income generated by a nation's economy, is a reliable indicator of "national prosperity" (understood, in some circles, as the greatest material benefit for the greatest number) inasmuch as these indicators factor disparate incomes whose (broad) variances do not necessarily provide an accurate estimate of "average" earnings. Neither does the unemployment rate provide an accurate measure of how well the economy is performing in market environments where underemployment rates are exceptionally high. Neither does consumer spending, when measured against credit card and bank debt.

• • •

Addendum to the above: Higher rates of lower-paying jobs; that is to say, higher rates of "under-employment" will oftentimes distort unemployment statistics in the same (inverse) manner statistics report higher achievement levels in "formerly" under performing schools, especially those located in predominately urban areas, in proportion to their lowering of academic standards. In this manner

these artificially contrived results should be considered statistically flawed as well.

. . .

...spiritual anxiety's fascination with new-age remedies, supernatural fashions and "messianic" forms; spiritual elixirs designed to tempt Faith that more often than not perjure rather than strengthen the spirit...

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I envision a day when class distinctions, with the exception of two, (Master and Servant) will be formally abolished. These "traditional" arrangements, understood from a modernist perspective, however, will be reversed whereby (the) Master ("Oppressor") will serve (the) Servant ("Victim")...if Modern Society hasn't reached that stage already!

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Speaking of Miracles: The body's self-healing powers are no minor miracle in themselves!

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There is a very fine line that separates being (genuinely) helpful from being a (general) nuisance!

There is no recalling the Dead; no redemption, regrets, remonstrations, gashing of teeth or second chances, only Faith in our dearly departed who continue in their own inestimable manner to offer forgiveness (and guidance) from beyond the grave.

... where artificial assumptions are permitted to trump inspired ambition(s)...

• • •

A re-emerging Past oftentimes informs the Present; recalling its traditional customs... promoting an uncertain alliance or vague sense of being that is neither one nor the other, a society in transition (temporarily) held in check by (its) historical observances...lost causes... valiantly, however hopelessly, making a final stand...exhausting its remaining capital (or influence)...while that society's hereditary assumptions are gradually supersede by modern designs...in a manner whose key essentials, values, and moral imperatives that typically defined that society's traditional character, its social, cultural and political institutions, provide a "retrospective" overview of things to come.

President Bush's flawed Immigration Reform Bill providing "conditional" amnesty to 12 million illegal aliens must be reassuring to 1) (Moderate) Republicans who would consider its passage a political opportunity to place the party in better stead with Hispanic Voters and the Business Community, 2) Corporations seeking to attract Cheap(er) Labor, 3) Democrats who, for the same reasons indicated above, are uncomfortable with the idea of controlling our nation's borders at the risk of alienating a sizeable voting bloc and (who) would otherwise seize the moment, for purely political reasons, to challenge Republican proposals that (surprise!) 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I believe that most Liberals have been unfairly characterized as Pacifists. From what I have been able to gather, few, if any, have ever

demonstrated signs of timidity or caution as they otherwise relate to their relentless persecution of the "Unborn."

. . .

Secularists and Atheists alike have long expunged Evil (in its purest sense) from its lexicon as a word commonly thought to convey a religious (read: superstitious) connotation consistent with irrational impulses or ideas rather than "considered reasoning." Instead, Evil has acquired a subjective meaning; that is to say, lacking certitude or prone to conventional (or essential) assumptions whose questionable propositions render formal interpretations problematical, if not (morally or ethically) judgmental because of their underlying "uncertainty," thereby raising the question: what constitutes Good, for that matter? Plato argued that "which we call evil is merely ignorance and that good is that which everyone desires". I find his line of reasoning far too simplistic. That Good is what "everyone" desires doesn't necessarily conform to what is "good" in itself. That we may desire something that appears useful or of immediate service does not necessarily constitute a "philosophical" good or that which provides moral value or meaning or (otherwise) accrues to our moral excellence but (rather) some thing we might otherwise consider ample or sufficient to satisfy our "needs". Evil has acquired a quasi-mythical character whose "primitive" notions are considered unworthy of any "right thinking," "enlightened" individual whose flagging (moral) perceptions no longer seem to bewilder the imagination.

• • •

Addendum to the above: Evil has become a word that is oftentimes employed like any other (common) word; that is to say, without any (special) meaning or regard to context. Therefore, President Bush's political detractors may routinely compare him with Adolph Hitler or Saddam Hussein without risking political capital because, by and large, Evil has lost all sense of (definite) proportion.

• • •

I find it interesting how many modern biographers oftentimes portray Charles Dickens as a (minor) social revolutionary or a man possessing what is commonly referred to by "progressives," a "social consciousness." There is no disputing the fact that Dickens did indeed possess keen insight into the behavioral aspects and designs of Human Nature; that is to say, the "Hearts and Minds of Men." It might be precisely for this reason that he was neither a committed iconoclast nor shaker of things but simply a passionate recorder of our human failings. His "benign" approach to reform did not in any manner imply a moral neutrality but a call for public awareness, rather. Dickens was in every respect a man of conventional manners and tastes who sought to reform existing (societal) arrangements without (needlessly) upsetting the social fabric. He placed little faith in the efficacy of legal and social institutions as potential forces for promoting (attitudinal) change that (otherwise) required a voluntary change of "heart" in order to eliminate the prevailing social injustices directed against the poorer classes at that time.

• • •

Addendum to the above: Contemporary Liberalism's irrational contempt for anything Christian has given rise to the troubling notion that God has "vanished;" that is to say, left Humankind to its own devices....if He ever existed to begin with! This manner of wishful (Secularist) thinking has reinforced our society's collective dependence on the very institutions Dickens was skeptical about. Perhaps such self-fulfilling prophecies are signs of things to come, absent the "Invisible Hand" of Providence that properly guides the actions of those (otherwise) given to Good Works.

• • •

The Will to Prosper is a powerful motivator in achieving Success. Experience has shown, on any number of occasions, how many individuals possessing (quite) ordinary talents have achieved levels of performance exceeding the limits of their natural abilities or what their native capacity might otherwise suggest. For this reason, every overachiever should take proper measure of his or her remarkable accomplishments.

• • •

There are two types of sin: Original Sin that proceeds from Humankind's natural (fallen) condition or general state of mind and Willful Sin that constitutes a voluntary by-product of an individual's (purposeful) actions. "What I am as opposed to 'What I do'" (C.S. Lewis).

• • •

A final thought about spiritual anxiety: "ready to take any shape but able to retain none" (C.S. Lewis).

• • •

While allowing that the answers/solutions to certain questions/problems that are problematical/complex oftentimes require a higher degree of critical thinking or insight than is normally required, a more simplistic approach to problem solving should be pursued whenever circumstances allow. There is an underlying tendency, however, among certain individuals to render complex what are otherwise rather simple propositions. This attitude is common among high-brow individuals who, inspired by their own (conceited) self-importance, are oftentimes likely to complicate simple matters for their (own) intended purposes of being "misunderstood," or for others, a cover-up for their ineptitude!

Addendum to the above: In the political arena: a form of deception common among politicians fearful of the political consequences such simple solutions might otherwise occasion!

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I read that Howard Dean recently criticized President Bush for having "recklessly" engaged our nation in a war in order to satisfy a vendetta against "a pathetic old man." Mr. Dean's distorted reasoning and outrageous assumption makes me shudder to think that the former Democratic front runner might have been this (_) close to the presidency had this loose cannon not self-destructed during the Iowa Primary. His unreasonable attack (for political reasons) against a sitting president during a time of war should be encouraging to our mortal enemies who continue monitoring our nation's internal divisions for their own strategic advantage.

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Addendum to the above: Mr. Dean's thoughtless remarks about a "pathetic old man" recalls the relentless efforts of dedicated Nazi Hunters who spent the greater part of their (adult) lives tracking down and bringing to justice "former" war criminals who evaded criminal prosecution after the war and lived to a "respectable," ripe old age. Neither age, illness nor a new identity, or remorse, for that matter, properly absolves any individual for his or her past crimes, especially Crimes against Humanity. It would appear, however, that Mr. Dean is willing to extend an exculpatory "mulligan" for evildoers who have reached a "venerable" age; however uncertain that Mr. Hussein will ever be entitled to such respect.

• • •

There are (special) moments in our lives that many of us have experienced at one time or another that should be properly filed away for safe keeping and never revisited again lest we tarnish the exceptionable qualities that made those moments (in retrospect) special to begin with. Perhaps it would be best leaving well enough alone rather than trying to revive memories that presently lie above and beyond the (present) timeline continuum; that is to say, existing somewhere beyond "themselves," in time. Such moments, that inevitably lose some measure of (reminiscent) proportion should we try to recapture them, can never be formally revisited without diminishing the (pleasant) memories that made/make those moments (special) to begin with; that should otherwise retain, however, a rightful place in our thoughts.

• • •

The middle-class exodus from the "Inner City" during the middle of the twentieth century hastened the departure of its tax base and, of far greater importance and consequence, an established set of traditional core values vital to the productive dynamics of a wellordered community; leaving in its wake, a combustible mixture of rising expectations and diminishing (principled/intellectual) resources. These (formal) values radiated a spirit of (public) enthusiasm and (private) aspirations for a better future that seem conspicuously absent in a number of today's decaying urban environments.

• • •

An individual should utilize proper discretion (whenever possible) when engaging in (public) conversation; especially when that individual's perceived style or manner (of speech) or "problematical expressions" might be "misinterpreted" or considered offensive to certain members of his or her audience. This is sadly the case in a day and age when the uncertainty of "ill-chosen" words may oftentimes occasion unintended consequences damaging to an individual's reputation. Feigned indignation and fabricated reprisals designed to redress historical grievances in matters of gender, race and ethnicity should be a troubling proposition for any society whose lack of (dialectic) proportion makes it increasingly difficult to correctly assess the (determined) aspects or (appropriate) limits of free speech.

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Addendum to the above: Therefore, a casual remark like "it's a bit nippy outside" might be considered offensive to Asian Americans or that a company is operating "in the red" equally offensive to Native Americans or suggesting that an individual is "niggardly," a slight to African Americans or a "Mexican Stand-Off"...well, you get the idea!

That God exists in Eternity (or outside the limits of time and space) is consistent with His knowledge of "future" events that are uniform with the "past" and "present" and the doctrine of Free Will that operates concurrently along (the) space/time continuum. Free Will, however, does not preclude God from influencing (or changing) the course of events, however, for His (own) intended purpose(s) should He so desire although such is arguably in accordance with His (own) pre-determined designs; that is to say, what God wills has (already) been done.

Walter Cronkite, America's "venerable" journalist, has agreed to cover the Republican National Convention for MTV. A radio talk show host recently referred to Mr. Cronkite's "plum" assignment ("Gig") as a coup for the television station. (Read: Conservative Blacks!) Such impressions, (oftentimes) guided by (opportunistic) political and social "leaders" harboring a vested interest in maintaining the status quo in order to consolidate their political power base by forging racial alliances designed to sever popular accord, are unlikely to change anytime soon in the absence of alternative, more creditable viewpoints.

Primitive Cultures possessed an inchoate awareness of its superior (natural) standing vis-à-vis the Beast although such impressions were comparatively intuitive rather than properly informed by "reason." Humankind's primitive condition was not the inevitable outcome of (essential) designs inasmuch as a starting point in Nature, rather, that would eventually launch its spiritual, moral and rational potential. Free Will is that which separates Man from Beast. The former is informed by Reason and Conscience, the latter, by Instinct. The faculty of Free Will allows Humankind to make (reasonable) decisions. Although the choices that we oftentimes make are the inevitable outcome of Free Will, such decisions, however, are not...inevitable! Unlike the Beast, that lacks a moral directory, Humankind enjoys a variety of moral templates derived from an eternal source. However imperfectly formed in their thinking, primitives were guided by a transcendent moral authority that, however unclear, informed their respective culture(s). These models (I will refer to them as models for purposes of discussion) that serve to properly inform an individual; that is to say, define appropriate rules of conduct, vary in proportion (or meaning) to that individual's or society's present stage of spiritual, moral and intellectual development. Where the mind is not completely formed (Primitive) or has corrupted itself (Pride) or has been corrupted (Illness or Disease), however, such models may be found lacking "significant" meaning or purpose or otherwise lose their appeal. What ultimately defines an individual's (moral) character are the decisions that he or she makes. (This viewpoint is based on the assumption

that that individual is able to correctly distinguish between right and wrong) These models are not necessarily mandates (for choice) but guidelines, rather, that provide compelling reasons for making the right decisions to begin with. Neither are these models necessarily intended to encourage "appropriate" conduct that should otherwise be left to Free Will to decide but reflect upon, rather, what is expected from a "right thinking" individual who is morally evolving. An individual who willingly rejects God, however, rejects (His) Natural Law as well. That individual is likely to assign "good" or "evil" as accidents of nature or circumstantial rather than "things" lying within themselves. Such thinking ultimately promotes amoral attitudes that typically characterize all forms of behavior as "morally" neutral. It fails to acknowledge sin as such; although it is willing to entertain forms of appropriate/inappropriate behavior defined by popular customs or manners that (in any event) oftentimes lose their social mandate as arbitrary conventions may vary. This (very) troubling development has provided license to the meanest (latent) tendencies, a Will to Evil justified by the negation of eternal consequence(s). The (critical) assumption of inevitable consequences as they relate to voluntary designs, however essential to the formation of sound moral character, does not predispose a Will to Good; that is to say, Free Will does not dictate the "Inevitability" of Choice. Such choices must be left for the individual to decide.

My wife (Rose) was recently assigned an audit at a nursing home in the Bronx that is owned and operated by Hassidic Jews. Her prooffered handshake to one of the facility's administrators was politely rebuffed for "religious" reasons. It seems that this gentleman considered shaking hands with a gentile offensive, although he didn't express it in quite that manner. Although I genuinely respect religious traditions, I have to confess that his attitude was very troubling to me. I feel that his excessive manner, for whatever reason, represents the meanest form of religious (and social) intolerance. With so much animosity existing in the world today, what can any of us hope for when (extreme) "religious" types, professed followers of God's teachings, conduct themselves in such an uncharitable manner!

The appalling episode at Abu Ghraib was just what the doctor ordered. The general tenor resonating within the liberal community can best be described as ecstatic indignation over the (comparative) mistreatment of Iraqi prisoners of war by over zealous prison guards. After all, it isn't as if these primordial nitwits were guilty of decapitating heads or other unmentionable acts of violence. Nevertheless, such morally reprehensible behavior, that should otherwise offend the sensibilities of any civilized nation, requires a sober assessment of what actually occurred and placing this event in its proper perspective; meting appropriate punishment if warranted. Where is the International Red Cross or Amnesty International that seem conspicuously absent whenever Westerners are mistreated? For what reason our obsessive concern over Saddam Hussein receiving three square meals and proper medical attention or that Afghan detainees at Guantanamo Bay should be issued copies of the Koran and provided legal counsel although nary a peep over the public executions of (American/European) soldiers/civilians that have become common throughout the Middle East and other parts of the world? This consistent pattern of cuddling up to our nation's enemies by liberal activists has been well chronicled over the years following the Vietnam War when tears were seldom shed for the many brave young men and women who courageously served their nation in the cause of Freedom.

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A partial truth is an incomplete truth that is an untruth!

History, as it is presently taught in the classroom, can no longer be properly thought of as History, however civic exercises in political correctness designed to advance society's proportional requirements relating to gender and race. On the other hand, it is not for me to speculate the problematical fortunes of others that God (alone) must otherwise determine.

An individual cannot be saved by "good works" alone. Such works, in whatever (worldly) manner perceived, must be preceded by Faith that is (also) insufficient in itself unless acted upon by God's sovereign favor or "Grace"; the final arbiter of Good Intentions. What is confusing to individuals seeking salvation, is the troubling notion that Grace should be the "arbitrary" by-product of God's (purposeful) designs in accordance with His Divine Will and that "earnest" appeals and (hopeful conference) remain an "uncertain" proposition irrespective of our "worthy" actions or "proven goodness". All roads are paved with good intentions, Good Intentions, limited and flawed as they oftentimes are however, are not enough! The believer must (first) place his or her trust in God, alone, who reminds each of us, who are receptive to His Wisdom, that every kindly deed, however "ordinary" or "exceptional", or every Act of Faith, cannot properly achieve its intended fulfillment without God's guiding intervention; that is to say, unless properly informed by God. The best of intentions must inevitably come full circle, reverting back to God whose Grace alone is the prerequisite for our salvation; the Beginning and the End of who we are, what we do and how we do it. Grace does not invalidate Free Will that, however expressed in accordance with God's (purposeful) designs, allows every individual to charter his or her own chosen course; that is to say, to decide whether to (freely) accept or reject what God expects from each of us or has to offer us if we willingly accept it with an open heart. These resources may be either financial or intellectual. In this (traditional) manner have individual units joined together to form a common body reinforced by a common purpose. In today's politically energized environment, however, victimization is found to work just as well.

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Addendum to the above: Convene a number of disaffected groups that effectively eliminate the universal dynamisms that "alienated" such groups to begin with!

Aristotle once said that the soothing quality of (mellifluous) music exudes a spiritual quality or essence pleasing to the soul; that is to say, spiritually uplifting. That the musical odors indigenous to the culture of his day may very well have produced that desired effect is problematical in our own musically erratic times, however.

The origin of Modern Conservativism lies in Liberal traditional principles that respected religious and individual freedom and property rights, supported free and open markets, were suspicious of big government and encouraged a strong national defense up until the time a band of influential (socialist) thinkers began embracing centralized forms of government. "I have seen the future and it works" (Lincoln Steffens). ...another troubling aspect of this "culture" is the seeming inability...or unwillingness of its members to step outside an environment that in some manner has captivated its "own"...

... an overlapping of first, second and perhaps third generations that have yet to properly assimilate within the (greater) community...

...(that is to say) particularly striking to the casual observer is an inability to differentiate between generations whose phonic accents and (ethnic) customs and forms seem to suggest an unwillingness to integrate into the mainstream...

...that the fault clearly lies in our social and political institutions that seem more concerned with preserving "national" identities for political reasons rather than escalating, as was once common, a process that gradually encourages the adoption of social and cultural attitudes characteristic of the mainstream society...

Mixed Emotions consist of (past) recollections, (present) sensations, and (future) premonitions expressed in a single event that produces an inverted humor where laughter becomes mourning and elation, dejection!

Liberals and (some) Moderate Republicans voicing their opposition over the outsourcing of jobs overseas and its dampening effect on the United States economy should give equal expression (as well) to Illegal Immigration that has similarly produced dire consequences on our domestic workforce; especially among lower wage earners. 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I would like to propose a hypothetical question to the progressive reader: If given a choice, which of the following options would you choose: having been created in God's (own) Image or having descended from the apes? Should you choose the former, how come so many of you are willing to embrace evolutionary arguments that have been widely discredited rather than entertain the Divine Wisdom of scriptural teachings that offer a more plausible explanation for our existence? 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Modern Society is in the throes of a revolutionary Revolt of Conscience; the solitary by-product of moral and intellectual parochialism that is gradually revealing itself in the vested self-interest(s) and manners of unbridled Individualism that has undermined equalitarian idealism, that once defined the national culture, by rendering every individual the sole arbiter of his or her own conscience and ensuing choices without giving proper pause to how such choices may otherwise impact, for better or for worse, other individuals or to a transcendent authority that each must (inevitably) be held accountable; that is to say, whose (social) consequences existing outside the provincial boundaries of that individual's (own) estate are no longer limited by (moral) restraint or prescribed rules of moral and ethical conduct but conditioned rather by circumventing designs contrary to the proportionate interests of a well-ordered society.

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What sets our Nickelodeon Generation apart (in some manner) from prior generations is a troubling disregard for parental authenticity; a legacy passed down to them by their emotionally and morally stunted Boomer Parents whose puerile adolescence and (the) mixed messages conveyed to their offsprings have all but erased the traditional boundaries that formerly defined the (proper) role(s) of parent and child. Such attitudes can be traced to an ill-conceived leveling of parent/child relationships precipitated by childlike (parental) idiosyncrasies that have (predictably) produced unintended results.

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Specious arguments advanced by women affirming their (legal) right to have an abortion on the (plausible) assumption that it is their body to do with as they please is arguable from the standpoint that a woman, or a man for that matter, is at liberty to jump off a bridge if she or he is so inclined (laws prohibiting suicide notwithstanding) provided that such quizzical decisions are of consequence to themselves, only. Once a woman conceives a child, however, self-rationalization that seeks its (own) moral comfort level is (necessarily) nullified inasmuch as another human life (fetus) is equally entitled to the same legal rights and privileges that that woman claims for herself. Men and women are free to engage in intimate (sex) as it relates to Choice. Either may choose to (mutually) enter into a relationship with another man or woman or partner of choice. Each is at liberty to marry the other provided both parties consent to the marriage. They are (otherwise) free to choose single or (promiscuous) lifestyles or employ precautionary measures against pregnancy...although conservative theologians would properly disagree. Once a child has been conceived as a result of that women's private decisions, however, all bets are off. These women are (now) duty bound to uphold the (legal) rights of the child, at whatever stage of his or her development, that that woman otherwise feels entitled to.

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An individual of questionable character, whether conditioned by environmental factors or informed by natural impulses, who commits

a crime, must be held accountable for that crime whatever the (underlying) reason, considered apart, as it relates to the commission of a crime. Although causal factors may properly explain the reasons or motives behind some wanton or criminal action, they do not exonerate the consequences of that action, however. It may be correctly argued that although unusual circumstances often give vent to (our) latent tendencies, Reason must necessarily assert itself as the final authority that correctly informs our (potential) actions. Many of us have, at one time or another, faced critical crossroads in our lives; moments of indecision or doubt that

challenges the good or the bad in all of us. These defining moments are what ultimately determine our character....or ability to rise above ourselves!

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Although I remain a staunch proponent of the Rule of law, I hold fast to my belief that the Sanctity of Life is more precious than our legal system has properly envisioned. I find it quite troubling whenever an (activist) judge eagerly concedes the legal "rights" of a terrorist (at the risk of endangering the lives of law-abiding citizens) who would otherwise nullify, without pause, the very laws that he or she conveniently utilizes for his or her own (legal) advantage.

Christ admonished "judge not lest ye be judged." He meant that we must not condemn the perceived failings of other people because we too are flawed in our own manner. Therefore, we should never set ourselves up as the final arbiters of other people's actions for there is one Judge (only) who will ultimately judge us all! Although I am generally regarded as "opinionated", (Who, Me?) unless otherwise called upon to defend my position on some "important" matter, I am generally inclined to keep my thoughts and opinions to myself; especially as they relate to character assumptions that I may otherwise find (morally) objectionable or indecorous. I would never publicly ridicule or disparage a person's character or reputation regardless of my own private opinions about that person. 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An increasing number of college graduates are gradually filling entry level (corporate) positions traditionally reserved for high school graduates. This is the inevitable outcome of expanding global economies and the pursuit of cheaper labor abroad that has raised domestic competition to a fevered pitch. The dramatic decline in manufacturing and factory jobs has created a tighter domestic labor market that is increasingly finding expression within the corporate mainstream. What has happened, in effect, is that a college education has devolved into a cross-generational equivalent of a high school diploma; that is to say, a contemporary college education has superseded anachronistic (academic) standards of a generation ago. Therefore, erstwhile high school students are presently residing on college campuses that were once reserved for scholastically minded individuals who formerly claimed a higher academic standing. Allowing for exceptions, however, that's the way it is!

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The Liberal Establishment has invested a great deal of financial and emotional capital on cultivating the African American voter over the last half century that nothing less than 100 percent party loyalty is deemed acceptable by Democratic Party standards. They should be extended on the basis of (overriding) circumstantial evidence that otherwise creates (plausible) doubt as to the merits of the conviction. Otherwise, such (political) pardons constitute a circumventing of law enforcement efforts and judicial due process. A terrorist, for example, (read: William Jefferson Clinton) should never be pardoned based upon incontrovertible evidence that led to that conviction to begin with.

. . .

Efforts at enlightening someone are analogous to planting a seed and watching it take root. Too much water, especially where the ground (mind) is otherwise impervious to moisture, however, is unreceptive to the best of intentions!

• • •

A conspicuous (or conscious) awareness of our (own) "Goodness"; of being "good" or performing "good" deeds, underscores (the) critical self-assessment of our (own) perceived "goodness" measured by (the) internalized standards of our (own) invention confirming our (own) "goodness" however contradicted (at times) by our (own) decided thoughts or actions; that is to say, the perception of the quality of our (own) thoughts or actions are (oftentimes) self-fulfilling appraisals that either inform or condition such "charitable" or "kindly" actions in a manner that (otherwise) belie the "underlying" authority that should otherwise serve as a catalyst for promoting "good." Goodness is grounded in a disinterested "awareness" of Goodness or an "indifference" to doing "good" works. In this manner an individual does not necessarily feel that he or she is doing "good" but needs to do good, rather, without pause to his or her considered "goodness." Goodness lies in Humility of Purpose; without intended purpose, however; that is to say, undetermined and without motive; an impartial or uncertain "Will" to Goodness that internally defines the Self; a Goodness that does not issue from the Conscious Self but the Hidden Self, rather, that must necessarily refute its own "apparent goodness" or the self-sustaining content of its (own) intentions. Goodness, therefore, is "ignorant" of its (own) inherent, however "unknowing" Goodness; that is to say, Goodness is a necessarily "uninformed" of its (own) essential Goodness lest it stain itself with Pride. In other words, Goodness is a

spiritual quality inbred within the Heart rather than the Mind. Goodness is the "willful" denial of self-determined values seeking selfapproval. Goodness is not a qualified by-product of causal/effects but an end in itself. Goodness seeks consistency with God's (own) Will directed by God's (own) Grace. In this manner Goodness "seeks" to win for others rather than itself!

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Addendum to the above: The greatest human failing is our (own) self-centered tendency of measuring our (own) self-worth by confidential standards that reinforce a sense of our (own) predetermined goodness.

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The New York State Republican Party has completely gone to seed. New York has never been what is commonly referred to as a "Red" or Conservative State as opposed to a "Blue" or Liberal State unlike an Idaho or Wyoming, for example, that are considered traditionally conservative, especially on social issues. New York's political tradition, especially New York City, has been historically progressive. Nevertheless, these widely disparate (regional) traditions have never precluded the advancement of common interests. Setting aside divisive issues like Abortion, Gay Marriages and the Death Penalty, most voters generally agree on the need for a balanced budget, economic growth, safer streets and better schools. Achieving these goals is more often than not a question of method or procedure rather than purpose. This is where Republican (alternative) policies came into play. New York State's political traditions did not prevent Conservatives like Ronald Regan and other National Republicans from (occasionally) carrying the State during their run for the presidency or statewide office. Neither did these candidates feel a need to abandon their conservative credentials as have a number of recent statewide Republican office holders of late. That many ran as Conservative Republicans on the campaign trail only to govern as Liberal Republicans or Democrats, which I suppose is one and the same, once they were elected, may partly explain the reason for the party's declining popularity. The reverberations resounding within the party have been earth-shattering. I expect that the worst is yet to come. The (overriding) question remains: why have Republican Candidates, politically successful on a number of statewide levels in past years, suddenly chosen to alienate its conservative base and potential (moderate) swing voters. New York City has always voted predominately Democratic. The most any Conservative/Moderate Republican Candidate could reasonably hope to achieve is perhaps 35 percent of the citywide vote. This does not explain, however, the Republican Party's lackluster support among the more traditionally moderate to conservative suburban communities located outside the city's outlining areas, not to mention upper New York State whose population has overwhelmingly voted Republican over the years. Its citizens are typically blue collar types, conservative on social issues and moderate on economic issues. Many are homeowners and investors naturally inclined toward (economic) policies that favor investment. This trend has assumed even greater importance as it relates to the growing number of blue collar families that have recently joined the "Investment Class." Nevertheless the Republican Party continues losing ground. The party must somehow recover its political identity as a viable alternative to New York's traditional tax and spend approach to running government. It will need to embrace and retain its core base by focusing on conservative principles rather than embracing political strategies that have alienated its natural supporters. In other words, it will need to reduce spending, promote economic growth and stop its political pandering to special interest groups!

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Addendum to the above: Allow me clarify. Not every (mind) is receptive to Experience or Novel Ideas!

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Whenever I find myself walking inside a hospital pavilion, I oftentimes run across a plaque inscribed with the name of a wealthy benefactor who has lent financial support to that institution. How note worthier were such memorials dedicated in memory of selfless physicians who contributed their time and efforts to the advancement of Science and Medicine? The vulgar employment of wealth to fulfill a legacy forever enshrined in our memories!

(Economic) benefits derived by term limits neutralizing the (political) intrigues of Special Interest Groups!

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Starbucks has become a gathering place for the Nouveau Elite who fancy themselves cosmopolites extraordinaire; sipping their selfcontented cups of café latte seated in an imaginary Parisian Sidewalk Café.

• •

Secularism's determined efforts to drive Christianity underground resemble, in some manner, the brutish practices of the ancient Romans with this one (minor) exception: the movement's more avid supporters are not quite ready to feed Christians to the lions, although such an event might be right around the corner!

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David Horowitz's "Unholy Alliance" refers to a remark made by a federal court judge as it relates to First Amendment Rights and I quote, "which prohibited personal and technical assistance to designated terrorist organizations...would violate the First Amendment." This judge was referring, of course, to efforts aimed at prosecuting individuals (or fifth columnists) working behind the scenes to undermine our nation's security. This insane interpretation is somewhat analogous to someone planning a bank robbery who, although not actually participating in the robbery, provides strategic assistance or financial support vital to its success. That the individual

masterminding the crime should not be held liable as an accessory before the fact constitutes a gross miscarriage of justice. That he or she should not be held accountable in some manner begs the question: What has become of good old fashioned common sense? A society bent on destroying itself must properly take leave of its senses!

• • •

Although not every citizen, for whatever reason(s), is predisposed to defend his or her nation during a time of war, each should properly support the nation's war effort in some (other) manner by lending either moral or financial support to American troops who have selflessly placed themselves in harm's way so that others on the home front might live in peace.

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It is virtually impossible for a motorist to maintain the "ten mile per hour / one car length behind" ratio mandated by law lest it opportune a degree of separation (space) that will enable another (vehicle) to occupy it!

...portends a Crisis of Conscience for the obvious reason that were an individual evil, in which case Conscience would no longer factor into that individual's evil intentions or designs, or complicit in some activity considered evil (in the conventional sense) or (otherwise) cognizant of loftier moral arguments that should properly inform his or her actions, who has chosen, however, to promote expediency and self-interest over principle and the (rightful) concerns of others, that individual has willfully and knowingly side-stepped the boundaries that separate Good and Evil or, at the very least, its milder derivative, Right from Wrong, (thereby) waiving all rights for (personal) redemption whereas Amorality, on the other hand, suggests a gross indifference to moral clarity; an "intellectual" vacuum that, neither accepting nor refuting any notion of Good or Evil or Right and Wrong, has subjected (itself) to utter despair or (consequential) incertitude, or so it would seem...

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Addendum to the above: The former's transgression is (arguably) attributable to a weakened or deformed character, the latter, intellectual arrogance.

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As a rule, pre-programmed, rhetorical or "talking point" types are glibber than thoughtful individuals naturally inclined to provide full measure to complex matters rather than providing formatted or pre-assigned answers to critical questions.

• • •

Certain aesthetic forms like "Beauty," for example, are "self-evident" (in the conventional manner) to the senses, whereas abstract concepts like "Justice" or "Piety", possess a more subtle or uncertain nature whose essence exceeds the sum of its (notable) parts that (otherwise) requires creative thought and/or imagination deficient among those lacking insight into Things Hidden.

• •

Modern Liberalism is partly informed by Roussaeuian fantasies that persist in its mistaken, quixotic assumptions of a "Noble Savage" whose natural or primitive condition, independent of good and evil, has been tainted by the harmful effects of a corruptive "society" that silences any notion(s) of wrongdoing.

• • •

God allots to each of us in proportion to our needs; if our Faith is strong enough; a reawakening of our spiritual relationship with God that makes all things possible or durable or hopeful, rather than satisfying our own (material) "requirements" or what we believe is needed.

• • •

"Oh God, stay with me; let no word cross my lips that is not your word, no thoughts enter my mind that are not your thoughts, no deed ever be done or entertained by me that is not your deed. Amen" (Malcolm Muggeridge).

• • •

I suppose it all comes down to one's point of view although I generally prefer the "obnoxious" bantering of (certain) Conservative radio talk show hosts, whenever I am inclined to "tune in," rather than the sanctimonious railings of liberal elites given to promoting left-wing causes under the implausible guise of "objective" reporting.

• • •

It is axiomatic that we are all conditioned to some degree to expect or anticipate or solicit (different) responses or reactions or feelings from (different) people. These prevailing attitudes give rise to distinctions that define (the) underlying designs forged by circumstantial currents that formalize our judgments of another person's willingness or capacity to support or defend our stated requirements.

A "Fool" isn't someone who asks a lot of "foolish" questions but someone, rather, who fails to heed the counsels of the Wise.

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Paganism was/remains the (effeminate) precursor of (manly) Christianity.

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If the book you are reading no longer makes any sense; that is to say, should you find it confusing, tedious or perhaps impersonal or irrelevant to your needs, (then) lay it aside and move on to another!

• • •

Things "exist" or are "apparent" to the senses in the manner revealed by "nature;" that is to say, in the manner they are received, that, unless conditioned by higher aspirations for their "essential" meanings or truths, cannot (otherwise) be perceived any more or any less than in the manner they are either inferred or imagined from an ordinary point of view. Therefore, what are commonly understood as points of "fact," should be properly regarded with suspicion by discerning minds. Because of its perishability, "nature" is not (the) Ultimate Reality. The true Nature of Things is perceived by "eternal eyes" (only) that sees what lies hidden or beyond what our limited senses (may) otherwise speculate at best. Reason allows an individual to consider things rationally and to draw abstract conclusions about "things." It provides the framework that governs our motives, informs our decisions and provides legitimacy to our beliefs. It provides food for rational thought grounded in Experience that, whenever properly applied, without prejudice or bias, grasps the Intuitive, as well. Reason, unless informed by Faith, however, merely "apprehends" thoughts and ideas proceeding from plausible assumptions designed to inspire confidence in questionable impressions that may appear, but are not necessarily, real.

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Becoming one with God implies sharing His Glory, not becoming a "god" that seeks to determine the scope of its own limits!

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A liberal acquaintance recently suggested that Social Security should be subject to means testing whereby the "Rich," however defined, would be excluded from receiving SS benefits regardless of much these individuals have contributed to the system over the years. This is tantamount to saying that because a family has the financial resources to send its children to private schools, that public schools should be off-limits. What is conveniently overlooked, however, is that such families would still be required to provide financial assistance through payroll deductions and property taxes to either institution.

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Determinism is a philosophical proposition that basically affirms that every human motive or design or action, for that matter, is "the inevitable consequence of antecedents that are independent of human will." This "unbroken chain of events," that finds ostensible expression in future behavior, is irreconcilable, it would seem, with causal/effects partially achieved in conjunction with problematical outcomes, that, in any event, could neither shape nor influence an uncertain future unless its "collective actions" were uniformly mapped out, absent the intervention of Accident or Chance or other contaminating elements occasioned by voluntary actions not in keeping with "programmed" designs that would (otherwise) render such a scenario, unthinkable; that is to say, there are far too many contending variables that need to be factored into the equation. Deterministic thinking is consistent, on some level, with Marxist theories advancing the Inevitability of History. In some ways Determinism has advanced a milder or "softer" expression common to modern liberal doctrine(s) that seeks to explain and systematize human behavior. The problem lies in reconciling the manner an individual is said to behave rather than react (a subtle, yet very important distinction) to pre-conditioning designs exclusive of free will.

This defective reasoning, of course, does not admit a (conflicting) Higher Moral Authority that otherwise "informs" a society whose members have (supposedly) been reduced to the lowest common denominator; material beings or high grade machines lacking moral and spiritual substance; guided solely by pre-determined dynamics subject to their (own) unitary laws. Such opinions do not admit the possibility of rational thinking human beings capable of achieving a higher order of spiritual and intellectual awareness consonant with their (own) determined designs. Neither does it consider Humankind's obstinate, however pliant nature that pursues its (own) calling and seeks its (own) rewards in its (own) self-appointed manner. The belief in a Divine Being must necessarily engender conflicting loyalties between God and the self-appointed guardians of Historical Determinism whose (moral) authority must go unchallenged. Therefore, it is formulated that Humankind is instructed by antecedent events that direct its every movement and guide its every "thought," if individuals are said to (properly) think, along its pre-determined course. To this purpose, God must be expunged from the public consciousness lest His presence confound the prescribed arrangements of mechanical processes where two plus two may not necessarily add up to four nor does it have to provided such dubious calculations preserve the implausible standards of an unthinking individual who has been summarily reduced to rote. The challenges confronting any free society lie in the unshakable confidence invested in its citizens as free-thinking individuals capable of making the right choices and exercising proper judgment rather than perceived as sophisticated machines guided by neural impulses connected to some highly developed nerve center. In other words, to consider them material, however quasi/spiritual "beings" possessing Free Will.

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I do not harbor any doubts that America will one day devolve into a "second-rate" nation; thereby relinquishing its preeminent

standing as the greatest nation on earth. It may very well retain, however, its superiority among a sorrier lot of (other) second-rate nations (my apologies to Europe) that previously succumbed to their own insuperable challenges decades ago. This is small consolation, however, in an era were (erstwhile) great nations have been reduced to historical footnotes. Perhaps the twentieth century will someday be remembered for its irrational contempt for Western Civilization's remarkable accomplishments that gave rise to a number of great nations over the years. Notwithstanding its (own) relative decline, however, America may arguably remain the world's foremost military power although its comparative advantage over other developing nations will be sorely tested by hostile upstarts. I would like to qualify what I mean by second-rate. I am referring to a lowering of moral, cultural and intellectual standards in relation to material ones and casual rejection of the religious, social and cultural traditions that made America (remarkably) unique. (Russia and China, for example, were/are military powers but not great nations by any means.) Many of the reasons for this pending event have already been outlined above. They do not require further elaboration. Suffice it to say, however, that this is a Death Wish waiting to happen!

. . .

Addendum to the above: The question remains, however, does Mankind conduct (itself) as free thinkers guided by a higher authority residing within (itself) or react, rather, to spontaneous impulses requiring neither thought nor conscience thereby nullifying guilt or self-reproach?

. . .

There are many individuals who I (instinctively) like or would like to like for the simple reason that they are likeable. Separating an individual who is likeable from that individual's personal viewpoints, otherwise perceived objectionable or contrary to my (own) regarded opinions, requires an open, if not "generous" mind. Such differences oftentimes present a number of imposing challenges to individuals wedded to firmly held beliefs who, in every other respect, are genuinely committed to friendship. Complete or unqualified compatibility with another individual; that is to say, a relationship mutually committed to achieving the highest levels of esteem without bias or prejudice (however unlikely from the standpoint of our respective natures and conditioning) would require a severing of the subject (individual) of our interest from the thematic elements that typically structure the character of (that) subject/individual thereby separating (that) "Individual" from the "Ideas" that properly qualify and provide moral and intellectual sustenance to (that) Individual of our liking an empty suit, thereby frustrating our intended purpose inasmuch as the inseparable idea(s) forming the character of that individual of our liking and the manner such (ideas) are properly received represent the fundamental components internalized by that individual who we (ironically) find so appealing to begin with. Therefore, a commitment to (true) friendship, setting aside such differences for the moment, requires that our differences produce (a) plausible effect, that does not (necessarily) imply acceptance, however, without compromising either individual's prevailing sentiments. Such friendships achieve their fullest potential or meaning in an environment mindful of each individual's guarded values and opinions.

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Addendum to the above: This proposition does not hold, however, for someone we understand to be (objectively) immoral and whose "friendship" would cause us irreparable (spiritual) harm.

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There is much to be said about "eyes being the windows of the soul" or that someone has "intelligent eyes." There resides in each of us, a spiritual prism that seems to radiate a stately radiance like sunshine emanating its essence through a pane of glass.

• • •

Our interactions with other people (oftentimes) lack uniformity however consistent they may (otherwise) appear on the surface within the operating framework of "artificial" expressions that retrieve from its private stock of impressions a particular role best suited for (the) "occasion." Such role-playing is neither cynical nor disingenuous however a conforming agency that seeks to manage or regulate a variety relationships among individuals having different values and interests that would otherwise alienate most.

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Ethnic neighborhoods have historically generated a systematic inflow/outflow of diverse cultures that settled into self-contained communities that remained self-sufficient through its schools, churches, community and political organizations and local businesses until more favorable (economic) opportunities beckoned. Modern versions, however, are "self-containing" in the manner an increasing number of these communities are (typically) devolving into quasi-permanent arrangements partly (determined) by choice rather than (conditioned) by necessity. (That few of us are fortunate enough to choose where we live does not necessarily prevent us from improving our station in life if we are so inclined.) Although many of these communities retained a measure of ethnic authenticity, its members gradually sought to adopt, by assimilating, the customs and practices of (the) mainstream society. What we are witnessing today, however, especially in the more wretched urban environments, is a conspicuous absence of purposeful "genius" attributable less to inherent factors than the prevailing influence of a McDonald's-like mentality that seems to promote the lowest forms of culture that baser designs have to offer. Lacking are the traditional principle standards and values that encouraged young people to hope, to aspire, to rise above the lowest common denominator of their immediate environment. These (morally) languishing and (personally) demeaning attitudes are extending transition periods well beyond traditional standards, finding broader expression in greater numbers of individuals who are either unable or unwilling to improve their present social and economic standing because it is no longer

convenient to do so or perhaps many have simply lost the desire.

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A question that is sometimes raised by members of the African American Community and by other People(s) of Color is why do many Christian Churches seldom depict "Black" Angels or other biblical figures, for that matter, on murals and statues. That's a fair question to ask, although a more appropriate argument might center on the absence of "swarthier" Semitic types consistent with Christianity's Middle Eastern origin. Such characterizations are merely a matter of convenient expression within the social and cultural context of a particular group. After all, what did Christ and his Apostles really look like? Has anyone ever encountered an Angel? Such (abstract) personifications remain open to interpretation; a (worldly) convenience to meet its own special requirements rather than an unqualified expression grounded on historical accuracy. It may be correctly argued, however, that there are no Black Angels. Neither are there White Angels, for that matter. The Supernatural comprehends neither (material) form nor color nor race. We are all one with the (incomprehensible) Spirit in whatever manner envisioned!

• • •

The vulgarization of language has undermined artistic (verbal) expression; that is to say, language has lost a certain sense of proportion relating to humor, irony, nuance and wit that typically shape our thoughts and ideas. Correctly expressed, words provide character and meaning to our thoughts. They allow an individual to link rational thoughts, analyze and properly communicate them. Many of us have become utterly conditioned by visual and phonetic effects, however, that we seem to have lost a proper feeling for what lies beneath or beyond the spoken word, leaving it essentially barren, without substance or meaning. In other words, we have devolved into "scripted" elocutionary talking-points and conditioned sound bites!

• • •

The ancient Greeks correctly estimated Man's relationship with Nature. City Planning, for example, was neither pretentious nor overpowering in its designs but simplistically proportionate in a stately manner. Greek architectural designs did not seek to overwhelm but promote, rather, a harmonious relationship with Nature. (One might correctly infer a "mutual" regard, keeping in mind that the Greeks were Pantheists.) It is axiomatic that inanimate objects are neither spiritual nor capable of reason. I raise this point for the benefit of anthropomorphists (sic) who (inexplicably) ascribe (human) qualities to Nature. Nevertheless, an individual should "respect" Nature as a gift offered to us by God for our own mutual enjoyment; shared in community with others rather than for our own private amusement. To treat kindly inasmuch as Humankind is the custodian of Nature's bounty. The Greeks understood this although from an entirely different perspective.

• • •

Eastern Religious/Philosophical traditions do not carry the burden of 15th–19th Century Western Philosophies that sought to undermine or discredit altogether Christian Belief Systems. From the smoldering ashes will arise a Christian Phoenix in the East (the source of its origin) that will refute Christianity's pending demise.

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The Book of Genesis reveals that, by having partaken of the "Forbidden Fruit" from the "Tree of Knowledge," Adam and Eve (Humanity) exposed themselves to a new Order of "Things;" subject to spiritual and moral confusion and more importantly, an (underlying) awareness of Good and Evil. Although the word Bad has superseded (in part) Evil in today's lexicon, it is worth mentioning the very fine line separating the two. It may be reasonably argued that an unsavory substance leaves a disagreeable or "bad" taste in one's mouth or that a parent is setting an improper or "bad" example for his or her children or that an individual has behaved uncharitably or "badly" towards someone or that individual may feel unfavorably disposed or harbor ill or "bad" feelings towards that person. The (point) being that although Evil is the purest expression of Bad; that is to say, its ultimate corruption, none of the examples cited above are proper examples of Evil but examples of human failings that, carried to an extreme, however, may devolve to Evil if not properly tended to.

• • •

There's an appealing quality associated with (character) flaws or (material) imperfections unlike impressions "perfectly" pleasing to the senses; that is to say, an aesthetic flawlessness whose highest claims, however, are seldom achievable in Nature. For this reason, we may oftentimes find ourselves "attracted" to defects or blemishes that commonly define our own rather ordinary, imperfect condition characterized, in part, by the object of our affections who appears (ordinarily) real and removed, perhaps, from fanciful standards or perfected ideals. In other words, imperfections make that (object) genuinely real and more approachable.

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Addendum to the above: Our (natural) imperfections are what make us "real", tangible human beings. A perfect world must inevitably lack a sense of proportion as we understand it.

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Our pressing requirements, occasioned by the infinite complexities (or trials) of our daily lives, are a test of our moral and intellectual resources that provides measure to our character, endurance and ingenuity. Whenever an individual is troubled by some physical ailment, he or she seeks a medical remedy. If that individual is cold, he or she seeks warmer quarters. In a similar fashion, the manner

that individual copes with anxiety or stress or other (personal) matters determines that individual's spiritual capacity to "know itself."

. . .

Homes are populated by "ghosts" who are not specters in any ordinary sense of the word however haunting impressions firmly rooted in our memories.

. . .

Some people are natural born fools; others occasionally make foolish mistakes.

••

There was a defining moment in our nation's history when the laboring classes (en masse) went from resenting the rich to emulating their lifestyles...or trying to, at least. These (changing) attitudes gave rise to unprecedented consumer debt that (subsequently) skyrocketed through the ceiling; not to mention a "misery" index that gauges our material insecurity. One may only hope for a return to simpler, happier times when enough was sufficient for our needs!

• • •

Whether or not our "decided" actions are informed by "non-causal" factors (Free Will) or guided by the Determinate Laws of Nature (circumstantial or accidental events) or whether such actions represent a combination of both, Behaviorists are likely to agree that the latter argument is (the) more plausible of the two. Human "motives" are therefore held as determinant or conclusive responses to antecedent events independent of Free Will; that is to say, infer a mindset pre-conditioned by prior events governing present decisions rather than governed by independent designs capable of responding rationally to unexpected events. These arguments would seemingly render Free Will problematical once (the) events informing "rational" behavior have been properly considered. This line of reasoning must necessarily marginalize the influence of the Primary Will correctly understood as God, the Primary Mover and Architect of Necessity and "Moral Compulsion." What is not properly understood, however, is that Necessity initiates its own causes, occasions its own results; subject to "consequences" proceeding from both; that is to say, constitutes natural causations operating independently in accordance with its own laws; paradoxically limited, however, by its own restrictive/free condition. Free Will is not absolute in any worldly manner because it is oftentimes influenced by internal conditions that remain vague and uncertain; that is to say, lacking absolute (consensual) authority; subject to an individual's moral, intellectual and material orientation that (nevertheless) seeks to follow God's purposeful intentions. This in no manner implies an nullification of Free Will that (inevitably) continues operating within the (singular) guidelines defining one's existence however guided by its fundamental designs.

. . .

The components of Absolute Truth consist of a collection of partial truths woven together to form a completed truth, much in the manner of working out the solution to a geometry problem consisting of postulates, theorems and axioms, each a mathematical law (or truth) in itself however an (incomplete truth) as each relates to a (higher truth) that having been brought together, however, provides the solution (Absolute Truth) to the problem.

You posed a question during dinner the other evening that I found rather disturbing from a Christian point of view. I would like to take this opportunity to elaborate further on some of the questions that were raised. You inquired whether I believed animals possessed souls and went to heaven. I believe that you are incorrectly assuming that possessing a soul provides an automatic passport to heaven. Let's assume, for argument sake, that having a soul is a (necessary) requirement for any individual/animal to go to heaven. That same individual or animal could just as easily end up in hell (like my beloved "Mitch," for example) depending on how each has lived their lives in accordance with their own "free will" that, in the case of animals, is a rather daunting proposition! In this context, everything being equal, both possibilities should be properly considered. I am speaking here of Rewards and Punishments.

I think we can both agree that a system of justice that exclusively applies rewards without pause for punishment cannot be properly referred to as a system of justice. It cannot even be considered arbitrary justice for that matter, inasmuch as it disclaims all notions of right and wrong or good and evil to begin with. This indifference to personal conduct places "justice" in a moral vacuum. But enough of that. Moving on to the question of animals and heaven, I guess my question to you would be, whether an animal, having behaved "wickedly" throughout his or her lifetime and having died without remorse for his or her dastardly misdeeds, should be considered a viable candidate for hell damnation? I raise this question for consistency sake. (I shudder at the very thought of an unrepentant Mitch, despite his innumerable failings, spending eternity in Hell.) However unpleasant the thought, I must allow that possibility as a counterpoise to heavenly rewards. That such arguments exceed the scope of my knowledge, I must leave such questions for theologians and religious scholars to decide. Let's allow for simplicity's sake, however, that heaven is a place that rewards "good" behavior and hell a place reserved for "evil." Beyond that, far be it for me to judge who is good and who is evil.

Repentance and Remorse inform a troubled Conscience that seeks forgiveness. Conscience, I believe is the offspring of the Soul. It is arguably the most important faculty we possess as human beings in the manner it controls or directs behavior by giving pause to questions relating to right and wrong and good and evil, even when such distinctions are oftentimes unclear. I cannot properly imagine any animal, however, carried away by such distractions or driven to shame over some indecorous display like copulating in a public area, for example or urinating in someone's back yard. Any reasonable individual might properly argue that an animal, uninhibited by conventional customs, oftentimes does what comes naturally without regard to ceremony unlike higher orders of beings compelled by (religious) or social reasons that temper their (natural) inclinations. Animals are less inhibited than humans for good reason. They are unable to discount the probable effects of "inconsequential" actions; that is to say, they do not "think" in terms of right and wrong or good and evil. They simply "behave" in a manner that comes natural to them. I am confident that animals do not go to heaven because they do not, cannot aspire for heaven. It is small consolation, however, for those of us emotionally attached to our pets, that although we may never be re-united with them in heaven, they will be spared an eternity in Hell.

It goes without saying that some of the most important decisions we make in our lives seldom rise above the level of the mundane, such as what clothes to wear, what to eat for dinner, what movie to watch and that our ultimate destinies are inevitably decided by loftier decisions. It may actually be a good thing that animals are unencumbered by such concerns, if indeed we, ourselves, properly worry as we should! We are "divine" beings (as opposed to Divine), by virtue of our relationship with God whose greatest gift to Humankind is the prospect of eternal salvation. This sets us apart from the animal. An animal merely lives, rather than exists. (There is a real important distinction here!) An animal relies on instinct which should not be confused, however, with reasoning. Instinct is guided by self-preservation. Instinct is not self-guiding, however. Humankind is guided from within, that is to say, its actions are understood from within. It enjoys the capacity to "Know Itself" which is the highest precept of Wisdom. An animal can never hope to aspire to Wisdom because such efforts imply a certain insight into the underpinnings of conscious designs, not merely their outward expressions but all that lies hidden and beyond. An animal "learns" by Experience as do humans. Where they part company, however,

is in an animal's inability to properly apply Logic and Reason to what has been learned or to adapt itself to the social, moral and ethical requirements of learning. For an animal, "learning" is an exercise in involuntary repetition. An animal is conditioned by rote to "understand" the hows and whats but not the whys.

Your follow-up question, why do animals suffer in vain; that is to say, without heavenly hope, may be answered in this manner: 1) an animal does not hope because it lacks higher purpose and meaning. It may desire food to appease its hunger or shelter to protect it from the elements. It does not hope for such things, however, because it cannot think in terms of possibilities in the manner that hope necessarily implies Potential and Faith that keep us "alive." 2) An animal suffers for the same reason that humans suffer, because suffering is a part of life. It suffers in vain because, for reasons mentioned above, it is unable to aspire for hope. Suffering, properly understood, is a necessary requirement for Salvation. A proper distinction should be made between physical and spiritual suffering, the latter being the greater burden of the two. Why are we oftentimes inclined to assign blame to God for all our misfortunes yet seldom offer Him proper thanks for all His blessings?

I would like to conclude by saying that the mistreatment of any (defenseless) creature under our guardianship is a violation of God's sacred trust. We are all stewards of God's Creation; to treat kindly and with discretion, charity and compassion for our own useful purposes, without extracting any more or less than what is needed to secure our own material comfort. Such arrangements, however, need to be placed in their proper perspective. Investing both Man and Beast with (spiritual) qualities must necessarily elevate the "moral" nature of the Beast while diminishing that of Man. In the proper ordering of things, God gave Man dominion over the Beast; that is to say, they are not co-partners in Nature. That Man was created in God's Image necessarily places Man on a spiritual plane unknown to Beast. Man is a contemplative being searching for Meaning and Redemption with the hope of bringing an individual closer to God. For this reason every individual must be held accountable for the choices that he or she makes. Man's immortality, I believe, is conditioned by thought. That Humankind enjoys a certain capacity to contemplate eternal designs represents (the) cornerstone of its (potential) immortality. Be wary of anthropomorphic designs, my friend.

I thought we should share with you a comment made to my wife by a neighbor whose son attends Saint Barnabas elementary school. One afternoon this week, the boy conveyed to his mother what was foremost on his mind regarding a subject brought up by his teacher in class; that this teacher, we did not ask her name, stated that anyone killing an animal would "go to Hell." Now we take a position second to none when it comes to mistreating animals. It is a good thing that such lessons relating to animal cruelty are taught at an early age. The subject of Hell, however, is a very serious matter that should be addressed with caution, especially when these "lessons" are being conveyed to impressionable children who have yet to form creditable (religious) opinions regarding such matters. Is killing an animal found anywhere in the Ten Commandments? (We know that Killing is expressly forbidden.) Does the wanton killing of an animal for its own sake, however, rise to the level of killing another human being? Killing a defenseless creature for sheer enjoyment proceeds from thoughtless stupidity or a certain (inherent) wickedness, perhaps. It is not the purpose of this letter to argue such points. Our immediate question to you is whether or not this teacher is correctly expressing a belief in keeping with Church teachings or is she merely expressing her own private opinions in a manner that has become increasingly troubling to parents with young children in school? This term, applicable, perhaps, to "gunboat" diplomacy, was recently employed by United States Senator Diane Feinstein, inspired, no doubt, by a heightened sense of her (own) exceptional capacity for splendid expressions and superfluity!

Humankind has more discriminate "needs," (exceeding the primitive requirements of lower life-forms [Beasts] lacking imagination), that inform its "desires" of something or something requiring more or less of that something or perhaps some other something. Needs common to (the) Beast are specific and self-containing; existing from moment to moment. The superfluity of imagined needs, indigenous to higher life forms, (however), is a two-edged sword that oftentimes deceives or corrupts an individual's perceptual requirements by confusing real or actual needs with questionable ones. Humankind is never completely satisfied because, unlike (the) Beast, it is (oftentimes) unable to correctly distinguish between the two.

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Christianity is a higher intellectual order; its teachings subtle and elusive to non-critical thinkers. There is no "Christianity for Idiots," no shortcuts or paths of least resistance. Christ's "simple" teachings were not intended as road maps for the simple-minded. Nevertheless, their "apparent" simplicity continues to sow confusion among those accustomed to receiving them at their face value.

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Whenever I give pause to Northeastern Pennsylvania's economic hardships, of the many missed opportunities occasioned by stubborn (unionized) attitudes that rendered the region a barren (economic) wasteland, I see a society of working class people frozen in time. I reflect on how little has changed since the turn of the last century when President (Theodore) Roosevelt traveled to Wilkes B arre in 1902 to meet with United Mine Workers (UMW) President John Mitchell to help settle a coal miner's strike by union workers that nearly crippled the nation. I am further reminded of a quote from Milton's Paradise Lost that states, "'Tis better to reign in Hell than to serve in Heaven'' or put in another way, "'Tis better to reign in the valley of vast underemployment and nominal wages (30,000 workers in the region subsist on the minimum wage) rather than serve in an open (market) environment that offers a broader range of economic opportunities for it citizens."

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Thought and Imagination should not be confused with one another. The former, unless given to critical reflection, is (oftentimes) spontaneous; giving rise to whatever pops into one's head; the latter generally follows creative impulses and subsequent effects that require additional time to develop.

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What is it about rising gasoline prices that sends the American Consumer into a tizzy? Perhaps, unlike other (vital) commodities, gasoline prices are (oftentimes) subject to dramatic increases provoking (consumer) reactions that require some getting used to; that is to say, a period of (emotional) adjustment. This is especially true in a nation accustomed to paying relatively low prices at the pump. When measured against the cost of other goods and services, however, the increase in the price of a gallon of gas, adjusted for inflation over the past half century, compares quite favorably with the rising costs associated with Healthcare or Education or the cost of purchasing a (new) home or automobile or a variety of consumer products for that matter. Everything else being equal, three dollars a gallon is still a pretty good bargain compared with prices overseas. Nevertheless, it would seem that price increases should be effected gradually in order to allow the consumer sufficient time to adapt without causing unnecessary excitement, thereby minimizing its "shocking" effects.

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Atheism/Agnosticism: Wherein lays the difference? The former is perhaps the more intellectually honest of the two in the manner an Atheist categorically denies the existence of God, unlike Agnostics, who, unwilling to incur the (potential) wrath of an "improbable" god choose, instead, to hedge their bets by suspending judgment until creditable evidence should otherwise support God's existence. This constitutes "believing" in light of incontrovertible evidence that requires neither Faith nor bold assumptions inasmuch as (even) the most skeptical among us must inevitably concede certifiable proofs whenever (objectively) presented to them.

To the Editor:

Mr. Cowl's letter questioning the effectiveness of a recent (fact finding) gathering of state governors and business men and women seeking workable solutions to declining performance trends in our urban public schools smacked somewhat of the "father knows best" syndrome that he unfairly projected on these well-meaning professionals. An individual needn't be a product of an inner city school education in order to recognize the system's apparent shortcomings. That it is "problematical" that any of those attending the conference has ever "successfully" taught in an urban public school environment places each in an unenviable position alongside public school teachers who unsuccessfully have; notwithstanding the latter's extensive experience. Mr. Cowl is piqued over the idea of lay people interacting in matters exceeding the limits of their professional expertise. I must respectfully disagree with his parochial viewpoint. Although teaching and training methods oftentimes vary by profession, their underlying principles generally remain the same. The overriding concern for all interested parties should be the dismal track record of our inner city schools in recent years and the practical measures needed to improve it. The glaring academic and (civic) deficiencies of a growing number of students render it neither feasible nor desirable that any thoughtful individual should whitewash the negative impact that under-performing schools are having on our economy, not to mention the rise in anti-social behavior in general. We need simply refer to the vast financial outlays (Corporate Welfare) being allocated for "retraining" (reeducating!) purposes, as well as the dramatic rise in "social costs" in order to appreciate the consequence(s) of our failing schools.

Many (young) adults are failing to measure up to the basic reading, writing and number skills required for ordinary jobs, not to mention the highly specialized skills required by more challenging working environments. Corporations footing the bill should be allowed (some) input into areas directly affecting a company's performance; for example, suggested coursework compatible with a company's business requirements or communicating effectively. Many of our public schools are performing a disservice to students entrusted to their care; many of whom, having "graduated", are oftentimes ill equipped to meet the basic day-to-day challenges that lie ahead. Teachers have seemingly lost the will and the desire to properly engage their students, that is to say, creating a highly motivated environment conducive to learning. Unfortunately, companies and other professional organizations and ultimately the taxpayer, are usually the ones left "holding the bag".

This brings me to another discussion point that I found quite troubling. Public Schools, according to Mr. Cowl, have never (traditionally) "cherry picked" its students. Fair enough. This may partially explain why most parents choose public schools for their children to begin with. In the not so distant past, however, the decision to attend public schools did not prevent children from receiving a quality education consistent with their natural talents and abilities. Academic standards are not necessarily established because they are considered achievable but because they represent objective performance measures perceived worthy of achievement, notwithstanding (the) student's ability to achieve them. Although the highest grade isn't always achievable, its aim, however, should be encouraged. Such attitudes require raising the proverbial bar to its highest level in order to provide every student an opportunity to recognize, if not otherwise achieve the highest limit of his or her natural potential. This is something that Mr. Cowl appears reluctant to endorse because of "cultural differences" that have (historically) precluded a level playing field.

This brings me to (yet) another point? America is a uniquely diverse nation. Its cultural diversity (and social mobility), for that matter, has never prevented children from every walk of life from learning and achieving success. Quite the contrary! Our society has provided opportunities for many individuals or groups to move up the social and economic ladders proportionate to their (inherent) talents (and desires). I am bewildered by the latent overtones implied in Mr. Cowl's remarks. I am referring to his allusion to dunking basketballs and running one hundred yard dashes that seemed rather transparent if not racist. Implying that their children's underlying talents lay predominately in sports is demeaning to Black Americans. Sports should serve as adjuncts to academics however not the student's primary focus.

The real problem in my estimation stems from the rise of relativist attitudes dominating our school environments. Traditional course work no longer seems appropriate in these modern times; superseded, in large measure, by quixotic designs for "meaning", "self-esteem" and "self-worth"and "relevancy" rather than unconditional learning for learning sake. It is especially troubling how many teachers have encouraged such hazy attitudes. What seem to be missing are the correlative assumptions uniting the practical requirements of a well-rounded education with the essentials of sound citizenship required for financial and social success. Immature grievances commonly expressed nowadays by students toiling over "useless" Algebra and "dated" languages like Latin and Greek considered unnecessary or incompatible with a student's career objective(s) misses the point entirely; that is to say, their functional "utility" is not necessarily the overriding factor but rather how such subject matter encourages a mind to think or to reason clearly by compelling it to operate on a higher intellectual plane. In any event, there are any number of vocational and/or general studies programs available to students who are neither endowed by nature nor temperament to pursue higher learning (that is not necessarily a bad thing inasmuch it fills a vital need)). Perhaps the question we should all be asking ourselves is what is it that determines relevancy in school environments where most traditional subject matter seems to have lost its potency? At the present rate, unless higher academic standards (and discipline) are restored in the classroom, many schools may very well become irrelevant in their own right, if not already so!

Our public schools need to restore balance and common sense in the classroom. They need to (intellectually) challenge rather than indulge or humor its students. The overriding issue isn't whether or not a student is proficient in ancient languages or higher mathematics, although the latter would be certainly commendable, but whether or not that student has at least mastered the basic requirements of reading, writing and calculating sums. Mr. Cowl concludes his argument by stating that the "real world" of inner city

schools is best described as a casualty of diminishing public resources, inadequate staffing, and obsolete textbooks ad nauseum. I would argue that spending inefficiencies rather than insufficient resources are the real culprits masking the (underlying) reasons why many of our public schools are failing; that along with disinterested teachers and a gradual departure from traditional values at home and in the classroom that money can not buy. Vast waves of under-privileged children from needy environments have achieved success over the years because of (conditioning) values targeting education (and learning) as the means to success. It also helped having teachers who shared the same values and interests as their parents; who taught without recourse (to excuses). A tolerance for increasingly lazy study habits has a way of assuming a life of its own, however. What is needed is a return to the old-fashioned teacher/student compact that was less compromising and more demanding of its students. Mr. Cowl should seriously consider returning to the basics!

I would like to make some casual observations regarding Mr. Cerbini's critique of the Educational System, the Media and Immorality and the manner they have indirectly contributed to rather egregious jury verdicts of late. 1) His first point is well taken. I agree with his assessment that a number of our public schools and (other) seats of higher "learning" have, on some level, transformed themselves into institutionalized breeding grounds for racial/class agitation and social victimization. This may partially explain the student "wave" at Howard University following the "not guilty" verdict rendered by a predominantly Black Jury during the O.J. Simpson trial. Jury Nullification, precipitated by perceived historical injustices, rejects or makes void rules or articles of evidence and their proper application as instructed by law because of pre-conceived biases unwilling to concede the legitimacy of such statutes or official practices of the court. Prevailing attitudes of this sort have become increasingly common in an age where "organic relationships" (Reinhold Niebuhr) render it undesirable for certain groups to extend legal rights to members of other groups that "necessity" may otherwise claim for themselves". Such viewpoints are oftentimes engendered by the perception of "partial justice" as it seems to apply to a particular racial or ethnic group, influencing the (collective) mindset of that group seeking justice within narrower limits that typically define that group's self interests rather than the interests of society. Intra-Societal conflicts must inevitably produce unintended consequences respecting legal precedents affirming that no one individual or group of individuals is above the law. That having been said, racial attitudes, I believe, are oftentimes reinforced although not necessarily formed in the classroom, 2) Mr. Cerbini's assessment of the Media was right on target. The "mainstream" media has devolved into a homogenous collection of singleminded, self- righteous, glorified gossip columnists entertaining pretentious claims to serious journalism; its members, the artificially contrived off springs of an increasingly illiterate, ill-informed public that has become less discerning and more dependent upon television sound bites and talking points to do their "critical" thinking for them. The news media is motivated by nothing more or nothing less than sensationalism and for what sells. Few, if any of its members, possess any meaningful (core) values. 3) Finally, it is debatable, as indicated in Mr. Cerbini's closing remarks, whether or not moral instruction should be a function of the classroom. Although I believe that schools have a civic obligation to reinforce principles and values essential to sound citizenship, the preliminary work should begin at home, however. It all begins with conditioning and a child's (natural) impulses.

To what extent is any free society willing to surrender a portion of its civil liberties in exchange for a safer, more secure environment? The rising costs associated with our society's War on Drugs, for example, have succored qualifying arguments favoring its legalization. Changing attitudes towards drug abuse are motivated in part by 1) the growing perception among many Americans that our nation is losing the war, 2) diminishing results that do not seem to justify increasing public expenditures earmarked for its prevention, 3) tendencies to treat the symptom(s) rather than the disease and 4) society's unwillingness to support "extra-legal" methods considered unconstitutional.

Regarding the latter, our society has faced a number of critical crossroads in its history that resulted in curtailing, if not suspending altogether, its civil liberties and other privileges in times of (national) crisis. Such examples exceeding the scope of this letter, should properly inform and caution the sensibilities of thoughtful individuals wary of the potential (long-term) effects such draconian measures might otherwise impose on the American People. Our nation's political institutions have provided meaning to free and open societies that ultimately define us as a people (given to ideas). Extra-Legal activities designed to pre-empt Rule of Law, in whatever manner they may (otherwise) produce some "desired" effect, should be properly treated with caution. In view of our nation's collective uncertainty, its jealous attachment to liberty oftentimes renders the disease preferable to its (potential) cure. Changing

perceptions may sometimes warrant, however, a critical reassessment of existing (societal) assumptions based on practical matters rather than legal considerations. The social costs resulting in injury to property and person, not to mention the demoralizing effect on social amenities, however inestimable, are "intuitively" understood.

Substance Abuse has been characterized in some circles a "victimless" crime whose illegality is the result of questionable laws. Its legalization and subsequent dispensation under the auspices of trained professionals operating in a controlled environment, provides a plausible counter-argument to costly efforts aimed at apprehending and bringing drug dealers to task; not to mention promoting cleaner, safer and healthier communities by eliminating criminal incentives and (profits) associated with its unlawful procurement. I am reminded, however, of similar arguments related to legalized gambling and prostitution that never quite achieved their desired results. The potential risk associated with legalizing drugs is understood as a possible endorsement (perhaps) of other forms of aberrant or anti-social behavior under the specious argument of an individual's right to choose; however detrimental to the moral and spiritual well-being of that individual or society, for that matter. Neither does legalizing drugs promote the health of an individual otherwise under the influence of mind altering, physically debilitating drugs, in whatever manner or conditions such drugs are administered. I also believe that legalization sends a clear message to (potential) law-breakers that whenever law enforcement is perceived as ineffectual, its legalization, whatever the social consequences, is right around the corner. A civilized society reflects the courage and wisdom needed to challenge mistaken assumptions that otherwise degrade us as human beings; that quickly encourage proper forms of behavior not only for their own sake but also because of the positive examples they set for other people. This rather dim view of convention is never mindful of the perils of excessive tolerance that must inevitably find expression in an environment where unlimited freedom will eventually be unable to sustain itself. Such is fated for a society that is neither willing to uphold its legal traditions nor unable to estimate the consequences of its purposeful actions.

This disturbing pattern of rejecting personal responsibility is attributable, in part, to adopting Deterministic attitudes superseding the notion of Free Will; that is to say, absolving "inevitable" outcomes independent of Choice that seeks to excuse or exonerate inappropriate or violent behavior. Although guns, in the present context, have superseded "society" as the metaphorical fall guy, the remaining constant is that of limited accountability that seeks to pardon or explain away violent or erratic behavior. Ian O'Connor, champion of the oppressed and self-styled Stephen Vincent Benet of the Gannett sports pages, might have properly considered a career more in line with the principles of serious journalism rather than (seemingly) wasting his "enormous" literary talents and high-minded idealism as a sports columnist. As a sports fan who came of age in the sixties, I often ask myself, what have become of the Larry Czonka's or the Bill Riggins' or the Jerry West's or Rick Barry's, White Athletes who once dominated their respected sports? Is it conceivable that, in a day and age when the financial rewards are exceptionally high, (White's) have suddenly lost their competitive spark? Or could it be that many have fallen victim, in their own right, to stereotypical standards that seem to favor skill specific attributes like speed or vertical aptitude above other, less "remarkable" qualities equally essential for performing on a higher level? Will such patterns eventually mandate the same type of protective status for Whites that are presently afforded to African Americans and other racial minorities competing in the public and private sectors? The latter is a stretch, granted. I am simply exaggerating to make a point, which is this: where or at what point along the evolutionary dominance of African American Athletes become completely taken for granted that aspiring White Athletes need no longer apply?

It is not without irony that I find myself (partially) agreeing in part with an African American sociologist, who recently suggested that Sports have superseded the Plantation. This, in my view, is not an appropriate analogy. Most Athletes, especially African Americans, are well paid for their services. Nevertheless, this gentleman's remark underscores what appears to have devolved into a Bread and Circus' mindset in sports, where African American Athletes, in particular, are handsomely rewarded to "amuse" their White Audience. Opposing arguments might reasonably counter that White "Athletes" dominating "Pro-Wrestling" provide similar entertainment value. However, I digress. I would like to conclude by saying that I wish Mr. O'Conner would put an end to his incessant ravings that are over-done and oftentimes misleading. Were he truly committed to rectifying social "injustices", perhaps he might consider resigning from the newspaper, thereby enabling an equally qualified journalist of color, otherwise prevented from engaging in his or her chosen profession because of "institutionalized racism", to assume his present position as sports writer.

Whenever the subject of (violent) crime is mentioned, rely on the liberal establishment and other interested parties to inject gun ownership (legal or otherwise) into the mix. It is axiomatic, perhaps, that most (reasonable) people should favor "means testing" and thorough background checks to ensure, inasmuch as possible, that hand guns and other firearms don't end up in the wrong hands. I'm not certain, however, that adding new laws to re-enforce an over-whelming body of existing laws would necessarily achieve this desired result. Guns will always be accessible to criminal elements who want to obtain them. I believe that many of us are losing sight of the bigger picture by focusing our attention exclusively on inanimate objects while paying scant attention to the causal factors that have contributed to higher crime rates in our nation as compared, for example, with other industrialized nations that enforce stricter gun-control laws. (More on that later)

Guns, however an easy target for anti Second Amendment activists, are merely instruments of choice, although a convenient one to be sure. A handgun, or any other firearm for that matter, is not (the) underlying motive that incites some violent action. For that, we must turn our attention elsewhere; to the individual! Restricting the sale of firearms on the open market would not significantly reduce violent crime for the reason indicated above. Further legal restrictions would (merely) impose stricter licensing requirements on lawabiding individuals who would purchase them through normal, legal channels, to begin with. Ironically, laws on top of laws, that seek to reduce the (legal) possession of firearms, may actually produce unintended results by creating an imbalance between criminal elements procuring them through alternative (illegal) sources and law-abiding citizens denied or restricted legal access. Admittedly, although stricter law enforcement may marginally reduce accidents involving guns in the home or crimes of passion, its overall impact on violent crime would be, in my judgment, problematical.

As indicated above, anti-gun proponents are (oftentimes) likely to define violence in American Society in terms of gun ownership by comparing its own (violent) crime rate(s) with that of other Western Industrialized Nations (including Japan) that have lower (violent) crime rates then we. Statistics are sometimes misleading, however; that is to say, they do not necessarily place what is being measured in perspective. They oftentimes explain the what, however not the how and the why. A more thorough investigation would correctly reveal that were violent crimes committed by African Americans, especially younger A. A's, factored out of the equation, America's (violent) crime rate(s) would be among the lowest of all industrialized nations! That's a heavy burden to place on one segment of the (American) population. Facts, are facts, however. They can neither be whitewashed nor ignored if our society hopes to address and resolve such disparities and its "root causes". Unfortunately many of our political leaders, from both sides of the political aisle, have (conveniently) chosen the path of least resistance for the very simple reason that it is politically expedient for them to do so; that is to say, because many are unwilling to address such matters that might otherwise provoke ill-feelings among certain groups or

individuals. That a comparatively small minority is committing a disproportionate share of violent crimes should be raising a red-flag, however. Wherein lay the causal factors that have produced such troubling anomalies; on accident or chance, (implausible) biological designs, (racist), sociological factors (conditioning) or poverty (perhaps)?

Whatever the reason(s), any thoughtful society is compelled, if not by Conscience alone, then for its own personal safety and wellbeing, to critically examine the "root causes" characteristic among certain groups whose children are oftentimes the off-spring of single parent families, illegitimacy, illiteracy, drugs and, in some cases, lack of moral instruction; when combined, promote pathological, self-destructive attitudes that underscores a (moral) vulnerability and potential for criminal and anti-social behavior. Be that what it may, I believe it is fair to argue that no single individual, unless morally diseased, is naturally pre-disposed to crime. Samuel P. Huntington once stated that "The more man wages war against "his ancient enemies: poverty, disease, ignorance", the more he wages war against himself" This statement is useful to those looking to establish a causal relationship between poverty and crime. It is even more plausible, however, were such relationships considered in terms of movement and change, as well; that is to say; considered in light of the "transitional" components that unite both forces.

Transitional elements, as emerging possibilities present themselves, are oftentimes prone to violence because of rising expectations; unlike a society's wealthier segments who, lacking little in the way of material comfort, are "stable", as a rule, or (ironically), the abject poor who, (temporarily) resigned to their wretched living conditions, are equally "at ease" in a dormant stage of transition waiting for such an opportunity when there will be reason enough for hope or "change". Therefore, it may be properly argued that the relationship between poverty and (violent) crime is better understood as a potential for movement in association with (uncertain) prospects for economic improvement; each operating in an environment where results oftentimes fall short of what many had expected or hoped for. Our society should be addressing such issues in a straight-forward manner, instead of (indirectly) subsidizing such behavior on the chance that the problem(s) will magically disappear on their own accord or by making feeble excuses that may score political points in some circles; whose implausible assumptions, however, are likely to enflame passions. These include the usual suspects like institutionalized racism, cultural biases and exclusionary practices in general. What is required is a clearer understanding of the composite designs that condition certain individuals or groups of individuals to behave in one manner or another. This involves engaging in meaningful dialogue without fear of censorship. What is required are healthy living environments that promote family, character, endurance, and (economic) opportunity allowing proper nurturing.

A friend and I were recently engaged in an after dinner conversation concerning the potential economic fallout that the war in Iraq would likely impose on France. My friend, an ardent opponent of the war and therefore sympathetic with France's decision not to support it, suggested that it would be minimal, given that nation's strategic economic presence in the United States and European Marketplace(s) relative to its "negligible" Middle Eastern interests. How was I to argue? I am neither an economist nor a clairvoyant

and therefore not in any position to predict, with any degree of accuracy, how the French economy would likely be affected. My hunch, however, is that its short-term outlook won't be a pleasant one considering the formidable loss of revenue ("flowing") from its oil contracts and other capital investments in the region. Let's propose for a moment, and this is purely hypothetical, some arbitrary number: a decrease in GDP of, let's say 5%, that on the surface doesn't seem like a significant number. In what manner would this "nominal" decline in revenue impact, assuming that it does, the French economy? It wouldn't take much imagination to predict the "multiple" effect such a reduction would have on social services, for example, in a nation already reeling from chronically high (12%) unemployment rates.

Let's imagine the impact it would have on America's fine-tuned economy, for that matter, if its unemployment rate were to suddenly increase a couple of percentage points because of "marginal" declines in productivity and subsequent revenue (and profits). Imagine the rippling effect on a number of industries that are tightly inter-woven, nor to mention its own impact on the nation's ability to adequately fund its own entitlement programs that, in turn, would subsequently trigger higher inflation resulting from higher (consumer) prices precipitated by lower productivity levels that would (likely) lead to higher taxes that would (more than likely) discourage investment that would (most likely) generate even lower revenues than before. Be that what it may, France's troubling economy can ill-afford a diminishing role in the Middle East which arguably explains its reluctance to upset the status quo, if I'm permitted to put it so bluntly. Such an event would inevitably upset the macro-economic balance vital to the inflow/outflow of monies. Such may explain its sudden angst over its future role in the "rehabilitating" of Iraq. Sacre Bleu!

I was reading in one of your columns recently that the Board of Regents is once again exploring creative ways of further diminishing the relevancy of S.A.T.'s by focusing (more) on "performance" standards in the classroom rather than relying on objective, more traditional measures commonly employed to assess a student's (native) aptitude. It is not my intention to marginalize the importance of classroom instruction and the vital role it plays in promoting academic achievement but to point out, rather, that the many decisions these students will eventually make in their professional careers will oftentimes override the limits of classroom instruction. The manner an individual responds to a situation at the office, for example, will more often than not rely on thinking rationally (or natural aptitude) rather than learning (or vocational training).

The extent any individual is able to correctly think "outside the box" is what traditional testing attempts to determine. Such methods constitute a composite measure of native aptitude in conjunction with learned behavior. This new format, if I understand it correctly, consists of a reading section followed by written responses to questions related to the reading material. It isn't difficult to imagine where the subjective components of such "testing" might otherwise lead. The importance of comprehensive reading and writing skills are self-evident. Such skills can be improved through discipline however subject to diminishing returns. Neither skill is a necessary

component of (innate) intelligence, per se, although as a rule, most intelligent individuals read and communicate well. Would it seem plausible that, with few exceptions, a student scoring 700 on his or her Verbal S.A.T. would find expressing a coherent thought particularly challenging? Although each of us has the potential to exceed the somewhat (flexible) limits imposed by natural designs, no substitute exists for natural intelligence. For the sake of the student as well as the community, our schools need to place less emphasis on subjective (or feel good) "requirements" while placing greater emphasis on what should be their most provocative challenge; quickening every child's underlying talents and developing them to their fullest potential. Trying to create a level playing field by lowering academic standards is unfair to every student, however average or bright. This is especially true for the truly gifted who must oftentimes share their hard earned rewards with lesser talents. Russell Kirk was right on target in stating that "all other attempts at leveling must lead at best, to social stagnation.
